

# The Eucharistic Prayer

(Adapted from Season of Creation Two, the Anglican Church of Southern Africa)

Presider: God be with you.
People: And also with you.
Presider: Lift up your hearts.

People: We lift them to our God.

Presider: Let us give thanks to the God of all of Creation.
People: It is right to give God thanks and praise.

Creator, you spoke the Word and all that is in heaven and on the earth, all things, came into being. Your Spirit hovered over the primal elements, and you brought forth life in countless forms, including this our fragile earth, and we amongst its inhabitants. As our past is in you, so our hope for the future rests with you. Through you all things are brought to new life. And now we give you thanks for the glories of your creation given into our care, and for the opportunities we have to share that richness with all your people. And so with the wonders of creation and the songs of praise of all your creatures both in heaven and on earth we praise you now and for ever saying/singing:

Holy, holy, holy, Lord, God of power and might,

All:

Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest. (10am) Sanctus, sung Holy, holy, holy, Lord (WLP, #858) Ho - lv, ho ly, ho - ly Lord, God earth might, heaven and are full of your glo - ry.



#### The Presider continues

In the night that Jesus was betrayed, he took bread, work of human hands, gift of our earth, and gave thanks to God. He broke the bread, gave it to his friends and said: Take and eat, for this is my body, given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.

He took the wine, work of human hands, gift of our earth, and gave thanks to God. He gave it to his friends saying: This is my blood of the new covenant, shed for you and for all creation for the forgiveness of sins. Every time you drink of the wine, do this in remembrance of me.

So we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Presider and People:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The Presider continues:

Merciful God, we come to this table seeking reconciliation; with you, with one another; with all creation. Through these mysteries reconcile us to our world and empower us to restore your creation and fulfill your will.

Send your life giving Spirit upon us, and upon this bread and wine. Stir in us the creative and redeem the destructive. Unite us with you through the love of your Son. By whom, and with whom and in whom, in the unity of your Creative Spirit, with all that has been, is, and will be in your universe, we stand before you, God of all Creation, with songs of everlasting praise. Blessing and honor and glory and power be yours for ever and ever. **AMEN.**



#### How to receive Communion:

Please receive the bread in open and outstretched hands and sip the wine from the chalice, guiding it gently to your lips. (Or you may dip the bread into the wine. You may choose to receive only bread.) We respond to communion by saying, "Amen." If instead you prefer to receive a blessing, please indicate that by crossing your hands across your chest.

## **About the Liturgy**

More than a decade ago St. Bartholomew's was instrumental in bringing the celebration of Creation Season to the Diocese of Maine, and it is our tradition to celebrate this season in the early fall. As we await the advent of a full Creation liturgy and lectionary from our Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music, we currently craft our own liturgy each year, and have constructed our own three-year cycle through which to engage the glory of God's created order.

This year we begin again with the first Creation story in Genesis 1. With the full encouragement of our bishop we have chosen to step away from the lectionary for these weeks to focus on the theology of Creation as it is explored in Biblical and extra Biblical texts.

#### Sources:

Most of the material assembled for this liturgy has been drawn from the work of Green Anglicans, the Environmental Alliance of the Anglican Communion. Archbishop Thabo Makgoba oversees this work as the head of Green Anglican group. The resources they use come from all over the Communion, but primarily from The World Council of Churches, The Anglican Alliance, and the group Churches Together in Britain and Ireland. When possible I have tried to include the original source, though I have adapted virtually everything to tailor the liturgy specifically to our use.

The Eucharistic Prayer is from Season of Creation, written by Rev. A. Warmback for Green Anglicans. It is authorized for use in the Anglican Church of Southern Africa, and across the Communion it is used to develop our Creation theology more fully.

St. Bartholomew's was founded in 1973 by The Rev. Harold Hopkins, Jr. and a group of friends who wanted to offer a different model of "being the church" within the Episcopal tradition. This parish was founded to be a place where: worship is less formal and is open to liturgical growth and experimentation; "Church" is defined as the community gathered in worship, not the building; music is an integral part of church life; the priest is seen as a teacher and encourager of the life of the community, and leadership is collaborative; children are valued and understood to be an integral part of the life of the church and its worship; the community lives the values it holds, being a place that is inclusive in its membership and expansive in its outreach to the world.

This parish community joyfully and prayerfully lives into that vision, becoming the people we are called to be, offering a slightly different model from more traditional Episcopal churches.

Our worship is straight-forward, easy to follow (and join in with), and often experimental (we are currently authorized by our Bishop to be a place of liturgical creativity). We are glad to have you join us in worship.
