A 5-year-old needing his first brain surgery after the onset of seizures when he was 18 months old.

A family with two working parents struggle to pay bills and needs help with their finances.

## Instructions

Coordinator: Before you are 20 situations happening in Lincoln Nebraska right now—possibly to folks you know-your neighbor, co-worker, family or friend. You have an opportunity to help the individuals in ONE of these situations: who would you choose?
After they choose ask why they made that choice-were they influenced because of someone they knew.
Acknowledge how difficult it is to choose-many will have wanted to give to more than one.
Coordinator: Here is some additional information for you.
Each of these scenarios is about one individual; but in many cases their family may also be in need of
assistance.
For example:
The man with Alzheimer's Disease in \#4 is the father of the woman in \#10 and the grandfather

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The family in \#8 has the $7^{\text {th }}$ grader in \#20
The mother in \#17 is mother to the teen in \#12
The mother in \#13 is mother to the young boy in \#18 and the girl in \#16.
Families have a variety of issues they face and need a multitude of services to move them out of crisis
into stability. A typical individual/family will receive assistance from four to five partner agencies.
