- B. But usually reflecting Jesus' words or teaching
  - 1) I Corinthians 7:10: "not I, but the Lord..."
  - 2) I Corinthians 7:12: "... I say, not the Lord..."
  - 3) Given in relation to Paul's communities

## 3. Three important issues

- A. Sexuality: Marriage
  - 1) Paul: a prude?
  - 2) I Corinthians 7: marriage & virginity at length
    - (a) Marriage: "Do not deprive one another"
    - (b) Strong patriarchal communities
      - (i) Duties of spouses delineated
      - (ii) Sexuality is a gift of God: use as good stewards
      - (iii) Paul, someone giving advice, not making rules
      - (iv) Control over bodies of one another?
  - 3) Norm of the day was to be married
    - (a) Paul married? Doubtful
    - (b) Norm: to be married
    - (c) Place of celibacy
    - (d) Stay as you are
- B. Homosexuality
  - 1) Thorny issue today
  - 2) In Paul's time
    - (a) Strongly spoken against
    - (b) Romans 1:24-28 Greek world
      - (i) Strong language
      - (ii) Worship of creatures, not God
      - (iii) Females & males on way to judgement
    - (c) Not part of natural order
    - (d) No condemnation of homosexual orientation, only of actions
    - (e) I Corinthians 6
      - (i) Idolaters not entering Kingdom of God
      - (ii) Lists of all kinds of idolatry
- C. Marriage, divorce, celibacy
  - 1) Remain as you are
  - 2) I Corinthians 7:1-40
    - (a) Remain as you are (end times coming!)
    - (b) Same message to all
    - (c) Marriage between believer & non-believer
      - (i) Acceptable
      - (ii) Exception in Matthew's Gospel

(iii) Matthew & Paul: sometimes human reality does not work out; divorce
