MEASUREMENTS

Original garment is worked in size 24 months

TENSION

14sts and 20 rows = 10 cm over stocking stitch using 5,5 mm needles

ABBREVIATIONS

alt = alternate; beg = begin(ning); cont = continue; dec = decrease; foll(s) = follow(s)ing; inc = increase; k = knit; p = purl; patt(s) = pattern(s); rem = remain(ing); rep = repeat; RW = ribwise; R(W)SF = right(wrong) side facing; R(W)SR = right(wrong) side row; st(s) = stitch(es); st st = stocking stitch; tog = together

INSTRUCTIONS BACK

Using 5 mm needles cast on 41(43;45;47)sts.

1st row: RSF, k1, (p1, k1) to end.

2nd row: P1, (k1, p1) to end.

These 2 rows will now be referred to as single rib.

Cont in single rib until 2% cm, dec 1 st (= work 2tog) in centre of last WSR = 40(42;44;46)sts.











Change to 5,5 mm needles and cont as folls:

1st row: RSF, k.

2nd row: P.

These 2 rows will now be referred to as stocking stitch (st st).

Cont straight in st st until work measures 26(28;30;32)cm from beg ending with a WSR.

Mark centre 14(16;18;18)sts for back neck opening, then cast off all sts.

RIGHT AND LEFT FRONTS:

Using 5 mm needles cast on 19(21;23;25)sts and work in single rib patt for $2\frac{1}{2}$ cm, dec 1 st in centre of last WSR = 18(20;22;24)sts.

Change to 5,5 mm needles and cont in st st until work measures 22(24;25;27)cm from beg ending with a WSR for right front and RSR for left front.

SHAPE NECK:

Cast off 2(3;3;4)sts at beg (neck edge) of next row = 16(17;19;20)sts.

Cast off 0(2;2;2)sts at same edge of next 0(1;2;2) alt rows =
16(15;15;16)sts. Dec 1 st at beg of next 3(2;2;2) alt rows = 13(13;13;14)sts.

Cont straight until work measures same as back to shoulder ending with a WSR, then cast off all sts for shoulder.

SLEEVES (both alike):

Using 5 mm needles cast on 25(27;27;29)sts. 1st row: RSF, k1, (p1, k1) to end. 2nd row: P1, (k1, p1) to end. 3rd row: As 2nd row. 4th row: As 1st row. Change to 5,5 mm needles and rep these 4 rows, inc 1 st at each end of every 4th row 6(7;8;8) times = 37(41;43;45)sts.

Cont straight until work measures 17(19;21;23)cm from beg ending with a WSR, then cast off all sts in patt.











HOOD:

Using 5 mm needles cast on 63(63;67;67)sts.

1st row: RSF, k1, (p1, k1) to end.

2nd row: P1, (k1, p1) to end.

3rd row: As 2nd row. 4th row: As 1st row.

Change to 5,5 mm needles and rep these 4 rows until work measures 9(10;11;12)cm ending with a WSR.

Dec 1 st at each end of next row, then every 4th row 2(2;1;1) times = 57(57;63;63)sts.

Cont straight until work measures 15(16;17;18)cm from beg ending with a WSR.

SHAPE HOOD:

Next Row: Patt 21(21;23;23)sts and leave these sts on a holder, cast off next 15(15;17;17)sts then cont on rem sts for left side of work.

LEFT SIDE:

Cont straight until work measures 20(21;23;24)cm from beg ending with a WSR, then cast off all sts in patt.

RIGHT SIDE:

WSF, rejoin yarn at inner edge, pick up sts from holder and work as for left side.

FRONT BANDS:

Sew shoulder seams.

RSF, using 5 mm needles, pick up and k36(38;40;44)sts evenly along edge of right front (for a girl) or left front (for a boy) and work in single rib patt for 2 rows.











Next row, buttonhole row: Rib 2(3;4;3)sts, cast off 2sts, *rib 4(4;4;5)sts, cast off 2sts, rep from * 4 times more, rib to end.

WSF, rejoin yarn at inner edge, pick up sts from holder and work as for left side.

Next row: Rib, casting on 2sts over each buttonhole.

Rib 1 more row, then cast off all sts RW.

Work a similar band along other front, omitting buttonholes.

TO MAKE UP:

Fold hood so that the top inner corners of the left and right sides meet in the centre of the 15(15;17;17) cast off sts. [You will have the cast off edges of each side tog].

Sew into place along cast off sts as well as cast off seam.

Place seam in centre of back neck then sew back seam and lower edges of hood to cardigan neck shaping, easing hood to fit.

Place markers 14(15;16;17)cm down on either side of shoulder seams.

Fold sleeves in half lengthways, then placing folds on shoulder seams, sew sleeves into position between markers.

Sew up side and sleeve seams.

Block garment to measurement, cover with a damp cloth and allow to dry.

Sew on buttons to correspond with buttonholes.




World Youth Skills Da Saturday 15 July 2023




Beginners Quilting Class


CRAZY QUILTERS CLASS

Did you know?

People started sewing by hand around 20 000 years ago

Sewing was one of the first skills humans learnt how to do. It came before the invention of spinning yarn and weaving, which originated in the Middle East around 4000 BC1. Sewing was combined with the weaving of plant leaves in Africa to create baskets, such as those made by Zulu weavers.

Sewing was used to stitch together animal hides for clothing and for shelter. The materials used for sewing in these times were quite different to those we use at present. The first sewing processes aimed to create clothing made from skin, fur or bark by using animal bones or antlers as needles and animal tendons or veins as thread. Sewing remained a manual craft until the 19th century, when the first sewing machine was invented by Barthélemy Thimonnier, a French inventor who patented his machine in 1830 and opened a clothing factory that used his machines to create army uniforms.











Did you know?

However, his factory was burnt down by tailors who feared that his machines would replace their jobs. The first practical sewing machine that used a lockstitch design was patented by Elias Howe, an American engineer, in 1846. He improved the performance of the machine significantly by adding features such as an automatic feed and a shuttle underneath the fabric. Sewing machines became more popular and widely used in the 20th century, especially after the invention of electricpowered machines. Sewing machines enabled mass production

and export of sewn objects, but hand sewing is still practiced around the world as a means of creative expression and high-


