

Maranatha Village Welcomes New Manager









We would like to extend a warm welcome to Mr. Allen and Mrs. Mary Ruth Lowe and their daughter, Krysta, to Maranatha Village. Allen, the new Village Manager, began his responsibilities as manager on November 3, 2014. Krysta has been hired as the Village Office Manager. Her new position, along with its responsibilities, will begin on November 17th. Allen was introduced to the Village workers at a breakfast on November 3, 2014, with Allen, Mary Ruth, and Krysta being introduced to the residents at the Village meeting on November 6th. Allen and Mary Ruth live at 32 Maranatha Blvd., and Krysta has moved into 36 Maranatha Blvd. They are looking forward to our Florida winters. We are delighted to have the Lowes in the Village. Allen comes to us well qualified for the ministry ahead.

In 1973, when Floyd Conway was getting Maranatha Village started, Allen Lowe was studying to receive his B.S. degree from Central Michigan University, receiving it in 1974. God began right away preparing him for the job of managing Maranatha Village. For the next 16 years, he gained experience as a teacher and school administrator. In 1991, at the Thomas Cooley Law School, Allen received his law degree and retains his license to this present time. From 1993 to 1998, Allen was a State Representative in the Michigan House of Representatives in Lansing, Michigan.

Allen has 9 years' experience as a municipal manager. For 6 years he was the city manager of Grayling, Michigan, where he administered a \$3.5 million budget and supervised 20 full-time and 20 part-time employees, as well as administering 20 city services. The last 3 years of those 9 years, he was manager of the town of Roscommon, Michigan, where he drafted a 10 year development plan. Allen retired this past summer.

Above all, Allen brings spiritual qualifications with him for this unique position. He was the treasurer for 10 years at Houghton Lake Baptist Church, and taught the senior Sunday school class for 13 years. There is much more that could be said, but suffice it to say "We welcome Allen, Mary Ruth, and Krysta Lowe to Maranatha Village."

This year, 2014, has almost ended which brings 2015 to our door step. There is a lot for which to be thankful as we gaze back over the many parts of Maranatha Village. Because of age (the Village will turn 43 years old on April

16, 2015) there were a lot of replacement needs. One of those was a major undertaking, the resurfacing of our roads. That was a major accomplishment for 2014. It caused a large expenditure of \$209,000.00; with the help of Maranatha Baptist Church that is behind us.

2014 saw the introduction of the Charitable Gift Annuity program. It has been well received and will provide funds for future needs of the Village. The CGAs

allow present residents to continue the spirit of giving and sacrifice that gave us what we enjoy today. Floyd Conway would be so pleased to see how his vision for Maranatha Village has developed.

2014 has also seen some wonderful expansion in our Maranatha Memorial Park. A donation from Terry Doane has provided a beautiful walking and exercise trail in memory of Lillian Doane. Lillian passed away in 2014.

2014 closes out with some construction as new metal roofs replaced shingled roofs on two apartment buildings. A new metal roof costs in

the neighborhood of \$16,000.00 for each building. Again, age is the reason for this kind of expenditure.

2015 promises to be a year filled with great activity. The search for a new Village Manager has now been completed with the hiring of Mr. Allen Lowe. Wes Halstead will move into retirement. Wes has managed the Village since July 1, 2001, and will continue to live in Maranatha Village to provide assistance during the transition time. An open house retirement party is planned for Wes and Bonnie on Janu-

ary 29, 2015.A donation from the Fogle familv is allowing us to add a building in the Memorial Park. The building is being done

in memory of Lester and Martha Fogle who purchased into Maranatha Village in 1985. Volunteers will do the construction under the direction of Fred Mc-Neil. Construction may be underway by the time you receive this news.

In February, plans are to build a beautiful gazebo beside Mary Beth (Fogle) Smiththe walking trail. This is being

donated and built by Baptist Mid-Missions in memory of Dr. Allen and Ann Lewis, past president of Baptist Mid-Missions and past residents of Maranatha Village.

On Friday, October 3 (at long last!), Maranatha Manor welcomed friends and neighbors to an Open House to celebrate the conclusion of the newly renovated and expanded facilities for our cherished senior saints. It was a sunshiny, early-fall day, and the happy occasion attracted nearly 200 guests.

The highlight of the renovation was the beautiful new kitchen and dining facility. From 9-11 AM, a steady stream of people came through, uttering "oohs" and "ahs" as they admired the mood-enhancing décor, with its bright colors and creative accessories. Those who remembered the former kitchen were amazed at the size, attractiveness and user-friendly design of the new one. The large pass-through invites residents to watch their meals being prepared. The enlarged dining area, with its new tables and chairs, welcomes sunlight into the room, and provides extra space for hosting friends and family for the occasional meal.

The 800 square-foot expansion made possible the re-purposing of rooms "up-front," including a small exercise room, new offices for the Administrator and Resident Care Liaison, along with a remodeled "med room." of wheels for the best Christmas Decorated set of wheels!!!!



Country Apple Dumplings

Ingredients:

2 large Granny Smith apples, peeled, cored, and cut into 8 pieces each

2 (10 ounce) cans of refrigerated crescent roll dough

1 cup butter

1 cup white sugar

1/2 cup brown sugar

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1 teaspoon vanilla

1 (12 ounce) can or bottle of Mountain Dew

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees Grease a 9 x 13 baking dish

Separate the crescent roll into triangles Roll each slice of apple wedge in crescent roll starting at the smallest end.

Pinch to seal and place in baking dish.

Melt butter in a small saucepan and stir in the sugar and cinnamon, cook until well blended, then add vanilla.

Pour over apple dumplings using spoon to help cover dumplings.

Pour Mountain Dew over the dumplings.

Bake 35 to 45 minutes in preheated oven.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 23, 2015 Amy Carr


