## A LETTER FROM DORCAS Children's Home Co-founder

Dear Supporters,

We are all doing well and are grateful that God has remained faithful to us. As we continue to navigate life after the pandemic, we face challenges that call for us to be creative in how we meet them.

Since the children have to spend so much time in school and doing homework, we hired a music teacher who trains them in vocals, dance, and piano. Our hope with this is that these activities can help ease the pressure the kids are facing by being in school six days a week.

We hired another teacher to help with extra tutoring, to help kids with any problems they may have with learning. We have also started a new initiative where we get together with other children's homes and play friendly soccer matches. This has helped keep their morale high and is also a great way to exercise. Another new norm includes regular walks in the afternoon when the weather permits.

We have partnered with Eden Thriving, whose mission is to "teach basic environmental science and cultivate better conservation practices at the household level." This has been great for the children because it is teaching them ways to care for the environment. The kids have also started minor projects such as building bird nests around the compound, and some are now proud owners of chickens, doves, and rabbits.

At the end of every year, students in Grade 8 sit for the National Exam that will determine where they will attend secondary school. We ask that you join us in praying that all their hard work will bring them success and find a school that fits for each of them.

We are forever grateful to Kenya Matters for their continued support as we love and take care of these children and the community.


# JOHN KARANJA A Story 20 Years in the Making

My name is John Karanja Wanjiru. I was born and raised in Nyamath village as the only son of the late Damaris Wanjiru. She passed away when I was only a couple of years old due to the HIV virus. I was left under the care of my late great-grandmother and grandmother.

It was about the year 2002 when my great-grandmother met Elijah & Dorcas Wachira. They had moved into a nearby community and built their own home. She knew they were good people and asked them to take care of me. The request of my great-grandmother gave Elijah and Dorcas a calling — to care for the children who had become orphaned in the area where we lived.



At that time, they did not take me to their home, but they began raising money to care for those of us who were without means of eating well and without good parental care. A number of years after the request by my great-grandmother, the children's home came to exist. I was one of the first children to move to the home, what we call the CRCA.





I took my primary education while living there. I then joined secondary school. Having gone through my four years in high school. After graduating, I was privileged to join one of the theological school in Kenya, the AIC Kapsabet Bible College. I graduated in the year 2019.



I am currently serving in one Africa Inland Church Kenya where the late pastor Elijah served as assistant pastor. I am looking forward to furthering my studies with the help of well wishers.





P.S. When supporting people of the children's home visit Kenya, we would usually visit with John's great-grandmother and grandmother. With an interpreter, we would sit in their humble home and listen to stories of their family, John's mother, their struggles as two single women raising their own children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren.

This past summer, at the age of 97, John's great-grandmother passed. Kenya Matters, in a small way, helped with the funeral expenses. She will be missed by many of us.

Our children cannot rely on parents or relatives for any portion of their daily living expenses. Thus, Kenya Matters works to provide the full amount of their care, averaging \$100 monthly per child.









#### SHEEP PROGRAM

The simple gift of five sheep can help raise an entire family out of abject poverty. These animals provide income in the form of milk, meat, and lambs. The recipients of these sheep are relatives of the children living at the safehouse.

The first and second born lambs born from the five donated sheep are returned back to the program so that others can benefit. Thus, the cycle of generosity continues. In its own unique way, this gift keeps giving.

This is our longest running program, beginning even before the children started to arrive at the safehouse in 2008. This is yet another way your gift strengthens the larger community surrounding the CRCA.

### WELL AND WATER PROJECT Celebrating 12 years of clean water!

In rural Kenya, many people live without a nearby water source. Twelve years ago, October of 2011, after a number of previous drilling attempts, a hired well drilling company hit an abundance of water 850 feet below ground.

Our children and staff have been able to access clean water for drinking, bathing, cleaning, and growing vegetables in the garden since the water discovery. Our local community, which includes nearby farms, a school, and affordable rental units, has been able to purchase water for their daily needs, most often transported by donkey carts and blue plastic water barrels.

The constant supply of clean water from the CRCA well has transformed the lives of our children and those of the surrounding community. A neighboring orchard and vegetable farmer had a pipeline installed as backup for the times when the rains fail to arrive.



# MEET OUR BOARD & KENYAN STAFF

Kenya Matters partners with the CRCA (Community Recovery Centre Africa) to meet the needs of Kenyan children and families in the Karai community. Our board members bring career expertise and a passion for helping children and families thrive. Some have lived or currently live in Kenya, and others bring the experience of having served on other non-profit boards.

Our Kenyan staff works tirelessly to meet the needs of our children in

order to grow them into thriving Kenyan citizens. The CRCA staff is empowered to make all decisions regarding the children's' diet, education, spiritual needs, and health care. Additionally, our Kenyan co-founder, Dorcas, and our Children's director, Milka, determine the appropriate staffing needs to meet the needs of the children.

Our board and the CRCA staff intersect to determine priorities for the funds raised, including general expenses, educational opportunities, and facility projects. The primary focus of the Kenya Matters board and our staff is to provide a safe, loving, and thriving environment for the children at the safehouse and to encourage them after they have graduated from high school and have made their lives into the larger world.





# Kenya Matters Board

Randy Buist has served as the board president for the past thirteen years. With his first visit to Kenya in December of 2008, he was drawn into the work of Kenya Matters. He tries to make at least annual visits to the children's home in Kenya. Over the past 13 years, he's made more than 20 African visits. After graduating from seminary in 1993, he worked on a church staff as the youth and education pastor. Following this experience, he focused his attention on raising three young children while serving on several boards and working with his family's horticulture business.

Heidi Swieringa has served on the board for the past decade, bringing her experience with nonprofits to our board. As the co-chair of Kenya Matters, she keeps the board and volunteers focused on the many tasks that need to be accomplished. She lives in Adrian, Michigan with her husband and daughter. She works with disabled adults through her work as guardian/conservator/trustee. She spends free time participating in social justice issues, gardening, reading, home projects, and family time.

Levi Molenje serves as the co-chair of Kenya Matters. He focuses on the education aspect of the children, along with how the project is enabling the young people to become healthy people after graduating from the children's home. He and his spouse have lived in the U.S. for the past twenty-three years after moving from Kenya to attend university. He is the father of three young adult children, all who are currently working on degrees post-high school. In his free time, he is a professor of mathematics at Waldorf University, in lowa. He holds a Ph.D. from Syracuse University.

Jerry Vanden Bosch serves as the treasurer of Kenya Matters. For much of his professional career, he led his CPA firm in Zeeland, Michigan. After retiring a number of years ago, he was convinced to bring his expertise in finance to our board of directors. He now spends life between Arizona and Michigan, enjoying time wherever the snow is not falling. His preferred summer days include time with his spouse, adult children and grandchildren.

Anna Buist is currently teaching English to middle schoolers in Honduras. Her parents first took her to Kenya at the age of ten. Since 2009, she has visited the children's home nearly a dozen times (she has lost track). Her early years spent traveling nurtured a passion for being an educator among marginalized children. She is planning on entering a Master of Education program in Washington, D.C. in the fall of next year. She loves traveling and exploring cultures and new places.

He is of Kenyan origin, living in the States for the last eight years with his spouse and two children, a 14 year old son, and a 10 year old daughter. In his free time, he loves spending time with his family, watching movies, hiking, and playing board games. Moses and his wife love to support their family and friends in Kenya through mentoring and financial support.

Stephan Lutz has spent more than two decades calling Nairobi, Kenya his home. He works for a significantly large non-profit as their Senior Program Consultant in East Africa.
