Tree Friend Honored

WLTF Steve Green, recipient of West Lafayette Volunteer Recognition Award, received praise from Mayor John Dennis for his contributions to the City:

"Money makes things happen and Steve Green makes money happen. His volunteer grant writing efforts have successfully raised over \$100,000 for the community for items such as: the shade sail and dining court at the West Lafayette Farmers Market (WLFM): a robust marketing program of WLFM with banners, bus tails, radio spots, and social media: future planting islands with shade trees at the WLFM; 153 new trees in Prophets Ridge, Barberry Heights and Amberleigh Village; 90 trees in Blackbird Farms; 30 trees in a Tree Trial on Kalberer Road; future updates to citywide street tree

inventory and management; and public art projects.



Additionally, Steve volunteers with both the WLFM and W L Tree Friends. You can find him setting up the market, tweaking vendor contracts, pruning street trees, or planting Tribute Trees when he's not writing grants.

Steve retired from the Krannert School of Management after serving the University for 25 years as an accomplished professor. Prior to Purdue, Steve was a faculty member at the University of Cincinnatti for 11 years. He is also a U S Navy veteran. Steve loves to read, hike, bike, travel,

watch Purdue sports, and spend time with his family (Helen, his high school sweetheart/wife, two sons in the Indy area, one daughter-in-law, and three grandsons, 8, 5, 3 years old). The entire City benefits from Steve's unselfish gifts of time and talent, and for that we award him the recognition he is due."

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
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Approved Street Tree

Not all trees are a good fit to be "street trees". A list of approved trees as well as landscape trees for yards can be found on the city website by clicking here. Here is another example of an approved street tree.

Why Do Trees Need To Be Pruned?

In a forest, trees simply grow whichever way their circumstances allow and a mature forest is a beautiful sight. The trees take care of themselves. However, the urban landscape is a very different setting. We want the trees in our yards to be healthy, attractive and to present no risks to our families or passersby. The first important consideration occurs before a tree is even planted. Whenever you buy a new tree for your property, be aware of its probable height and width at maturity. If a tree is too large for the setting it will require much more pruning to remain properly sized. Remember that each cut is an injury from which the tree must heal.



However, for most homeowners the trees came with the house. For them the most important reason to prune a tree is to reduce risk by maintaining its health. This is done by ensuring that the tree has a single central leader, by removing dead or broken branches and by cutting out branches which are rubbing against each other. The best time to do this corrective pruning is when the tree is young. This greatly improves the chances your tree will be an asset to your property as it matures. Always contact a professional arborist if you have concerns about a large mature tree.

If you want to prune a street tree, you need to call Bev Shaw at 775-5161 to get a (free) permit. And if you want help or advice about a street tree, the Tree Friends are ready and willing. We can do work on street trees only from the ground, but we can help with proper pruning for young trees and clearance pruning for older trees.
