

In 2026 the Regiment will celebrate its 20th Anniversary. To commemorate this occasion the Regimental Trustees have approved the scoping of a possible SCOTS Memorial. Initial thoughts would see the memorial in an accessible and public location in Edinburgh where serving, veterans, families and friends can gather at any time to remember and reflect. The memorial design and the materials to be used will all be considered by the SCOTS Memorial Working Group after which options will be presented to the Regimental Trustees. Clearly a fitting SCOTS Memorial will come at a cost and a fundraising campaign will be required to which it is hoped the SCOTS Association, both serving and veterans, will get right behind.

In 2031 the Regiment will celebrate its 25th Anniversary. To commemorate this occasion the Regimental Trustees have approved a draft outline of events which will aim to include the presentation of New Colours, the opening of an expanded, modern and engaging SCOTS museum at Edinburgh Castle and the publication of Regimental History Volume One.

Since the formation of the Regiment, the RHQ has invited family members of those SCOTS soldiers who lost their lives on operations to attend the ceremony.

The President of the SCOTS

Bob Bruce, laid a wreath on behalf
of The Royal Regiment of Scotland.
At the end of the official laying of
wreaths, the invited families were
asked to plant a Poppy Cross in
remembrance of their loved one
they had lost as a result of combat.
23 Crosses were laid to honour the
fallen SCOTS, who gave the ultimate
sacrifice.







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2 SCOTS COMMEMORATION – HIGHLAND LIGHT INFANTRY

Twelve members of 2 SCOTS recently returned from Belgium following a five-day trip to conduct one reburial and two rededication services. After a long drive from Edinburgh, upon arrival to Belgium, the team jumped straight into rehearsals for a full afternoon before the first service – the burial of Lance Sergeant Robert Brand and two unknown soldiers (9th Glasgow, Highland Light Infantry) at Messines Ridge Cemetery. That evening, Pipe Sergeant Joe Davies also had the

honour of playing Flowers of the Forest at the Menin Gate act of remembrance.

The team were excellent in their execution of the reburial on the Wednesday morning, led by Padre Dave Jeal, culminating with WO2 (CSM) Pasifull presenting the Union Flag that draped the coffin to Caroline, the great niece of Lance Sergeant Brand. She was visibly moved and incredibly grateful for the efforts of the team, a theme that was echoed across the week.

After a reception with the family, 2 SCOTS moved on to Dadizeele Cemetery. It was here that we were fortunate to be able to recognise those fallen from across the wider Royal Regiment of Scotland family as we conducted a rededication for Private Kiell (1st Battalion, The Seaforth Highlanders). He had previously been mistaken for a different soldier but using all sources available, JCCC and the Commonwealth War Graves Commission were finally able to identify Private Kiell and give the



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family in attendance closure as he was formally recognised with a new headstone.

Thursday morning saw the team conduct their final rededication service at Tyne Cot Cemetery, this time for Second Lieutenant Ferris (16th Battalion, The Highland Light Infantry). The gravity of the sacrifice during WW1 was cemented here with Tyne Cot being by far the largest cemetery we visited, including the headstones of multiple VC winners. Although already buried at Tyne Cot, his identity has only recently been established and the team were proud to finally be able to recognise Second Lieutenant Ferris in his final resting place.

After a sterling effort across all services Colonel Campbell Close, representing the Colonel of the Regiment, took the team to Black Watch Corner which further engendered admiration for all who have gone before and who's spirit is continued within all members of the Royal Regiment of Scotland. That afternoon we were also able to visit In Flanders Fields Museum before our final meal laid on by JCCC. All members of the team conducted themselves to the highest standards throughout the trip and were proud to be able to recognise the sacrifice from those who have paved the way for the Regiment to be what it is today.





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UNVEILING OF SCOTS MEMORIAL BENCH

On the 10th of November 2023, a bench was unveiled and presented to the SCOTS association in memory of all 23 fallen SCOTS.

Janette Binnie, mother of the late Sgt Sean Binnie, started working with the Ancre Somme Association Scotland to raise funds for two memorial benches. The first bench was in memory of Sean and was unveiled on 11 November 2021 at North Primary School, Kirkcaldy, the school Sean attended.

The second bench is in memory of all The Royal Regiment of Scotland officers and soldiers who died in Iraq and Afghanistan. Janette wanted the bench to be placed in the community for their use and thought there would be no better place than outside Regimental Headquarters in Edinburgh Castle.

The event was attended by families and friends of the 23 fallen SCOTS, and the bench was received on behalf of the SCOTS association by the President Major General (Retd) Bob Bruce. Deputy Assistant Chaplain General Reverend David Anderson completed a dedication and blessing of the bench, and all guests then headed to the officers mess to enjoy refreshments. 
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THE SCOTS ASSOCIATION

We have also added a section called the "Transitional Aide Memoire" which is full of useful information to guide you through the process for leaving the service. The latest addition to the app is closed groups in the "Groups" section. This enables users to set up a private group and become the administrator for that group. Other users can request to join the group and the administrator approves or rejects their request. Each Bn will be able to set up specific groups for them to manage and use as a hub for information sharing securely and within the realms of the SCOTS App.

We are currently working on an update to enable the administrator to add personnel to groups which will be coming very soon.

Congratulations to Pte David Holmes who won this years' Master's prize and certificate.

Pte Holmes has had a very successful year with the company and has set himself apart. As well as being a reliable infantry soldier, he took it upon himself to conduct a charity kilt walk for the Army Benevolent Fund raising £276 after completing a 21-mile route. Pte

Delta Company have just completed their first SFAB task on Ex VIGILANT ISLES in Japan. Establishing a new relationship with our partner force, the Japanese Ground Self Defence Force (JGSDF), whilst working alongside 1 RGR and 16X ISTAR. Delta Coy deployed with three teams:

- 4x Observer mentors
- 4x Liaison Officers (LOs)
- 4x Drone pairs

Each team were embedded into a JGSDF Airborne Company throughout the deployment, and were intricately involved in planning, tactics, physical training, and warfighting on both dry and

live exercises. The drone pairs were able to give Coy Commanders live updates during tactical actions with their Parrot Anafi Drones as well as being used as riflemen. The observer mentors produced an after-action review and delivered it to the IGSDF 3rd Bn at the end of the FTX. The LOs worked with the Coy/ Bn Commanders and communicated with the 1RGR partner force to reduce friction and improve information flow. On completion of the closing ceremony, Delta Coy headed to Tokyo and Kyoto for a cultural R&R package which was very kindly supported by Army and Scotland trust, 51X Welfare fund and Perth Forces Charitable trust. 3 SCOTS will continue this relationship with the JGSDF and work alongside them as an enduring partner.

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SCOTS MUSEUM UPDATE



Volunteer Debut At Dalkeith Palace The SCOTS Museum welcomed

a new team of Learning and
Engagement volunteers this autumn
to assist our Learning Officer with
the delivery of our popular school
and community sessions.

Some of the team made their debut at Remembrance 2023, a collaborative exhibition between the Royal Scots and Dalkeith Palace. The SCOTS Museum team provided a successful schools session in partnership with Poppyscotland, which highlighted the continuing importance of understanding the role the Army plays in our society and the ways in which we remember that contribution both in our museums and everyday life. The sessions were advertised to local Midlothian Primary schools, and we hosted around 150 Primary 7 learners over the course of three days.

Our volunteers were an integral part of the success of the sessions as they provided much needed support to facilitate the workshops on offer, spending much of their time honing their sewing skills to help learners create their class Keepsake Bear! We look forward to getting them and the

rest of the volunteer team involved in more museum activities in the near future.

Cruachan IV Visits The Museum!

Cpl Cruachan IV made history for the SCOTS Museum in October as the first equine visitor to cross the threshold!

Cruachan and his team spent the day in Edinburgh Castle greeting visitors and explaining the role of our Regimental Mascot. Inside the Museum, our younger visitors decorated their own mini ponies to take home as a memento of their day.



Wishtan Cross Preserved

Conservation work was undertaken in October to preserve the oak memorial cross formerly housed at FOB Wishtan, Afghanistan. The cross was first built while the Regiment was stationed in Wishtan in the late 2000s, and became a focal point for members of 1 SCOTS who formed part of the 3 RIFLES Battle Group during Op HERRICK 11. It remembers Corporal Johnathan Moore and Private Sean MacDonald, both sadly killed in an IED explosion in Helmand Province in February 2010.

Having spent so long exposed to the elements in the desert climate, the base of the cross had begun to rot and become brittle. Through careful treatment we have added a resin coating which has stabilised the base and will prevent future loss of the oak structure.

A significant monument to those who served in Wishtan, our aim is to introduce the cross to our permanent museum display in 2024.





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2 SCOTS EX SUNDA PATROL 23

The Sunda Patrol is a gruelling, section level, competition that takes place in the jungle of Brunei, hosted by the Royal Gurkha Rifles. This was the pilot competition that will hopefully become an annual international event. 2 SCOTS put together a team of volunteers at short notice and quickly flew out to Brunei.

The team were greeted in country by 95% humidity which was a bit of a contrast from our frosty Scottish autumn climate. We were busy as soon as we touched down, acclimatising at the double with early morning runs to get the body used to the heat. The rest of the days of our first week were spent in back-to-back lectures, where we learnt how to operate and survive in the Jungle. Tactically, the Jungle environment is very different from what we're used to in the Scottish hills, and so the learning curve was

steep. We spent most evenings going over what we had learned that day and running rehearsals of what would be expected. CSgt McGregor was pivotal in developing the team, having completed Jungle Warfare Instructor Course, he understood the environment and what was expected.

After our week of lessons and acclimatisation it was time for the competition. The thirteen teams were divided into three groups, each team doing a round robin of different stands over the three-day competition. We kicked off with a river crossing straight into close target recce, which meant our clothes and equipment were suitably wet (and heavier!) for the remainder of the competition. Our second day consisted of a 10-hour survival stand, attempting to replicate what we had learnt the week prior. Here our Commonwealth soldiers led the way, demonstrating an impressive knowledge on preparation of food

and how to make different shelters, all whilst I struggled to tie a simple knot. The third day was by far the most testing, we conducted an 11-hour tactical patrol through the jungle. The team was fatigued and degraded by this point, but the determination to succeed was obvious. We remained disciplined throughout and completed the route with a commendable score.

The results of the competition were given on the final day. We all sat impatiently slapping mosquitos and scratching irritable bites, apprehensive about how we'd performed compared to the other teams... We were elated however to find out we had achieved a silver medal, not only finishing second out of all the international teams but also being one of the few teams to finish the competition with our team complete. Overall, the team did exceedingly well, we look forward to attending the competition next year with our sights firmly set on that gold medal.



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6 SCOTS MUDMASTER COMPETITION

For the second year 6 SCOTS competed in MUDMASTER – an off-road vehicle event. This is Scotland's preeminent civilian/military off-road competition and challenges teams on navigation, vehicle handling and arduous off-road skills. There are categories for trucks, four-wheel drive cars and motorcycles. 6 SCOTS Motor Transport (MT) Platoon entered the truck category using a 6-Ton SV Mann Truck. One of 33 truck, 47 four-wheel car and 10 motorcycle teams.

With Sgt Gary "Patch" Duncan declared Vehicle Off Road "VOR" for the event, knives were drawn to assume the driver seat in a team of two. Cpl John "Fergie" Ferguson was victorious in the ensuing battles leaving WO2 Gary Stewart relegated to navigator.

Storm Ciarán had done its damage in the week building up to the event and would prove to make the arduous off-road challenges ultradifficult. Yet full of confidence the team started the event from Redford Barracks, Edinburgh early Saturday morning. Points were awarded for competing all legs of a prescribed route, recording orienteering-style locations, and completing the offroad skills sections. The first three stages saw full points for the team completing a low level off-road and some on-road driving.



At last, Storm Ciarán decided to make its mark on the event at Hassockrig Bing quarry near Harthill. Failing to ascend the technical slope saw a loss of points, although all was not lost in the competition standings as event marshals had their work cut out with many competitors sliding to the same result. A short following leg and lunch provided by 6 SCOTS's SSgt Jennifer Lawrence boosted morale.

Following a forced rest break there were a series of navigation legs through Kilsyth, Denny, Sterling and Balloch before reaching Garelochhead for the night. The following wet morning saw longing faces on the motorcycle competitors. A series of off-road skill tests were conducted on

Garelochhead Training Area before heading to Glasgow and completing more off-roading at Linwood. The biggest challenge there was avoiding the other competitors in a small and congested area. A timed off-road event finished off the competition.

Cpl Ferguson and WO2 Stewart came in 19th out of 33 truck teams. A target to improve on next year, and an opportunity to get a second team entered too. This was a great opportunity for 6 SCOTS MT Platoon to socialise with and compete against mainly RLC teams.



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2 SCOTS - C COY - EX STEADFAST JUPITER



In September 23, 2 SCOTS Charlie Company, with backfill from B and FSp Coys, deployed at very short notice to Romania to provide force protection for the major NATO Exercise STEADFAST JUPITER. We deployed out of Glencorse in good order and began our journey to Bucharest via JAMC and Brize Norton. We arrived to the Romanian army camp 24hrs later, after linking up with 22 Signal Regiment, who were the unit we were attached to for the duration of the exercise. We had a good day integrating with the Gurkha squadrons, with Fus Gallacher presenting the history of 2 SCOTS as well as the closeknit history of Scottish and Gurkha soldiers.

The initial five weeks consisted of the build phase. For 2 SCOTS this consisted of understanding the compound we were to guard, setting up a guard room and building perimeter wire defences. Once our guard was set up, the signals and engineers could begin their build phase. During this time there was opportunity to explore Bucharest. A particular favourite was the thermal spa where Jocks, NCOs and officers alike could relax and have some downtime on a rare day off. The weather throughout the exercise was exceptional, rarely below 25 degrees and always sunny.

Once the build was complete, the ARRC staff began to arrive in preparation for the Execute phase of the exercise. During the execute phase the role for us did not change, and the Jocks continued to provide protection, not only of personnel but also of important equipment.

At no point did their enthusiasm

levels drop and their professionalism and sense of humour remained exemplary. The execute phase also saw the Colonel of the Regiment, Lieutenant General Sir Nick Borton KCB DSO MBE, arrive as COMARRC. He was extremely keen on meeting the Jocks at every opportunity and was very proud to tell visiting guests that we were a part of his regiment. The Execute phase lasted 10 days, and on completion the collapse of the CP began. We were the last ones to collapse and afterwards thoughts quickly turned to the journey home.

The return to Glencorse was eventful to say the least! Morale was certainly tested after a literal case of "on the bus, off the bus" on the airport tarmac. Thankfully however, we only had to wait four days until we were split into three groups and through planes, trains and automobiles eventually made it back to camp. Luckily, all were accounted for unscathed, and everyone took something away from this broadening experience.

This year's Annual Deployment Exercise (ADE) for the Bn took place in Croatia working alongside the Croatian Forces.

The exercise took place over the month of September and saw Reservists from 6 and 7 SCOTS, with support from 3 SCOTS, deploy on exercise alongside the Croatian Armed Forces (CAF), 2nd Mech Bn (Pumas). The "Pumas" are part of the Croatian Guards armoured Bde and are a key NATO member.

The exercise was split into several phases and formed the main effort for this year's training. Soldiers and Officers took part in staff training,

field craft, medical and tactical actions, all designed to test the force the projection and collaboration between a British reserve and NATO regular force.

D Coy's training weekend saw members of the Bn take part in an urban skills package on Garelochhead training area. This involved the use of simulation ammunition in order to ensure every accurate shoot can be recorded and analysed.

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2 SCOTS MRX - EX SHADER TEMPEST

On the 7 October, A and B
Companies deployed to Caerwent
Training Area for the Mission
Rehearsal Exercise (MRX) for Op
SHADER. Given a lot of our focus
had recently been directed at getting
visas, passports, and other vitalbut-not-particularly-thrilling admin
points in order, I am sure I am not
alone in saying that I was very keen
to get to started.



The MRX had been preceded by a week-long All Ranks Brief in Bassingbourn which first and foremost gave us a more complete understanding of the nature of Op SHADER, and an idea of the situation in Erbil. Unsurprisingly, that situation has changed considerably in the months since. The training element of the ARB focused on the mission-specific skills that would be the basis of our role while deployed, and what our multiples would ultimately be tested on during the MRX - predominantly geared towards operating in vehicles, with a real emphasis on medical responses. The feedback from the directing staff showed that the locks had engaged well, and, with that, we were ready for MRX.



For those who have been fortunate to have been in other, hillier, parts of Wales, the bright sunshine and crisp, dry weather which greeted us came as a bit of a shock. Indeed, Caerwent continued to provide us with unusually realistic Erbil-style weather for the best part of a week. To everyone's relief, this was soon remedied, and just in time for the test phase of the exercise to begin. As we'd been warned, the serials across this phase were equal parts varied and unpredictable. One day you would find yourself in the middle of a major civilian road traffic accident, and the next escorting an 'Italian' Colonel with a suspiciously Welsh accent to a vital KLE, during which he would suffer a catastrophic cardiac arrest. Indeed, of such high quality was the medical attention he received from the men and women of 3 Platoon that same Colonel was back to work the very next day! The large redbrick building which we called home for two weeks was suitably comfortable, and the ops room and offices were abuzz with activity throughout. A great deal of importance was also put on the ability of both companies to deal with the various threats to consider while in camp. Most common was the ever-present danger of drones,

the sighting of which triggered the rapid movement to the safety of a nearby collective protection shelter. One eye was always kept looking skywards as a result, though this did give rise to the occasional false alarm.
