

NPS and NPS Foundation representatives visit world-class organizations to drive a culture of innovation





Over the last month, representatives from the Naval Postgraduate School and the Naval Postgraduate School Foundation visited world-class industry and academic facilities throughout the Southern and Central California region as well as the Washington-Metro area. The visits, which were funded and facilitated by the NPS Foundation, presented an opportunity for NPS faculty and staff to be immersed in innovative, best-in-class environments and to imagine what is in the art of the possible for NPS.

The sites in California included Silicon Valley's Microsoft's Innovation Campus and Apple's Apple Park and Southern California's Anduril Industries, Applied Minds Inc, and the University of

California at Irvine Beall Applied Innovation center. The visits to the Washington-Metro area included the Marine Corps Wargaming and Analysis Center, Hopper Hall at the U.S. Naval Academy, Johns Hopkins University Applied Physics Lab, Virginia Tech Innovation Campus, the Cyber Bytes Foundation Quantico Cyber Hub, National Intelligence University, Raytheon Technologies, and Lockheed Martin's Global Vision Center.

Following each of these visits, NPS representatives discussed their observations with fellow NPS faculty and staff to energize the campus and explore how to incorporate best practices for innovative and collaborative environments into the vision for NPS. Identifying the critical common elements are key to creating and sustaining an enterprise culture that encourages and rewards education, and innovation. <u>25th Member of NPS Hall of Fame</u>



The Naval Postgraduate
School welcomed the
Honorable Robert O. Work,
32nd Deputy Secretary of
Defense and acclaimed
national security
professional, into the
school's prestigious Hall of
Fame during a ceremony in
Herrmann Hall, Sept. 22,
recognizing his lifetime of
service to the United States.

Work, a 1990 graduate of NPS, becomes the latest inductee into the Hall of Fame, established to recognize the accomplishments of NPS' most distinguished alumni and friends who, through the attainment of positions at the highest levels of public service, have made the greatest contributions to society, to their nations, and to NPS.

"I am honored, happy and humbled to be recognized with this award," Work said. "I'm honored because of all the academic institutions I've attended, I consider the Naval Postgraduate School to be the best one yet."

After a 27-year career as a U.S. Marine Corps officer, Work went on to hold two of the most prestigious titles in the Department of Defense, serving as Under Secretary of the Navy and later returning to the Pentagon as the 32nd Deputy Secretary of Defense. During his tenure as Deputy Secretary of Defense from 2014 to 2017, Work led DOD efforts to focus on technological areas such as artificial intelligence and machine learning. "Our students have a wide range of outlets to pursue education and research in Al and machine learning, and it is Mr. Work who has led that," said Rondeau. "In the cognitive era of strategic competition, both education and technology, as well as strategic thinking, are all important to the military's education and our decision advantage." Read more.

Former Deputy Secretary of Defense Challenges NPS Students to Forge the Future of Warfare

The Honorable Robert O. Work, NPS alumnus and 32nd Deputy Secretary of Defense, served as the guest speaker for a commencement ceremony honoring 270 graduates,

NPS President retired Vice Adm. Ann E. Rondeau congratulated the assembled students on their efforts and achievements – while also reminding them that their journey is not over yet.

"Our mission has been to prepare you," Rondeau added. "It is your mission, now, to deliver. The NPS degree that you get today signals to everybody that you not only increased your knowledge, but that you have distinguished yourself and your ability to apply that knowledge to higher thought and higher results. You will be in demand."

In his remarks, Work acknowledged the challenges faced by the United States, including neverbefore-seen technological advances by strategic competitors like China.

"You are joining the force in a time of unprecedented strategic and technological flux and turbulence," said Work. "It's going to require all hands on deck to try to figure out how we get through this."

But Work also expressed confidence in the ability of NPS graduates and faculty members to help address these challenges and others which lie ahead. Read more.



NPS Research Assistant receives competitive ONR Young Investigator Program grant

Congratulations to Dr. **David Ortiz-Suslow**, Research
Assistant Professor in NPS'
Dept. of Meteorology, one
of 25 researchers selected
to receive a highlycompetitive Office of Naval
Research Young Investigator
Program (YIP) grant. The YIP

awards target early career academics whose areas of research show significant promise for naval applications.

Ortiz-Suslow's research focuses on marine aerosol loading on the atmospheric surface layer, leading to advanced validation and testing of naval atmospheric forecasting models relevant to climate and weather prediction, and electromagnetic weapon systems (high-energy lasers, radar, IR, etc.) deployed in the Fleet. Ortiz-Suslow was a recipient of NPS Foundation SEED Funding in 2021 for his project "Monterey Bay: A Geophysical Lab for improving Coastal Environment Prediction."



We are saddened to hear that NPS alumnus, Col. Vance Klosinski, passed away on Sept. 24.

A native of Stevens Point, Wis., Klosinski began his US
Army career as an infantry platoon leader with the 10th
Mountain Division and later qualified as a Special Forces
officer. His deployments took him to Afghanistan, Iraq,
Bosnia-Herzegovina and the Philippines, among other places.
He most recently served as the Garrison Commander for U.S.
Army Garrison Rheinland-Pfalz in Germany. Klosinski
graduated from the Naval Postgraduate School in December
2009 with an MS in Defense Analysis.

Alumni Updates

On September 19, 2022, the Secretary of Defense, Lloyd Austin announced U.S. Navy Rear Adm. **John Wade**, MS in Information Systems Technology '96, as the Commander of the Joint Task Force – Red Hill.

Wade is currently the director of operations, J3, for U.S. Indo-Pacific Command, a role he's had since October 2020. As the commander of the task force, which was set up to oversee the defeuling of the Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility, Wade will be responsible for working with the Environmental Protection Agency, the community and the Hawaii Health Department.

"The Department of Defense and the United States Navy remain focused on the health and safety of our military families and the people of Hawaii, and I have confidence that Rear Adm. Wade will continue to do everything to protect the population, the environment, and the security of the nation," Austin said in his statement.



On Tuesday, Sept. 13, the Office of Naval Research held a change-of-office ceremony for NavalX, a partner organization within the command. The ceremony welcomed new NavalX Director Capt. Casey Plew, Master of Business Administration '16, who took the reins from Capt. Benjamin Van Buskirk, Master of Business Administration '07.




NavalX serves the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps as an innovation and agility cell, supporting and connecting initiatives across the DOD. The organization enables collaboration; accelerates the pace of discovery, learning and experimentation; and fosters the naval workforce's capacity for innovation and agility.

"Capt. Van Buskirk has done an outstanding job of taking NavalX from a start-up environment to an established organization with codified processes and procedures for innovation," said Plew. "I look forward to building on the valuable work he's done by using those processes to bolster innovation partnerships, find game-changing ideas and technologies, get them into requirements for acquisition, and ultimately deliver them as capabilities to warfighters." Chief. Costamagna had been serving as the deputy
fire chief of technical services. He will take on the
new role immediately, the city said in a release on

department with 700 employees and a \$173 million
budget.

Costamagna joined the department on Sept. 11, 1995, and has also served as assistant chief of special operations, operations shift commander, battalion chief, in-service training captain and drill instructor for the department's training academy. He also has experience overseeing FEMA Urban Search and Rescue California Task Force 7 and helped develop a state urban search and rescue training group.



Retired U.S. Navy Capt. **H. Thomas Workman**, MS in Operations Research '96, has been named Director of Bureau of Land Management National Operations Center. As the director of the National Operations Center, Workman will oversee approximately 300 employees and contractors that provide operational and technical mission support to BLM staff and collaborators in the areas of financial management, human resources, geospatial services and land and natural resources management.

Workman, who begins his new position in mid-October, has worked in both the public and private sectors and has decades of experience in leading people, leading change, driving results, building coalitions and overall organization success. During 30 years of service in the U.S. Navy, he commanded three warships and a Destroyer Squadron at sea. He also developed, resourced and implemented critical policy, personnel and budget objectives across the U.S. Navy's Surface Force ashore. Read more.
