Dear Springbank Family

Very recently, a <u>UNESCO report</u> has advocated for a global ban on smartphones in schools. They have cited cyberbullying and major distraction as the key rationale. This has inspired me to reflect on positive aspects of the Springbank environment that we sometimes take for granted. Having never allowed smartphones into our school environment, and regularly hearing about the negative effects of smartphones in other schools, it has just continued to be a no-brainer for us.

Similarly, when we introduced our BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) policy into Springbank back in 2012, we were particularly mindful of the balance between enhancing educational outcomes by using laptops to extend teaching and learning, whilst ensuring protocols were in place to ensure devices weren't used as a source of distraction or anti-social behaviour. I believe we have kept a healthy balance over the years.

The way we continue to integrate technology into our curriculum will look different at various levels throughout the school. However, what is constant is the fact that Springbank teachers will lead and direct learning, ensuring that student/teacher relationships are at the heart of a strong education. We will continue to purposefully integrate technology as a tool to enhance educational outcomes, weighing the benefits and drawbacks of each new app or piece of hardware.

With the rise of artificial intelligence set to affect a range of industries, including the wider education sector, I believe this is the next 'big thing' that schools must navigate with purpose and critical analysis. Personally, the rise of AI is equally as exciting as it is terrifying, but I look forward to us adopting/integrating what we feel will only enhance our students' Learning For Life.

Matariki Celebrations

As we mentioned in our June newsletter, we hosted a fantastic day of Matariki celebrations at school before the end of Term Two. The Springbank community all came together on Thursday 29th June to celebrate Matariki. With the previous day (Wednesday 28th June) being Prep Day, digging the hangi pit and preparing the vegetables, Thursday was a day of celebration and seeing all the organisation and hard work come together.









The hangi pit was positioned right outside the school offices and allowed students, staff, and families to watch and be engaged with all aspects of the hangi. It was set alight at 7:00am, the ash cleared, hot rocks set, and food lowered and covered at 11:45am, then the hangi was finally lifted at 4:00pm with a special ceremony. Throughout the day, our students took part in various activities around the school such as flax weaving, playing te rakau, and decorating Matariki jars for the glow tunnel. Festivities continued after school with everyone welcome to stay for more activities in the gym, Ki o Rahi on the field, and gathering around the hangi.

Our Matariki event was co-ordinated with a huge team effort, from our youngest friends at Preschool scrubbing vegetables, parents helping with the hangi, teachers leading Matariki activities, to senior students welcoming and serving families on the day. It was a wonderful experience bringing our school community together to celebrate those values of love (aroha), unity (kotahitanga), caring (manaakitanga), sharing (tohatoha) and of course feasting together (hakari).




International Students

School Community Reminders

School Fitness Track

The Springbank School fitness track is an excellent resource for our students to use every day as part of their morning fitness.

It is also a great resource for our families.

Our fitness track comprises several different loops, enabling the walker or runner to wind themselves around beautiful established native bush (first planted by Bob Warren back in 2015).

Parents and caregivers are welcome to use the track, but please personally sign into the office before you set off and also when you return back from the track. The surrounding paddocks are a working farm, so from time to time there will be stock and machinery moving about. We ask that any gates are left as you find them, be aware of the electric fencing, and dogs must be on a lead at all times.



Winter Ills and Absences

The wild rainy weather seems to have settled (for now), but the temperatures are still cool, and winter bugs are still circulating around the community.

We'd like to remind everyone that if your child is sick, or shows symptoms of being unwell, please keep them home. Your child may return to school once they have been 24-hour symptom free.



Any absences from school, be it illness, away on holiday, family events, or other reasons must be notified to the school. The easiest way to do this, is by using the Edge App.

- In the Apple/Play Store, select the FREE app "Musac Edge"
- Once downloaded, create a 4 digit pin to access the app. You will be directed to a screen where you can type your email then click "Forgot Password". This will enable you to create a password to enter the site. Your email will be the address that school would normally contact you on.
- You will then receive an email confirming your password change, if you click on the link, this will open the login screen from the Edge app.
- Once entered the first time, you can then access the Edge app, where you can easily submit an absence for your child.

If you have any trouble setting up the app, please pop into the office and Taryn can help you. Alternatively, you can email absences to Taryn, so she can update the attendance records for teachers.

Lastly, any students leaving school early for the day or for appointments, must sign out at the office before leaving. If late or returning to school, students must collect a late slip and/or sign back into school on their arrival.
