
No Christian can hope to reap the good that comes

Maranatha Village Board Changes

FINANCIAL REPORT

March 31, 2012 Asset Balance Sheet

CURRENT ASSETS INCREASED 2.1% -

The same as all last year. Due to normal increase in First Quarter income from Promos.

FIXED ASSETS DECREASED 0.3% -

Building and equipment depreciation was very even with improvements and replacements made. The small increase in cost of new building, equipment and "building in progress" made the slight difference. This was much less than last year.

TOTAL ASSETS INCREASED 0.6% -

This is the total of Current and Fixed Assets. It was much better than the 1% decrease of Assets for last year. This is due to Current Asset increase.

CURRENT LIABILITIES INCREASED 40.5% -

These go up and down in normal functions.

LONG TERM LIABILITY DECREASED 1.4% -

These liabilities are the Occupancy Bonds and specific reserve funds. This decrease was due to more bonds being redeemed than issued.

TOTAL LIABILITIES DECREASED 1.4% -

This is from the long term decrease.

ALL EQUITIES INCREASED 0.6%

This is the report of Current Village Assets Less Liabilities as compared to 12/31/2011.

The Lord has guided Maranatha Village into another year. He will continue as we faithfully minister to those whom He directs to our fellowship. We are thankful that Maranatha Village belongs to the Lord, Who is watching over us, even

as He is over our nation and the whole world. Our sovereign God loves us and provides what is best for us.

Our Night of Appreciation to our President Earle C. Harriman

We're here this evening to commemorate Earle Harriman for all that he has provided the Village in his years serving in the Village Office and as Director/Secretary of the Board of Directors and then as President of the Board.

But first, I want to help each of you to get the vision of what this Village means to those of us who really see the Village from the inside out.

We are a blessed people because of Floyd Conway, the first President of the Village, the individual with the vision. I marvel at how he initiated the structure of the by-laws and operation of the Village. This happened 39 years ago. The Village was established April 13, 1973.

I am intrigued by the layout of the complete Village. You, the residents, don't see the complexity of the underground sewer system, the potable water integrated piping that is instrumental throughout the village; the financial program of the occupancy bonds, enablement to be redeemed, and its reliability in this day and age. It will continue as long as the Village is in existence. That, my friends, we attribute to Floyd Conway.

Cecil Akam served our Village as President from 1985 through 1989, and additional years as a Director. His contribution to the Village was to put it on a firm financial base and built additional apartments in the Village.

Paul Whipple served as President from 1990 through 1996. Even before he moved to the Village, he was instrumental in the mobile home park expansion. But what I will remember as the greatest asset that Paul contributed to the Village was to bring Earle Harriman onto the office staff.

Earle definitely has a heart for the well being and the continuation of the Village. It was through his watchful eye that our Village is in the successful financial situation that we enjoy today. I marvel at the time he has spent working within our investment program, the conversations that he spends with our broker, the calculations that he goes through to bring this information to you, the residents of Maranatha Village in the Trumpet each issue.

The Village budget is in the neighborhood of \$850,000.00 this year. Our Village is insured for \$12,525,000.00, with the land value of 213 acres in addition. We have \$1,350,000.00 invested money from occupancy bonds that is used when bonds are redeemed. Someone is responsible to oversee these financial funds. That has been Earle.

He has been a great mentor for me since I came in 2001. I have received counsel from him many times these last ten and three quarter years.

He is really the individual who is the glue that holds the Village operation together. I make the decisions, the office staff and maintenance crew carry out assignments, but it is the guidance and support that I have received from Earle Harriman that has enabled me to continue directing your Village at this time.

Earle joined the staff in 1991 and became Board President in 1997 and has remained in that position until this past February. He retired from the office staff in December

April 27, 2012

2010 and now only pops in to sign checks and investigate the financial aspects of the business.

Earle, I am certain that I speak for the Village office staff, the maintenance crew, the Board of Directors, and the entire residency of Maranatha Village. We appreciate the years you have given to the Village, your guidance to the Board of Directors, your diligence with our financial investments, and last but not least that you and Donnabelle have been a vital part of our Village.

Your friends and neighbors have left some heartfelt greeting to you by way of cards and wishes.

We also want to grace your home with a gift that each time you look



at it, you realize how much the Maranatha Village residents appreciate all you have given to us.

A Rude Awakening

Helen's story takes place a year after she joined Baptist Mid-Missions as a single missionary (Helen Rowe). She served nearly 15 years in Brazil before leaving BMM to marry Hugh Hall in 1967. After she was widowed, Helen married Robert Jones, a missionary from Brazil, in 1999.

The year was 1952 in Fortaleza, Brazil. It had been a long, hot day. My co-worker, Alice Holmquist, and I decided, since we were living on the second floor, that it would be safe to sleep with our windows open. Earlier in the day, I had withdrawn \$700 from the bank in order to buy plane tickets. I carefully placed the money in the stand beside my bed and then settled in for a good night of sleep. Alice went through her little routine of climbing into her hammock and then placing her alarm clock and glasses on the floor beneath her.

The wonderful ocean breeze coming in the windows was a blessing and we soon were asleep. The next thing we knew, the alarm was ringing and it was time to get up.

"I'm awake, Alice, you can turn off the alarm."

With a bit of irritation in her voice, Alice replied, "Where is the alarm. Why did you move my clock? I can't find it or my glasses."

I was a bit indignant as I answered her, "I didn't touch your clock or your glasses." Then climbing out of bed, I waltzed dramatically toward the window saying, "I think someone came in the window."

I froze in my tracks! By the time I had said those words, I was at the window and there, leaning against the outside wall, was a ladder coming right up to our ledge!

The \$700? I rushed to the night stand. Praise the Lord, the money was there. Instantly Psalm 121:4 flashed into my mind. "Behold, he that keepeth Israel shall neither slumber nor sleep."

The thief had taken Alice's billfold containing \$3 and her glasses. He was caught later in the day trying to sell the glasses. We learned the hard way that even the second floor windows should be closed when sleeping or away.

Being young and very curious, I wanted to see this thief who had sneaked around in my bedroom while I was sleeping. I changed my mind, however, when I learned he had been carrying a machete.

We had slept – oblivious to the danger – but our merciful, faithful Lord never sleeps. He had been on guard, watching over His own.

Cooks Corner

Spinach Quiche

- 1- (10 ounce) package frozen chopped spinach, thawed
- 1- bunch green onions, finely chopped (white parts only)
- 2- cups shredded Cheddar cheese

4- eggs, beaten

1- (16 oz) package cottage cheese

1/4 cup crushed croutons

- 1. Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Lightly grease a 9 inch pie or quiche pan. 2. Place spinach in a small saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally until soft. Drain off any remaining liquid. Stir in green onions, eggs, cottage cheese & Cheddar cheese. Pour mixture into prepared pan.
- 3. Bake uncovered in preheated oven for 45 minutes. Remove from oven and sprinkle with crushed croutons. Return to oven and bake for an additional 15 minutes, until eggs are set.

Personally, I do not use the croutons.

(A message from the Avon Park State Prison to our village.)

"My name is Brother Tony E. Clark. I truly want to thank your Church family for all the wonderful teaching that's done by all of the guys from your Church and Village. Mr. Don Bond, Mr. Bruce Hendsbee, Mr. Gil Seddon, and Mr. Ray Jensen. They're doing a wonderful work for the Lord."

Tony is an Inmate Orderly helping the Chaplains with Chapel duties. Many inmates express the same sentiments.

We are four who have been called by God to "Remember the prisoners as if chained with them – those who are mistreated – since you yourselves are in the Body also." (Heb. 13:2)

Our field is the Avon Park Correctional Institution with 1007 inmates in the main high security unit and 510 in the separate work camp. As Volunteer Chaplains, we are responsible for the opening and the administration of the Work Camp Chapel.

Alex Thompson began working in the jail ministry in 2001 prior to his moving to Maranatha

Village. He joined Maranatha Village residents **Harold Burns** (deceased) and **Frank Nabring** (deceased) in having services at the jail. Alex says, "Harold did the preaching, I would give a testimony and Frank led the singing. In the ten years I have been going to the jail, we have seen many inmates, both ladies and men, come to know Jesus as their Savior."

Alex is the longest serving member of the group that serves in both the jail and prison ministries.

On a daily schedule, Christian movies, religious satellite channels, Christian videos and tapes are shown with the availability of a library stocked with many Christian books.

Volunteer Chaplains lead Bible Study classes daily for the inmates. Also a special ministry offers counseling and prayer to those seeking spiritual help. All these benefits are only available when a Volunteer Chaplain is present to open and supervise the Chapel.

(The one Staff Chaplain is occupied with the affairs of the main Unit and its Chapel.)

We are engaged in the spiritual battle of Ephesians 6 against the "rulers of the darkness of this age" (demon activity). All our inmates are felons, and most have past drug problems, having experienced domination by "spiritual hosts of wickedness."

Only the power of God is sufficient to free them and only His Word can lead them to salvation. We are bearers of that Word. The prayer intercession of God's people makes His power available. We are grateful for the prayers of God's people at Maranatha and covet their fervent continuance. God's power is evident in changed lives and growing Christians. God is answering your effectual, fervent prayer.

In addition to the ministry described above, lightly-used men's clothing is donated by villagers for the inmates at the time of their release. Some have been incarcerated for 15 to 20 years and have only their prison uniforms.




