Founder's story

"Saving one cat will not change the world, but that one cat...the world will change forever"

A dear friend and fellow cat-lover gave me the above saying printed on a rock that sits on my desk. To me it says everything I strived for in creating Happy Tails. In the beginning, I didn't know what I was doing. However, I think that ignorance was bliss and actually helped us succeed.

In the summer of 1993, I was writing a magazine article about so-called "throw-away' animals and why people throw them away. I didn't know where to start until a friend told me about a colony of feral cats living down by the river. I drove to the area to see them. I was so surprised by how many cats' heads peeked up through the grass and from behind the rocks. They checked me out while I did the same to them. I then got back into my car, drove to the nearest market and bought jugs of water, plastic bowls and dry cat food. Returning to the colony, I received a much warmer welcome from the 100 plus felines. Several of the tamer cats ran out to me while I filled several bowls with food and water. Then I sat on a large rock and watched them.

I then reached out to friends for help, including my vet, Dr. Steven Ball, who generously spayed and neutered the cats free of charge! He later asked if I minded paying \$5 to neuter the males and \$10 to spay the females. I knew that was more than fair. However, I couldn't continue paying for all of those surgeries. My daughter told me about an article she read about a no-kill shelter near her. At that time, Sacramento's three shelters were far from no-kill. I visited the Long Beach shelter- and knew I found my calling.

I was determined to open Sacramento's first no-kill shelter for abandoned, abused and homeless cats. I named it Happy Tails Pet Sanctuary because I wanted the organization to have a positive name. Before long (with my husband's support), I obtained a nonprofit status. I knew how to get publicity from my previous business experiences so was able to gather volunteers. When we began, our mission was to help cats. However, within a few short years we found foster home volunteers to take care of needy dogs.

In 2000, we were invited to a luncheon in the Bay Area hosted by Best Friends animal organization. To the surprise of my volunteers, I announced at that luncheon that by the end of the year we would have our own adoption center. Later that year we opened our first shelter location in a shopping center at 56th St. in East Sacramento. This was a good temporary solution but we wanted to go and increase our capacity to help more animals. Cats lived in room-sized enclosures. They were everywhere, including the overhead catwalks.

Lucky for us, a few years later, we received a large bequest and bought our own building on Folsom Boulevard. Now that I look back, I realize that my vision for the future came true. Not only were we able to save those cats at the park, with the help of our volunteers and generous donors, we have saved hundreds of other cats and dogs. For those lucky animals, the world changed forever!



Happy Tails medical team cleaned him up and took care of all of his medical needs with the help of Lakeside Pet Hospital. He recovered beautifully except his ear decided to flop downward. Once he was up for adoption, an amazing family scooped him up.

That's where we pick up the rest of the story. Valorie Pruitt said her two children, Kelsey, 10, and Aaron, nine, had been begging for a cat for a long time. Her husband wasn't one hundred percent sure he wanted one. However, the family encountered an unusual situation. "We had just purchased a new vehicle and we hadn't had it more than two weeks when a rat got into the engine and damaged it," Valorie said. "My husband thought that in addition to traps, the scent of a cat might deter any future rats."

Valorie's husband and kids wanted a kitten. However, when she came to Happy Tails adoption center there were no kittens. Valorie also didn't find a dog-friendly cat. Then she saw Gronk. He was friendly and laid back. "I liked his personality. But I wasn't sure what my family would think of his "wonky ear," Valorie said. She went home and told her family. They thought the ear would give him more character. Now he's in a loving new home and named "Harley" to go along with the dogs, Marley and Charlie.




The case of Tucker is one of our recent success stories. Our foster volunteer, Patty, signed up to host an American Fox Hound, a breed she had not worked with before. Patty is a dog trainer and has experience we needed to get Tucker ready for an adoptive home. A Good Samaritan family found Tucker while hiking in the Sierras. He had a deer antler embedded in his skull and frostbite on his appendages. He was also severely malnourished and underweight.


The family took him home, scanned him for a chip and searched unsuccessfully for his owner online for months. They got him on the road back to health. His wounds healed except for one of his soft droopy hound-dog ears. The frostbite was so great that half of one ear was amputated. We think this gave him "character" and it did not affect his hearing!


The finders contacted Happy Tails through a volunteer to help him in the last part of his journey – getting him ready for a new home. They asked just at the right time, as Patty's home was open. Full of puppy energy and with no perceptible training, Patty taught him the foundations. After lots of patience, diligence and treats, he mastered basic obedience skills and potty training.

Tucker was ready! Although we acquire most of our dogs from local shelters to help with overcrowding, we do occasionally accept special dogs like Tucker. The more large dog foster homes we have, the more we can help hounds, shepherds, Labradors and other large breeds. Consider fostering and let a little (or a lot) more love into your life. As for Tucker, he found a great family in Sacramento that committed to continuing his training and became the dog we knew he could be!
