Esther Waite is the Associate Professor of Flute at Bob Jones University (Greenville, South Carolina). She directs the University Flute Choir, teaches flute lessons and woodwind courses, and serves as the woodwind program director. Dr. Waite received her Doctorate of Musical Arts degree in Flute Performance from Louisiana State University, where she held the teaching assistantship for Dr. Katherine Kemler's flute studio. Her interest in Russian composers led to her doctoral dissertation topic of the 1960 flute sonata by the Soviet composer Edison Denisov. She also holds a Master's degree from the University of North Carolina School of the Arts, where she was a teaching assistant for Dr. Tadeu Coelho.



Dr. Waite is principal flutist of the Hendersonville Symphony Orchestra (North Carolina). Recent solo performances have taken her to Panama, Romania, and Weill Hall at NYC's Carnegie Hall. She has given workshops on extended techniques and coached chamber music

at several summer music programs, including Musica Piccola (Winston-Salem, North Carolina), LSU Honors Chamber Winds Camp (Baton Rouge, LA), and Inspiration and Praise Flute Masterclass (Greenville, South Carolina). Dr. Waite is a past president of the South Carolina Flute Society.

Esther assists in the music ministry at her local church, and in her free time enjoys hiking, cooking, and keeping up with her favorite college football team. God blessed us with only one child, a daughter Cheri. Twenty-eight years ago (1994) God used an auto accident to call our then twenty-four-year-old daughter home to be with Him. At the time, Myles was also struggling with leukemia, and God began to redirect our lives concerning vocations. In all our pain, sorrow, and confusion, we continued to walk in obedience to God and had a passion to tell the world that God is faithful.

He has also blessed us with a granddaughter, Julia, who has been married to Antonino for ten years, and they have a daughter, Gigi, who was two years old in November. Julia's family and parents live in Tampa, Florida which is another blessing.

I have my Bachelor and Master's degrees in social work and became the Social Service Director at Michigan Christian Home (Grand Rapids, Michigan), a continuum of care facility for the elderly, and then I went on to become the first Director of Counseling Services at Cornerstone University. While at Cornerstone, God made it possible for me to begin work on my Doctor's degree. I graduated one month before my 60th birthday with my PsyD (Doctor of Psychology) from Southern California University for Professional Studies. However, I am not a psychologist who happens to be a Christian. I am a Christian who happens to be a psychologist. I am a firm believer that psychology is diagnostic, but the Bible has the answers.

I was co-owner of Dayspring Counseling in Grand Rapids, Michigan when, through the encouragement of my husband, I opened my own private Christian counseling business in 2005. God blessed my efforts as we watched the business grow to 22 therapists and four administrative staff. Sixteen years later, and at the age of 78, I retired and joined the Maranatha family in November of 2021. A lecturer, when explaining stress management to an audience, raised a glass of water and asked, "How heavy is this glass of water?" Answers called out ranged from 20g to 500g. The lecturer re-

plied, "The absolute weight doesn't matter. It depends on how long you try to hold it."

"If I hold it for a minute, that's not a problem. If I hold it for an hour, I'll have an ache in my right arm. If I hold it for a day, you'll have to call an ambulance. In each case, it's the same weight, but the longer I hold it, the heavier it becomes."

He continued, "And that's the way it is with stress management. If we carry our burdens all the time, sooner or later, as the burden becomes increasingly heavy, we won't be able to carry on. As with the glass of water, you have to put it down for a while and rest before holding it again. When we're refreshed, we can carry on with the burden.

Cooks Korner

Cocoa Almonds

1 pound almonds (raw or roasted, I had a mix of both)

1 egg white

1 tsp vanilla

3/4 c granulated sugar

2 T cocoa powder



- 1. Mix egg white and vanilla with a mixer until frothy. Dump 1 pound of nuts into egg whites and mix until coated.
- 2. In a separate bowl, combine sugar and cocoa powder. Dump sugar and cocoa powder into egg white/almond mixture and stir to combine.
- 3. Pour almonds onto cookie sheet (sprayed with cooking spray). Cook almonds in oven at 250° for 1 hour taking out to mix every 15 minutes.

Buffalo Chicken Dip

- 4 boneless, skinless chicken breast halves, boiled and shredded
- 1 12 oz bottle Frank's red hot sauce
- 2 8 oz cream cheese
- 1 16 oz bottle ranch dressing
- 1 c finely chopped celery
- 8 oz (2 c) grated cheese (I like sharp cheddar or Monterey Jack.)



- 1. In a 13X9 inch pan, combine the cooked shredded chicken with the entire bottle of hot sauce making an even layer.
- 2. In a saucepan, combine cream cheese and ranch dressing over medium heat until smooth.
- 3. Pour above mixture over the chicken and sprinkle with chopped celery then cheese.
- 4. Bake uncovered at 350° for 30-40 minutes until bubbly. Let stand 10 minutes.
- 5. Serve with crackers and celery sticks (This is hot spicy, but lots of folks love it.)

My sister had become a nurse, and wanted to take care of our parents. During that season, she contracted liver cancer. The Lord took my mother, then my sister leaving my brother and I to find a place for my father. Dad wanted to move to the Manor in the Village. At the time there was no opening, but we got him on the list and moved him to the Palms until a room was available in the Manor. Leaving him there, we returned north, taking turns coming down every few months. Soon we were able to move him to the Manor, where he lived for three years. The people here showed him much love and took good care of him. During that time the Lord led me to come to the Village, much to my dad's excitement.

I retired the end of July this year, packed my apartment the month of August, and moved down in September a week before Hurricane Ian. It has been a big adjustment in my life, but I am trusting the Lord to continue to use me in this next chapter of my life here at Maranatha Village.

When we were young this passage was often cited to warn against being ensnared in

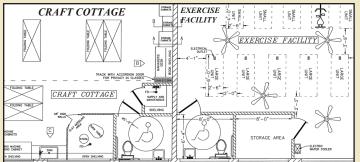
destructive worldly activities and habits that could harm the body and would not glorify God. That is a valid application of the truth contained in this important passage. But the verses also present a positive declaration that we
