
Engage Every Learner

In the 2022-23 academic year, Lead Guitar served 6,432 students through 242 daily to twice-weekly classes at 92 schools across the U.S. Year-over-year our total number of students grew by 47%. That means more kids from historically underserved communities coming together at their school to make music. The data shows that those students are also finding their tribes, broadening their horizons, and improving focus, grades and attendance as they engage through Lead Guitar classes and events.





Impacts

What Changed for the Students Who Participated?

In the 2022-23 school year, teachers reported that their partnership with Lead Guitar contributed to the growth of their students in the following areas:

89% saw growth in students' resilience in overcoming obstacles or challenges.

68% saw a reduction in incidents of adverse behavior.

93% agreed that they witnessed growth in students' ability to collaborate and work as a team; 52% "strongly agreed."

88% saw an improved attitude towards accountability.

Teachers witnessed students adopting collaborative behaviors through Lead Guitar classes. Responding with frequently, sometimes, rarely or never:

70% of teachers reported students "frequently" volunteering to answer questions or share ideas.

68% reported students "frequently" offering to help a struggling classmate.

71.5% "frequently" or "sometimes" witnessed students teaching others guitar outside of class.

62.5% "frequently" or "sometimes" learned of students teaching family members at home.

Other meaningful impacts:

Only 34% of teachers at schools in major U.S. urban areas stay as long as five years [NYU Steinhardt]. 78% of Lead Guitar school programs last five years or longer.

93% of participating School Teachers saw improvement in student focus and engagement that they believe is attributable to collaboration with Lead Guitar.

New Region: Detroit

Inspired Giving: Three Donors' Vision of Lead Guitar in Detroit

When Board Member Dan Bueschel proposed Detroit as a Lead Guitar hub just over a year ago, Brad Richter knew it was a perfect fit in terms of mission. It was also strategically located just four hours by car from Chicago, already a major operations hub. But what Dan was bringing to the table was more than a good idea in terms of strategic growth, he had been collaborating with his friends Peter Mogk and Brian Demkowicz to put together a gift that would cover the cost of setting up Lead Guitar programming in Detroit and the first two years of services to schools.

Dan is CEO of Pueblo (a Modigent Company) and a professional bass player. He said of his gift for Detroit: "playing music has been my lifelong friend. The opportunity to share the gift with others is why Lead Guitar inspired the contribution." Brian and Peter, colleagues

at Huron Capital in Detroit, saw an opportunity to make a positive impact in some of their city's most underresourced schools. Brian is a life-long guitarist and guitar collector, and, like Dan, sees parallels between the skills music develops in young people and key life and career skills. Peter serves his community through a dizzying variety of board appointments, from his alma mater university, to local youth sports, and a community hunger program.

Lead Guitar is also grateful to our partners at Detroit Public Schools Community District and leaders like **Andrew McGuire** who are an essential part of pinpointing and giving access to the kids who can benefit most from our services, like those at Casimir Pulaski Elementary/Middle School which will receive double service hours from Lead Guitar to cover 100 students in five guitar classes. Pulaski is in an area of the city particularly hard hit by Detroit's socioeconomic and population decline in the decades leading up to the city's bankruptcy in 2013. Lead Guitar is honored to be a part of their effort to create a great learning environment for neighborhood kids.

Our work in Pulaski and other DPSCD schools in 2023-24 is led by **Dr. Onur Alakavuklar**. He holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Guitar Performance with a Jazz-emphasized minor in Music Education from Indiana University.

Pillar 1: Classroom Instruction and Curriculum

Lead Guitar has assembled an international team of Teaching Artists: global concert musicians, Fulbright Scholars, and professors with a passion for mentorship. They collaborate with certified K-12 teachers to co-teach in-school guitar ensemble classes using Lead Guitar's proprietary curriculum and Lead Guitar Digital: a library of instructional videos, lesson plans, and extension activities accessible from any device.

Lauren started a Lead Guitar program at Ambrose Plamondon Elementary School and recently brought the program to her new position at Foster Park Elementary School

What inspired you to partner with Lead Guitar?

Luckily, the Regional Director (Denis) reached out to me. Unfortunately, it was during the 2021 school year and because of the aftermath of Covid, the principal did not add Lead Guitar on her priority list. However, Denis kept in touch in hopes we could establish a partnership for the next school year and I made it my business to push for Lead Guitar.

When you changed schools, why did you bring the Lead Guitar program?

I witnessed firsthand all of the hard work pay off in one year of working with Lead Guitar. I have been working as a music teacher since 2009 in Chicago and many schools don't even have a space for a music class, let alone instruments. All students deserve access to quality instruction and the fact that Lead Guitar is providing this at no cost to students was a no brainer. The principal at my new school has a desire to really put emphasis on performing arts and I have no doubt that Lead Guitar will bring out the performers in the students.

How has working with Lead Guitar impacted you as an educator?

This was my first time learning how to play guitar. Going to PD's and having these professional guitar players be patient and offer feedback was pretty cool. My favorite was when all the teachers brought guitars and got to jam together. Even though I played the beginners version of every song, I still played!

How has participation in the Lead Guitar program impacted your students?

I have seen students who previously showed little interest in music try their hardest to master guitar. I also believe having an additional arts teacher emphasizes the effect music can have on lives. Sara had a completely different path than I did and the students enjoyed looking at music through both of our professional lenses.

How has your partnership with Lead Guitar helped build community?

Our partnership strengthened the community inside and outside of Plamondon. During free time or recess, students would ask to come up to the music room and play. Parents would email me and share that their child(ren) would be looking forward to the next assembly because they were more confident playing instruments in an ensemble.

Any last thoughts you'd like to share?

I am just really appreciative of Lead Guitar and their commitment to enriching the lives of children. Not only has this partnership made me a better educator, but now I can add playing guitar under my list of superpowers!

In addition to co-teaching with our content experts, planning sessions, and private lessons, our Teachers' Workshops offer K-12 teachers formal Professional Development towards promotion and recertification as they master the Lead Guitar curriculum and improve their own playing. This work is the key to making our programs sustainable.

Teacher Feature

BAMBI NEAL Denver, CO

What inspired you to partner with Lead Guitar?

After my first year teaching, I met with a group of parents to talk about what they liked about the music program and what they might like to see in the future. Their big ask was wanting their children to learn how to play the guitar. The following year I received an email from Nick Lenio introducing Lead Guitar and the rest is history.

What are some of the challenges you face that partnership with Lead Guitar helps to address?

In my school, 90% of my students are learning English as a second language, so they are tasked with processing two languages for 8 hours a day. They often struggle from a social emotional perspective: thinking they are not learning fast enough, that they are slower than their English-speaking peers or "not smart." Having two teachers in the room providing different levels of instruction, and options for parts with different levels of difficulty, has been a game changer. We have observed that the sooner students feel successful and confident in their playing the more willing they are to be challenged and open to trying new things.

How has working with Lead Guitar impacted you as an educator?

Having the opportunity to work, plan and collaborate with another musician on a weekly basis has had a tremendous impact on me as an educator. Because we have different relationships with students, we are able to give each other different insight and perspective when challenges arise. My co-teacher is a professional guitar player and has helped me improve both my playing and teaching skills. I am able to help my co-teacher with thoughts on sequencing, pacing, and classroom management, and most of it is occurring in real time, I am not having to take time out of my day to go to a training session.

How has participation in the Lead Guitar program impacted your students?

If I had to give a one-word answer, I would say confidence. Having two teachers available to support them from the start has been like fire. We hear comments like "come hear this sound I just figured out, listen to this, I just wrote this, can we try this next, I think we can do this better." They are jumping from knowledge and comprehension to synthesis and evaluation at the speed of light. Light bulbs are going off, their eyes are as big as saucers and you know that they know... No matter what else happens that day, they nailed it in music.

How has your partnership with Lead Guitar helped build community?


Lead Guitar was able to fill a need in our community. Most of our families have someone who plays the guitar, and they have been very excited and supportive of their students learning to play classical guitar. This year we had our first Guitar Showcase which featured our 5th grade students playing for their families for the first time, which was super exciting. The community support for this event was humbling and beautiful.

Any last thoughts you'd like to share?

I love having Lead Guitar as another tool for my students. What I most appreciate is that they [Lead Guitar] were willing to come in and teach me and my students. I did not have to figure out on my own how I was going to learn how to play guitar well enough so I could teach my students.

Pillar 3: In-School Assemblies and We Are Guitar

Global touring guitarists perform for, dialogue with, and inspire students in person, right at their own school, while our interactive We Are Guitar broadcast (in partnership with Guitar Salon International) provides an online forum for students nationwide to learn from, interview, and perform with guitar celebrities.

Lead Guitar's interactive YouTube broadcast **We Are Guitar** connects students with guitar luminaries to talk, learn, and jam together before a worldwide audience of enthusiasts. It is an inclusive show in every sense, welcoming music and musicians of all traditions, and celebrating hard-working students of all abilities.

The show is recorded on location at Guitar Salon International in Santa Monica, CA and features student soloists and commentators, classroom ensembles and a virtual guitar orchestra with as many as 250 students playing alongside celebrity guest artists like two-time Emmy-winning composer Carlos Rafael Rivera (*The Queen's Gambit*) and Curt Chambers, Grammy-winning singer/songwriter and guitarist for Alicia Keys, Dr. Dre and Eminem. Episodes are produced twice a year.





Our Team: Staff Members

Dr. Onur Alakavuklar (Regional Director – Detroit) holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Guitar Performance with a Jazz-emphasized minor in Music Education from Indiana University Jacobs School of Music. Onur has claimed prizes in chamber music competitions and has performed with The Atlanta Opera, Indiana University Philharmonic Orchestra, and various chamber music groups internationally. Onur holds a Master of Music from Texas State University and a Bachelor of Music from Yasar University in Izmir, Turkey. Onur also composes and arranges novel classical and jazz guitar works for his upcoming solo recording album for Naxos in 2024.

Dror Arussi (Teaching Artist – Atlanta/Athens) is a committed and devoted music educator, working with diverse students of all ages and levels. As a versatile guitar player, Dror has performed extensively in Israel and in the U.S. In addition to guitar, he plays the piano and other various string instruments, such as the dobro, mandolin, and bass. Dror holds a B.Ed in music education, M.M. and is currently completing a doctoral degree in guitar performance.

Denis Azabagic (Regional Director – Chicago, he/his) performs concerts around the world, maintaining a balance between his solo recitals, chamber music with the Cavatina Duo and Fandango quartet, and engagements as a soloist with orchestras. Azabagic's love for performing extends to sharing with others his knowledge of music making. He frequently offers master classes on tour, teaches at the University of Illinois-Chicago and is the Program Director for Guitar, Percussion and Harp at Roosevelt University in Chicago.

Dr. Keith Barnhart (Teaching Artist – Denver, he/his) was a self-starter at age 13 when he began playing rock and roll, but fell in love with classical/finger-style guitar in high school. Keith is very actively teaching guitar, mandolin and ukulele through private lessons and multiple organizations. He also performs on early plucked instruments with local chamber groups, and works part time as a Certified Music Practitioner (therapeutic music) in a local hospital.



Isaac Brady (Teaching Artist – Phoenix) is a soloist, chamber musician, arranger, and educator. He believes in preserving the music of diverse cultures and implementing them into his performing and teaching repertoire. Isaac has performed in a range of ensembles including jazz combos, classical guitar ensembles, pit orchestras for musicals, and old-time bands. Isaac is working towards his Doctorate of Musical Arts, and has completed his Masters in guitar performance at Shenandoah Conservatory and his Bachelors at West Virginia University.

Russ Callison (Teaching Artist – Denver) sold a pig to buy his first guitar at the tender age of 16. Russ has performed extensively through the US & abroad, including as soloist at the soundON Festival in San Diego, off-Broadway in New York, a residency in France with his duo Solazur, tour of Scotland with duo Derelict Hands, and at the Bali Arts Festival (PKB) in 2019 as member of Gamelan Tunas Mekar. He has released two albums, first by guitar duo Derelict Hands, 'Eyes to the Future', and the second by guitar/cello duo Solazur, 'Mercurial.'

Michel Chatara-Morse (Teaching Artist – Chicago)

Doris Ćosić (Teaching Artist – Los Angeles) is a Slovenian guitarist, arranger, and educator. She is passionate about creating music outreach opportunities in her community, and frequently performs at the chemotherapy clinic at the LA General Medical Center. She also works at Virtual Guitar Orchestra as an assistant editor, where she created the very first all-women Virtual Guitar Orchestra in collaboration with Grammy-nominated Clarice Assad. She received her Bachelor of Music at University of Southern California and is currently pursuing a master's degree at USC.

Christian Cruz (Regional Director – Los Angeles) is a Mexican-American classical guitarist and composer.
