## Community Development Tips and Resources.

## Some useful tips for initiating and building relationships with young people

- Be genuine. Approach it as a partnership, valuing the contributions of young people and respecting what's
  important to them.
- **Be meaningful.** When consulting with young people, it should be on a topic that's important to them. They should be able to be able to influence the process and see an outcome.
- **Provide young people with skills.** It's important to make sure young people are trained to be able to do the activity. Otherwise, they may feel overwhelmed and disconnected.
- **Timing, location and accessibility.** The location you choose is important if you want young people to participate in the engagement process. While some consultations work better in school hours, it might also be necessary after hours or on the weekend. Ensure that the venue is accessible (e.g. close to public transport, wheelchair accessible).
- Out-of-pocket expenses. If possible, ensure young people are reimbursed for any out-of-pocket expenses. This way it's accessible to those with a low income or no income.
