### **PLANTERS, PRUNERS, PROTECTORS**



The mission statement of the WL Tree Friends is succinctly stated in the title - to be planters, pruners, and protectors of the street trees in West Lafayette, which are an important part of our urban forest. We work with the City of West Lafayette in carrying out our mission.

Once a year, in November, we make a direct appeal to tree lovers to donate to our work. We do a lot of hands-on work - such as pruning in the Fall and Spring, watering in the Summer - but when there are needs for new trees, we must have cash!

Contributions from you, your friends and neighbors have helped provide the funding for replacing ash trees in public places that were lost to the emerald ash borers. There are continued needs for new trees, both for replacing the lost trees, and extending the street tree presence.

Because of competition for young trees to replace the lost ash trees, the average cost of a young tree has risen nearly 33% over the past year. The present cost is

# NEW SIGNS FOR TREE TRIAL ALONG KALBERER ROAD

In partnership with the Purdue Arboretum, new signs are now displayed along the West Lafayette Tree Friends Tree Trial on Kalberer Road from the entrance to the community garden past Yeager Road. Our goal is to better educate residents on what species were selected, as well as why they are being put to the test! A large QR code is located on each sign, which will direct the user to the <u>Purdue Arboretum Explorer</u> web site, providing information about each species and cultivar. The webpage will also highlight where trees can be found on Purdue University's campus. To use the signs, follow these easy steps:



1. Using your phone's camera, center the QR code on your screen.

2. Depending on your phone you



will be able to touch a link that will take you to that particular tree's page, where you can learn more about the cultivar.

## WEATHER LORE: CAN ACORNS PREDICT A HARSH WINTER?

There is much weather lore predicting coming winter seasons: mild, snowy, or downright harsh. One of these natural forecasting tales is that a heavy acorn crop predicts a harsh winter. The idea is that if the acorn crop this year is plentiful, prepare for a snowy, cold winter ahead and more food for wildlife to feed from. If the crop is lighter, a milder winter is in store. This year, we are hearing of an exceptionally heavy acorn crop.

Scientifically speaking, there is no peer reviewed research that shows any correlation between acorn crop and weather. What causes some years to have a particularly heavy crop? Some oaks, produce acorns during one growing season. Other oaks, produce their acorn crop in two growing seasons. Other factors, such as late frost, can have a large impact on oaks that produce acorns one growing season, rather than those that produce a crop in two growing seasons. Genetics play an important role as well. Based on genetics and the other oaks nearby, acorn production can vary.

Will it be a harsh winter? We'll just have to wait and see.
