

Learning about Trees Helps Children to Learn



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Meet A West Lafayette Tree Friend Don Franzmeier



to the climate and soil of this area. Trees being trialed include a variegated black gum and a thornless, fruitless Osage orange. Tags and information about each tree will be available.

The West Lafayette Tree Friends, Purdue Student Society of Arboriculture and the Parks and Recreation Department will assist with the planting. Mayor John Dennis will read the official Arbor Day Proclamation.

Arbor Day began in 1805 when a Spanish priest, according to various sources, was "convinced of the importance of trees for health, hygiene, decoration, nature, the environment, and customs [and decided] to plant trees." In dozens of countries around the world and hundreds of cities in the United States, people continue to plant trees on Arbor Day for similar reasons.
