2021—A Year of Contrast

The contrast between the summer of 2020 and this year is remarkable. The COVID-19 pandemic had a major impact on tourism in 2020. Although the pandemic is still present in 2021, with the delta variant becoming increasingly prevalent, tourism has rebounded amazingly.

Last year, the museum and hall of fame were closed to the public from mid-March until mid-June. The gift shop reopened to the public five days a week during May. The Matchless Mine reopened Memorial Day weekend, as usual, but only five days a week until it closed for the season in mid-August due to the hoist house's historic preservation project. The museum and hall of fame reopened six days a week from mid-June until mid-August, then seven days a week until the end of October, and finally five days a week through the end of the year. The museum had only 10,027 visitors, 53% of the 2019 number. Matchless Mine admissions during 2020 totaled 1,892, only 45% of the 2019 level.

This year, we had our best June and July admissions numbers to the museum and hall of fame

since before 2011, and our best August since 2012. From January through August, we had 15,074 visitors, an 11% increase over 2019. The Miners' Pick gift shop sales were higher for April through August than they had been since 2013, with a 59% increase for the year over 2019. Not only were people ready to travel again in 2021, but they also had money to spend!

A continuing impact of the pandemic was a very tight labor market. We were not able to hire as many summer employees as needed, so it was a struggle to keep the museum and hall of fame open seven days a week. We could only open the Matchless Mine five days a week, even though demand was high enough to keep it open daily.

So far in 2021, admissions to the Matchless have totaled 2,456, which is 75% of the 2019 level.

Each of our staff put in many extra hours, this summer performing more than their own jobs, and with the help of our extraordinary volunteers, we were able to make it through the summer season. The staff of the National Mining Hall of Fame and Museum looks forward to the day when the pandemic will be history. We send our thoughts and best wishes to all those who have been affected in any way by COVID-19.

The NMHFM helped arrange a lunch buffet for this group, and the museum was able to remain open to visitors during that timespan.

Fred Mark has been generously donating his time and talents to the NMHFM for many years. He has helped with everything from showing children how to pan for gold

to identifying mineral specimens that have been hiding in closets for far too long.

Fred is a geologist (retired, he says) and a historian who has done an extraordinary amount of research on mining, especially in the Leadville Mining District.

Before the summer tourist season started, Fred undertook a project that provides benefit to the entire Leadville community, and to those visitors who want to experience even more of the local mining history.

Fred created a site:

www.routeofthesilverkings.org that includes a summary of the history of 34 sites and structures along a 21-mile driving route in the Leadville mining district. A map of the route in cartographic or illustrated format can be downloaded or viewed. The route can also be followed virtually with real

time GPS location in Google Maps, Avenza and Global Mapper Mobile formats. The site also includes a guide to the geology and mineral deposits along the Mineral Belt Trail.

Fred did not charge the community anything to create this visitor experience, but performed the work and put it into the public domain at his own expense.

Over the past few months, Fred has been working with Curator Jordan Bennett on the much anticipated scenic panels that will soon be installed on our balcony. The panels provide orientation to our visitors, identifying specific mountain peaks and historic sites for those enjoying the view.

If that wasn't enough, Fred even consented to working out at the Matchless Mine on numerous

occasions this year, ringing up admissions on an archaic cash register!

Fred's wife Sandra, also a retired geologist, recently joined the National Mining Hall of Fame & Museum's Board of Directors.

As part of her commitment to the Board, she is serving on two



Funding Sought for Children's Interactive Exhibit

The NMHFM is undertaking a fundraising campaign to create a new children's bilingual (English/Spanish) interactive mining exhibit. Tax -deductible donations from our loyal members will augment support from foundations and corporations for the exhibit.

With funding from The Summit Foundation and the FLSmidth international engineering firm, M. Catton & Co., a museum exhibit design company, worked with museum staff members to develop a pre-conceptual design package for the exhibit. The package includes color sketches, a preliminary script, and a price tag of \$415,058. The goal is to redesign and configure first-floor museum gallery spaces (ca. 809 sq. ft.) into an engaging, educational, and kid-friendly exhibit. The exhibit will explain key takehome messages identified in our 2019 interpretive plan. These include how:

 Mining and minerals are fundamental to our quality of life.

- Technological innovation and expertise are essential to
- mining success.
- Today's mining industry is committed to safety and environmental responsibility.



The exhibit will also encourage visitors to think of careers in mining, metallurgy, geology, engineering, and associated fields as safe, high-paying, and



important for sustaining our society, now and in the future.

The NMHFM's staff is working to develop exciting new exhibits to increase post-pandemic attendance and income back to 2019 levels or better. The proposed

exhibit is a central pillar of that effort because it will attract more families with children to visit and will help us fulfill our mission for a larger and more diverse audience. Depending on the success of the fundraising campaign, installation will occur as early as the summer of 2023. We anticipate an opening date for the exhibit of October 2023.
