

1) Background: Voluntary Local Reviews

"A Voluntary Local Review (VLR) is a process in which local and regional governments (LRGs) initiate voluntarily and assessment of their progress of implementation of the 2030 Agenda and its SDGs. This makes it possible for LRGs to share experiences, challenges, and lessons learnt as well as to open their door for new partnerships, filling the gap of means of implementation for their local vision."

(Ortiz-Moya et al. 2020).

1) Background: Voluntary Local Reviews



At first, VLRs focused on reporting progress toward fulfilling the SDGs.


But soon enough, VLRs became policy instruments to aid the work of Local and Regional Governments in localising and operationalising global agendas at the local level.

At such, VLRs work across fundamental steps to translate the SDGs to the local level, including but not limited to:

- Engaging with citizens and other stakeholders.
- Aligning local policies with the SDGs.
- Facilitating multi-level governance.
- Facilitation cross-departmental work.
- Creating a monitoring and evaluation framework.



Main benefits of conducting a VLR.

VLRs are growing as a policy instrument that goes **beyond reporting** progress. It is possible to discern different approaches to the VLR process tailored to the needs of local communities.

3) Frontiers Issues and Steps Ahead

- 1. Strengthening multi-level governances via the integration of different levels of reviews: Voluntary National Reviews Voluntary Subnational Reviews Voluntary Local Reviews.
- 2. Identify ways to translate the soft legacy of the VLR process into clear tangible outcomes. VLRs are multiplying in number, and many governments have already presented more than one VLR. But what happens after the VLR is launched?
- 3. Peer-learning and partnerships between cities to accelerate work on SDG localisation to meet the 2030 deadline.
