Welcome to the fifteenth edition of Waagir Bandimayi (Darkinjung words meaning Coast Messenger). Barang have continued to work with our seven local Aboriginal community-controlled organisations and three associate member organisations to keep our community informed to share information, give updates and keep all our community involved.

Barang Regional Alliance finished last year rejuvenated, inspired and energised.

In November 2023, our Youth Engagement Team hosted the Empowered Youth Summit. Over 130 young people who live on Darkinjung Country gathered at Point Wolstoncroft Sport and Recreation Camp for a cultural immersion camp. Local young people experienced a variety of activities including cultural dance, weaving and cultural games on the first day, and recreational activities on the second. This also served as an opportunity to listen to young people and hear what is important to them. Topics of discussion included culture and identity, health and wellbeing, and education and employment. Look out for our Youth Report in coming months!

In the last week before Christmas, our Directors, Representatives, Associates and Staff, came together for a Strategic Planning Workshop, where the Board determined the strategic direction for Barang Regional Alliance from 2024 to 2026. This plan has a continued focus on regional governance, cultural responsibility and structural change for our community, all underpinned by evaluation and adaptation.

We have since come together again with our community for a day of reflection, culture and connection, 'Resistance on Darkinjung Ngura', held 26 January 2024. Together with Eleanor Duncan Aboriginal Services, Yummarah, Central Coast Community Legal Centre, and all community who attended the day - we danced, we yarned, and we honoured our survival, resistance and resilience as Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

Celebrating 10 Years 2014-2024

This year we will celebrate our 10-year anniversary – keep a lookout for events soon to join in!

In the meantime, we are mentoring 14 Aboriginal school-based trainees who are combining Year 11 school attendance with working one day per week at workplaces that include Central Coast Local Health District (Gosford and Wyong Hospitals), University of Newcastle Ourimbah Campus and BreezeEQ Accountants Woongarah. This group joins the 15 trainees who completed 2023 requirements and will start Year 12 and the final year of their schooling and traineeships with CCLHD, Hammond Care and Coast and Country Primary Care. It's wonderful to see some many of our young people take up this opportunity, including attending a cultural immersion next to our office in January.


