


James Broadwith – Auctioneering Competition


Welcoming Yuki

Nathan Wallis Talk

A group of AS Psychology students, along with Mrs Binedell, recently attended a presentation by Nathan Wallis, "Neuroplasticity and your Brain".

Nathan's presentations explore how the brain works and how neuroscience can better inform our day to day interactions with children and young people.

Our students found the talk extremely interesting and took some of the following facts away with them.

- The human body is not genomically programmed to deal with refined white sugar.
- There are 4 "brains", and for development it is essential that neurosequencing takes place through the 4 parts of the brain.
- Predictability is essential for young children. If we enhance predictability for babies and young children that calms the brain stem and eventually aids better cortical function (in brain 4).
- A dyadic relationship (one-to-one) relationship with a single caregiver is essential for a baby to develop trust and attachment. Often, foster children who pass through multiple homes cannot form a dyadic relationship. More than 80% of people in our prisons have been in the foster system.
- Whether you have learned to read and write before entering school at age 5 or not will not make a difference in cognitive ability from age 8.
 From about age 8 years, cognitive results plateau and there is (on average) little difference between early readers and those who learned to read and write later.
- Children (younger than 7) who are involved in free play (not directed by adults) tend to be resilient as teens and adults.
- The nature versus nurture debate is incorrect. We now should be discussing how nature accommodates nurture.

Our students from Room 3 & 4 have been contributing some art work, along with other Far North Schools, to the project 'Toi Marama 22 Matariki' to promote and support "Ngā Manu Kaitiaki o ngā Puna Waiora" organised through Akau Studio, a Pou Rama exhibition and projection show.

Year 4 contributed the Hoe Taonga, with the kowhaiwhai design by the students, based on the school logo and our natural environment, from the farm and surrounding bush. We sanded the hoe and used soil pigment to colour it, before we painted it. We also created the bird nest as part of the display.

Year 3 students decorated the back board for the hoe, the Pou taha. Together they will form one of the 12 feathers on the wings of the bird in the installation.

- Wednesday 7th July: Te Kura Kaupapa Maori o Kaikohe (20 Hongi Street, Kaikohe)






