During his tenure at Excellence Boys, Jaz served as a 2nd and 3rd grade teacher and instructional leader. Most notably, during the 2016-17 academic year, Jaz was a 3rd Grade teacher and Instructional Leader and led the team to impressive gains on the 2017 NYS exam, outperforming both district and state-wide averages. Under his leadership, scholars achieved 95% advanced/proficient on the math exam (+ 28 points from 2016) and 70% advanced/proficient on the ELA exam (+ 30 points from 2016). Jaz holds a B.A. in English from Morehouse College and a M.A. in Teaching from the Relay Graduate School of Education.

Julia Kaiser became the proud principal of Hodgen Tech Academy after serving four years as an Academic Instructional Coach. Amanda has worked in Denver Public Schools for 12 years and received an exemplary teaching award as an elementary teacher. She studied History at the University of Colorado for her undergraduate degree and attained her principal licensure through the Ritchie Program for School Leaders: Executive Leadership for Successful Schools at the University of Denver.
