Carrying the Torch: Reaching Out to Our Community

One of the blessings of living in the Maranatha community is having many neighbors who share the same commitment to reach the world for Christ. The Great Commission is clear and many of us have shared the gospel in other languages all over the world. Though most of our residents are retired, there is still a strong desire to be involved in Kingdom work. It is refreshing to land in Maranatha Village and find a commitment to sharing the gospel beyond our fences. Here are just a few of the ministries that are happening on a regular basis "out and about" in our greater Sebring and Highlands County community.

Children's Bible Clubs

Linda Peacock came to Maranatha Village in 2016 and began to work with the children's clubs at Memorial Elementary School. Soon they needed help at Avon Elementary and not long after she was asked to teach at both clubs. Just before Covid the decision was made to part from Child Evangelism Fellowship and work directly with the schools. The name was changed from Good News Club to Children's Bible Club. The attendance doubled and Maranatha Baptist Church got behind the club with workers and financial help.

Each club involves twenty different meetings after school throughout the school year. That gives good opportunity to build some roots of Biblical truth. The children are in first through fifth grades and are divided into small groups with a leader for attendance and memory verse time. Then the students are brought together for the main Bible lesson and missionary story.

As both clubs have continued to grow in numbers, it was determined that audio and visual equipment would help the teaching process to accommodate such a large group. One Sunday this past August, Linda approached George Daugherty and said, "I need you!" The seasoned A/V specialist agreed to the new challenge and currently serves at both schools, managing the sound system and projector each week. "I'm thrilled to be a part of this ministry," George says.

So far this year they have had twenty-one salvation decisions. Each student is given a Bible at the last club. Linda adds, "It's a wonderful blessing to work with these clubbers!"

Highlands County Concert Band

In 1977, a retired band director named Fred Pearce started a band for the community. Most of the band members were also retirees looking for a way to be involved in the community and to brush off their instruments to play music they enjoy. The concert series each season has generally included two Christmas concerts, and then one concert in each month for January, February, and March. One of the Christmas concerts is usually held at the Genesis Center in Lake Placid. The rest of the concerts are held at the South Florida State College.

For over twenty years MV residents have been a part of the band. Muriel Casas (clarinet), Carol Ciocca (clarinet), and John Thorpe (baritone sax) are currently playing in the band. Don Messenger (my dad) played clarinet in the band for ten years. He served on the board and helped with much of the event planning over the years. "It was such a great way to meet and befriend people in the community," he recalls.

Craft Cottage

Have you ever wondered what the Craft Cottage is all about? Do you have questions about what they do or who can be involved? Do I have to have my own glue gun? Do I need a license to carry a glue gun? Or maybe an important question—how does anything they do relate to outreach?

The ladies who organize the supplies, projects, and activities of the Craft Cottage have a twofold desire for its use. They want any resident of MV to have a place to work on craft projects together with others for fellowship and sharing ideas. Classes are scheduled periodically to learn new skills and work on projects. You are welcome to work on your own projects, using any materials in the cottage.

The second goal that the Craft Cottage team works toward is to support several charities with handmade projects. Here are some of those organizations and projects:

Samaritans Purse, Operation Christmas Child — crocheted hats for kids. Fran Bowers and Judy Meyers organized the Shoebox Campaign and were thrilled to have 42 participants and 169 boxes.

Cards for Kindness, an organization that sends cards to children in the hospital, veterans in homes, and residents of nursing homes. Cards are collected after each card-making class and sent in bundles of ten to this organization.

Veteran's Home (Sue Ellen Barton in charge) — red, white, and blue afghans are crocheted or knitted and donated.

Pregnancy Center (Joy Tillotson in charge) baby hats are crocheted, knitted, or loomed and donated to the center.

Women's Prison

Ruth Watterson and Marlys Johnson recalled for us a recent encounter at the Women's Prison. We share it here:

Upon entering the county jail, we proceeded to the receptionist's desk. She registered us, handed us our badges, and called for a sheriff's deputy to escort us to our destination. After being scanned, we went through seven heavy metal doors that clanged behind us, we proceeded down a long hallway with highly polished floors. Once reaching the area where the women prisoners are detained, another door was unlocked to give us access to the women. It is a large open dormitory room with bunk beds. The matron announced that we were here for Bible study. We entered a glass-enclosed room where some ladies brought plastic chairs for those who chose to attend the study. There were only seven who came for the Bible study that Marlys Johnson was prepared to teach. After taking prayer requests

from the ladies, we prayed for each lady and her request.

Asking the ladies to open their Bibles, Marlys taught from Psalm 51. Marlys emphasized that true repentance is necessary in the process of accepting

Christ and to maintain a close walk with the Lord. This passage teaches us that we cannot make excuses or blame anyone else for our actions. We need to be totally broken and humbled before our God, and when we are, He welcomes us in love and grace.

The invitation was extended after we closed with a song. One of the inmates walked over and told us that as a teenager she had accepted Christ as her Savior. She then showed us her wrist with the words "Psalm 51" tattooed inside a heart. She said she had done it to remind her of all that Christ had done for her and she wanted to always live for Him. Then, with tears in her eyes, she thanked Marlys for teaching this Psalm, to remind her of her promise to the Lord, and how she had rededicated her life that afternoon to the Lord.

An older lady came to Marlys and said she wanted to pray to receive Christ. She said she had done it before, but what she was sensing now was much different. She

prayed and asked for forgiveness and for the Lord to save her. Our prayer is that this was a Spirit-led decision. We invited her to join us at church when she is released.

Sebring Historical Society

When Elaine Haines moved to Maranatha Village two years ago, Gerry Carlson took her to one of the weekly Coffee and Donut gatherings at the Sebring Historical Society. He had wanted to see MV residents become more involved in the community. Elaine was immediately drawn to the opportunity to be a docent (tour guide) at the Weigle House Museum. "I've played his music for years," she said. Weigle's most well-known hymn is "No One Ever Cared for Me Like Jesus." Charles Weigle moved to Sebring in 1915, just three years after the founding of our city by George Sebring. Eventually, he built a house next door to Mr. Sebring who lived right on Lake Jackson. His home is now a museum that tells the story of the people, the history, and the culture of Sebring and Highlands County.

Only the Beginning

Clearly in these few pages we have only covered a few of the ongoing outreach ministries performed by residents of Maranatha Village. A good group of men work with the men's prisons, several ladies go to the Palms nursing home to do a monthly birthday party for their residents. Others are involved in preaching or providing music in various places around the area. Even our annual yard sale (coming up in February) is an incredible opportunity for outreach.

Our hope is that one of these ideas might spark your interest if you are looking for ways to be more involved in the community. We have a precious story to share — the message of the gospel of Jesus Christ.


