

Simple Research Tips for the PACT Universal Search Tool

Our archive contain nearly a million documents and is rapidly growing. Begin your research by quickly seeing what is available. You will use our Universal Search Module. With the USM you will discover what information our archive contains about your subject.

There is a large icon in the lower center part of the PACT screen. It is labeled the “Universal Search Module” (USM). We always start here. Click on the icon and the Dialog Search Form appears. In its dialog box enter a key word or words. A key word is a word or number that the computer will use to search through our database tables. A list of the documents, photos or maps in our archive that have this key word or words in their description will then appear in the File List Form.

In this example we will research the historic Byron Hot Springs. Enter “**hot springs**” as our key word or words. We keep it simple since Byron Hot Springs had several names and we want to collect all the information available.

Click on the “Continue” button.” Choose “Search All Tables” on the pop up menu. In a minute or so a new form will appear containing a listing of all the documents, photos and maps that have in their description the words, “**hot springs**.” This is the File List Form.

This File List Form lists the data files that you found. The first two fields going from left to right

give a brief description of the file. The last field tells you in what table the information is contained.

Single click on the first field and a new form appears as shown below. This is the Data Information Form which gives you the location of the files and detailed record information so that you can decide whether to examine or purchase the actual document or graphic.

Below is an example of a Data Information Form with additional information on this

particular file. In this case there is also button, "View Photo," that allows you to see the photo for possible purchase. On this form is all the information required to retrieve the file or document.

There are three buttons on the left side of the File List Form. The button, "View/Print," allows you to view and print the file information listing found in a particular table on the "pop down" menu.

My delay in answering, and my apparent confusion, however, raised me in their estimation. They now held me as a western desperado, too modest to confess his crimes. The English have quite a passion for the occidental ruffian.

I saw now so vividly how great had been my neglect to have lived full sixteen years in the roughest, wildest, most lawless camps in California, without killing at least one man; to have lived where the "shooting scrape" was a semi-weekly institution; where every one went "hecked" with derringers, knives, and revolvers; where the great pier-glass behind the bar at the Long Tom Saloon was trebled in value by the bullet-hole through it, sent thither during a controversy between Dr. B. and the sheriff. OF OFFENSE ADVERTISING.—The Massachusetts Legislature has passed a law against the defacement of nature. This, we take it, applies to the advertisements upon rocks, on boards upon trees, and the general obtrusion of the notices of quack medicine vendors all along the lines of our railways. It is quite time such a law was enacted in all our New England States. Some of the very finest bits of landscape are rendered worthless, comparatively, to the observer, by the daubs of paint thrust upon the sight in or on the most salient point. We have in mind now a spot where within a few rods there is, in the summer and autumn, a combination of views seldom seen. The water, the flowering bushes, the evergreen black ground of gray rock, the bright, refreshing and attractive. But on this rock, over which the green vines and red variegated leaves trail so gracefully in the September days, and which of itself is a conspicuous object, there is a sprawling, parti-colored advertisement of Indian bitters. As if the fences and the boulders and barns were not enough, these "fellows of the baser sort" take possession of every available spot, regardless alike of the laws of trespass and aesthetics. If the people would enter into a solemn league and covenant never to purchase anything so advertised, the evil would soon be cured; and the landscape would be as it was before.
