Treasurer's Report

1 – 3 Financial Report /1st Interim Report / Annual Audit

Sandra Reeve, director of finance, presented the financial report to the Board. She took them through the recap report that shows the financial status as of 1st Interim, which is a snapshot of August 31, 2013, against the adopted budget and actual report. (Recap report attached).

Mrs. Reeve also reported to the Board on several changes in State funding, which has not changed in an estimated 40 years. She reported that the State is equalizing funding between school districts and charter schools by implementing a new Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) funding model. The funding is estimated to take up to eight years to equalize and will increase each year by about 4%. Districts and charter schools with higher number of disadvantaged youth will get more funding according to the formula. Another funding determination that will increase charter school funding is the Class Size Reduction funds. Our schools will be able to receive these funds, but has not in the past. She provided a sample form that will be used to calculate ADA. There will be an accountability template that will used to report in March of 2014. A conservative approach will be used to reserve funds for future expenditures, STRS & PERS increases, and Bond Financing obligations. (Mrs. Reeve's full report is attached)

Cameron Curry reported to the Board that the school had no findings in the school<u>'s</u> annual audit. Mr. Curry congratulated Sandra and the Finance Team for a job well done.

2. Presentation - Leadership Institute - Lori Perez

Classical Academy Vista's principal, Lori Perez, presented the Leadership Institute to the Board. She gave an extensive explanation of the institute, that was formed three years ago, to maximize the culture while developing future leaders for the Classical Academies organization. The outline is based upon three main objectives: Developing people, setting direction of the organization, and re-designing the organization. The institute is made up of 6 workshops:

- 1. Leadership 2.0 Cameron Curry, Classical Academies Executive Director
- 2. 8 Keys of Excellence Mark Reardon, Quantum Learning CEO
- 3. Customer Service Wendy Brick, Customer Service Advantage Representative
- 4. Corporate Culture Dr. Rebecca Wilke
- 5. Business 101 Chuck Hunter with Action Coach
- 6. Make it Your Own and Presentation Lori Perez, Principal, Classical Academy Vista
- 7. *Time to Lead facilitated by Lori Perez (customized per participant)

There are 27 participants that have either graduated with a certificate or currently in the process of completing the program. (The Leadership Institute's program manual is attached)

3. Presentation - Common Core - Dr. Nancy Beeman

Classical Academies Curriculum & Instruction Director, Dr. Nancy Beeman, gave an overview about new Common Core Standards and the assessment that will be replacing the STAR test this year. She gave the Board handouts that outlined her progress, which included: staff professional development, adding support positions, curriculum changes, informing parents, tech readiness, and the actual test changes and transitions.

Dr. Beeman also informed the Board about her update public wiki page on the Internet that includes leadership conferences, rigor information, instructional strategies, and other informational links.

4. Presentation – Parent Advisory Group Update – Mark Kalpakgian

Classical Academies Community Liaison/Executive Director's Special Assistant, Mark Kalpakgian, updated the Board about the progress of the Parent Advisory Group, which was launched in response to the requirement of the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) to have parent input at the school level. He reported that the group launched with 28 parents in attendance from multiple Academy schools. The first group focus was on commendations, recommendations, and specific future expectations or concerns. The group has now since grown to around 55 parents. Some great comments from the breakout sessions included: high level of parent participation, professional staff, and discussions about pick up and drop off. Eventually, when the accountability template for the LCFF comes down from the State in March, the school will report that parents were part of recommendations on how funds are spent. Mark will also is assisting with the strategic plan with the Executive Director, Cameron Curry.

5. Annual Report to Oceanside Unified School District

Cameron Curry presented the annual report to the OUSD. (Full report attached)

Cameron Curry reported to the Board that the school is serving 1102 students, which is 2 students over budget.

Mr. Curry also informed the Board that the newly built Coastal Academy (Coastal 2.0) building is scheduled to open in February.

Board Report Education Protection Account

Background:

Proposition 30 was approved by the voters of California on November 6, 2012. Proposition 30 added Article XIII, Section 36 to the California Constitution, which not only impacts cash flow patterns in school districts but also has an accountability component. The Proposition provides that all K-14 local agencies have the sole authority to determine how the funds received from the Education Protection Account (EPA) are spent, but with the following provisions:

- 1. The Governing Board must approve the spending plan during a public meeting. For our school, this is done annually in May when the budget is reviewed and adopted.
- 2. EPA funds cannot be used for the salaries or benefits of administrators or any other administrative costs (as determined through the account code structure)
- 3. Each year, the local agency must publish on its website an accounting of how much money was received from the EPA and how the funds were expended

Report:

We will be adding this financial information to the school's public website and inform the State Department of Education that this has been completed to comply with the requirements of the legislation as a public school.

The attached resolution should be approved by the Board and the financial documents attached will be added to the school's website.

Coastal Academy Education Protection Account Resolution Resolution

WHEREAS, the voters approved Proposition 30 on November 6, 2012;

WHEREAS, Proposition 30 added Article XIII, Section 36 to the California Constitution effective November 7, 2012;

WHEREAS, the provisions of Article XIII, Section 36(e) create in the state General Fund an Education Protection Account to receive and disburse the revenues derived from the incremental increases in taxes imposed by Article XIII, Section 36(f);

WHEREAS, before June 30th of each year, the Director of Finance shall estimate the total amount of additional revenues, less refunds that will be derived from the incremental increases in tax rates made pursuant to Article XIII, Section 36(f) that will be available for transfer into the Education Protection Account during the next fiscal year;

WHEREAS, if the sum determined by the State Controller is positive, the State Controller shall transfer the amount calculated into the Education Protection Account within ten days preceding the end of the fiscal year;

WHEREAS, all monies in the Education Protection Account are hereby continuously appropriated for the support of school districts, county offices of education, charter schools and community college districts;

WHEREAS, monies deposited in the Education Protection Account shall not be used to pay any costs incurred by the Legislature, the Governor or any agency of state government;

WHEREAS, a community college district, county office of education, school district, or charter school shall have the sole authority to determine how the monies received from the Education Protection Account are spent in the school or schools within its jurisdiction;

WHEREAS, the governing board of the district shall make the spending determinations with respect to monies received from the Education Protection Account in open session of a public meeting of the governing board;

WHEREAS, the monies received from the Education Protection Account shall not be used for salaries or benefits for administrators or any other administrative cost;

WHEREAS, each community college district, county office of education, school district and charter school shall annually publish on its Internet website an accounting of how much money was received from the Education Protection Account and how that money was spent;

WHEREAS, the annual independent financial and compliance audit required of community college districts, county offices of education, school districts and charter schools shall ascertain and verify whether the funds provided from the Education Protection Account have been properly disbursed and expended as required by Article XIII, Section 36 of the California Constitution;

WHEREAS, expenses incurred by community college districts, county offices of education, school districts and charter schools to comply with the additional audit requirements of Article XIII, Section 36 may be paid with funding from the Education Protection Act and shall not be considered administrative costs for purposes of Article XIII, Section 36.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED:

- 1. The monies received from the Education Protection Account shall be spent as required by Article XIII, Section 36 and the spending determinations on how the money will be spent shall be made in open session of a public meeting of the governing board of Coastal Academy;
- 2. In compliance with Article XIII, Section 36(e), with the California Constitution, the governing board of the Coastal Academy has determined to spend the monies received from the Education Protection Act as attached.

Board Report Tutoring Policy

Background:

Leaders have been discussing support for parents and students and the topic of our current teachers being able to tutor students for private pay has been deliberated at great length. Our credentialed teachers are approached from time-to-time with a paid tutoring request from a parent whose student has been finding success under their instruction. Having vetted the process with site leaders a decision was made to approve teachers tutoring for private pay that weighs in favor of serving students and parents at the Coastal Academy.

Report:

The following rules have to be monitored carefully by site leaders to avoid actual and perceived conflicts of interest that may appear as a result of providing this service. We also have to be able to ensure that all learning resources are made available to all students to ensure their success, free of charge, so that any tutoring hours that parents seek are "above and beyond" our regular academic program, and at the parents' or student's initiative.

Information on Tutoring Services will be published as:

All Coastal Academy teachers may provide tutoring to assist students with an assignment, concept, or academic skill. Please contact your teacher for information on tutoring times available for your child. We encourage students to take advantage of the opportunity to receive tutoring from their teacher of record.

We realize, however, that parents or students may seek additional tutoring or may want tutoring that takes place outside the school day. Coastal Academy teachers may provide such tutoring for compensation from parents or students, if ALL of the following conditions are upheld:

- 1. The teacher is not the teacher af record for the student that is being tutored.
- 2. The parent makes the initial request in writing.
- 3. The tutoring takes place on campus after school hours during evenings or on weekends, or off-campus when the teacher is not being compensated for working for the Classical Academies.

4. Hours and terms of payment are between the teacher and the parent.

Action Required by the Board:

I would encourage the Board's approval of this item, and once approved, will become part of the employee handbook.
