Course Study Descriptions

New Testament Survey - BIBL 1110

An introduction to the authorship and contents of the New Testament books

Special attention will be given to important persons, places, events, as well as to key chapters in the New Testament revelation.

This course is structured to help the student interpret New Testament biblical passages in their proper context. Within the New Testament, there are insights to mankind, teachings for virtuous living, truths about the Savior, and principles for living an abundant life for Christ. The student will also be challenged to evaluate traditional and critical options of interpretation.

History of the Bible - BIBL 1150

A study of how the Bible came into being, its authors, and its development over time to this present age

The Bible is not only the leading best-seller of all time, but is also the most important book of all time. The Bible did not just 'happen,' nor was it preserved by accident or without effort. Students will discover how the divine hand of God protected and guided the writing of the blessed manuscripts containing His very words.

Communion With God - RELG 1245

A discovery of how to hear the voice of God and how to experience fellowship with God

Students will learn how to identify, recognize, and 'tune in to' the voice of God. Students will be introduced to various ways God chooses to communicate with His children such as through journaling, visualizing, and meditation. This course will develop a hunger and an appreciation for fellowship and communion with God.

The Blood Covenant - RELG 1210

A study of the significance, power, and benefits of the covenant of promise between God and believers; a realization of the seriousness of God's covenant agreement with man and the great effort God put forth to secure man in Himself for eternity

Most Christians today have little to no understanding of the power of the blood covenant in Jesus Christ. This course will solidify the depth of the covenant and the intent of God as He bound Himself to man through blood.

How to Study the Bible - BIBL 1101

This course will present basic facts about the Bible and give students several methods by which to organize his/her study.

Students will be introduced to various tools of study to be used in cooperation with the Bible. Special emphasis will be given to Strong's Concordance.

The Life and Ministry of Jesus — Part I - BIBL 2201

This course will familiarize the student with the major events of the life of Jesus Christ while He was on the earth from the viewpoint of the Synoptic Gospels. Emphasis will be placed on the historical, social, religious, political, and cultural backgrounds of that period in history.

By understanding the life and ministry of Jesus, students will be better equipped and more confident in sharing the truth of the Gospel with others.

Old Testament Survey - BIBL 1120

An introduction to the authorship and contents of the Old Testament books

Special attention will be given to important persons, places and events, as well as to key chapters in the Old Testament revelation.

This course will survey the literature, events, and message of the Old Testament, including the organization, historical context, and basic geography of the Old Testament. The student will also be exposed to the foundation that the Old Testament lays for the New Testament and how the promise of the coming Messiah sets the stage for the New Testament.

The Tabernacle - BIBL 2210

A detailed study concerning the meaning and typical teachings of all the various parts of the Tabernacle with consideration to its construction, structure, furniture, and arrangement; a discovery of how the Tabernacle was designed and patterned by God to present Jesus Christ

The Tabernacle is a compelling and indispensable visual aid for explaining Christ's work on the Cross.

Foundational Doctrines - THEO 2445

A foundational course that surveys basic doctrines of the church with special attention given to key terms, concepts, and biblical texts

This study will include, but is not limited to subjects such as soteriology, the doctrine of the Trinity, hamartiology, ecclesiology, eschatology, the doctrine of God, the doctrine of Jesus, and the doctrine of the Holy Spirit.

Fundamentals of Evangelism and Outreach - EVAN 1101

A course designed to help students develop an effective method of evangelism based on scripture; marketplace evangelism; evangelism on the mission field

This course will help a student develop confidence in sharing his/her faith with unbelievers by considering cultural, educational, political, emotional, and religious barriers.

The Authority of the Believer - RELG 2160

A discovery of the Kingdom authority bestowed upon a believer by the Lord Jesus Christ at the moment of salvation; a course to help the student realize their covenant rights in Christ as a believer and how to operate out of His authority to live in victory; a study to develop students as ambassadors of the Lord Jesus and to live out of the promises of God's Word

Students will learn how to walk in the authority of Christ, stand on the Word of God, and minister in the power of Jesus' name with confidence and without fear or intimidation.

Redemptive Realities - BIBL 3325

Students will experience a study of the book of Ephesians with attention to the believer's position in Christ as a result of the Cross, our identification with Christ, and the miracle of the Body of Christ.

Survey of the Early History of the Church - CHHI 3100

This survey is a study of the birth and early history of the Church with a concentration on the book of Acts. This course will include a study of the early Church and the Church in the medieval period leading up to the Reformation.

The Great Awakenings - CHHI 3440

A historical overview of the four Great Awakenings in Christian history with a look at the leaders involved in the Awakenings. Students will discover what *caused* them, what *kept* them, and what *capped* them!

The Making(s) of a Talmid - CHMN 3202

Jesus has commanded all believers to make disciples. The Great Commission calls us to work with other believers in the church in order to produce disciples and flood the world with knowledgeable, articulate Christians who worship God and follow Jesus Christ passionately. This class will help the student learn how to develop disciples as he continues to develop as a disciple himself.

The Battle of Spirit and Flesh - BIBL 3160

In this course, the student will realize the fullness of the power of salvation, develop a balanced understanding of grace, and consider the idea of dual natures in the believer as presented in the book of Romans.

The Life and Ministry of Jesus — Part II - BIBL 2201

Christianity is rooted in Judaism. Christians cannot exist without Judaism. Before Jesus became a Christian Lord He was a Jewish brother. The Life and Ministry of Jesus Part II is a study of the Synoptic Gospels with a consideration of Judaism in the life of Jesus and how that influences His Christian disciples today.

Church Leadership - BIBL 4040

This study of the Pastoral Epistles will provide an understanding of New Testament leadership and ministry. Particular attention will be given to the 5-fold ministry offices and their relationship and calling to the body of Christ. Emphasis will be given to issues such as leadership qualifications, organization, structure, doctrine, behavior, and false teachers.

Keys to Supernatural Ministry - RELG 4200

This course will discuss the elements that must be practiced to unlock supernatural ministry in the life of a believer. These elements include a strong prayer life, the private prayer language, fasting, worship, and understanding the operations of the Holy Spirit in ministry.

Pentecostal/Charismatic History - BIBL 3600

A survey of the origin, growth, and impact of the Pentecostal/Charismatic church; a study of the founding fathers and mothers of the Pentecostal movement; a tracing of the Pentecostal Movement

Revivalists and Reformers - RELG 4225

A study of various historical individuals who had great influence on the development of Christianity, the formation and continued growth of the New Testament Church, and the spread of the Gospel of Jesus Christ

Students will gain a greater appreciation for the founding fathers and mothers of the faith as this course presents the price paid by many courageous individuals who protected and fought for the Church and the message of Jesus.

Spiritual Authority, A Practical Application - RELG 3161

This course takes a practical approach to one walking in their delegated authority in a ministry setting. It includes basic instructions on deliverance, inner healing, the tactics of the enemy, and one's identity in Christ.

World Religions - RELG 1101

A survey of some of the prominent religions and belief systems in the world today.

By gaining a better understanding of the belief systems of various religions, a student will be better equipped to evangelize those of a different faith for the Lord Jesus Christ.

A Study of the Book of Hebrews - BIBL 3220

The reason for a study of this book is best described by E. Schuyler English in his *Studies in The Epistle to the Hebrews*. He states: "The Epistle to the Hebrews, is one of the most important books of the New Testament in that it contains some of the chief doctrines of the Christian faith, and is, as well, a book of infinite logic and great beauty. To read it is to breathe the atmosphere of heaven itself. To study it is to partake of strong spiritual meat. To abide in its teachings is to be led from immaturity to maturity in the knowledge of Christian truth and of Christ Himself. It is 'to go on unto perfection.'"

Christian Worldview and Ethics - BWVW 3120

Science defines ethics as "a set of moral principles, the study of morality." Therefore, Christian ethics would be the principles derived from the Christian faith by which we act. In this study, students will understand the way a believer is expected to live based on scripture. While the Bible does not cover every situation a person may encounter in life, it certainly gives guidelines and principles by which believers should conduct themselves to bring glory to God.

The Genesis Course - BIBL 4100

Students will be introduced to the Bible and doctrines originating in Genesis, including the origin of mankind, civilization, sin and evil, as well as the universe as seen through Christianity. Stories about biblical personalities such as Jacob, Abraham, Joseph and Isaac help students understand how the Bible has inspired people to trust and follow God.

The Supernatural Ministry of Healing - RELG 4160

A brief study of the healing ministry of Jesus and the blessing of healing as promised in the atonement; Students will learn how to pray for, believe for, and minister healing to others with love, compassion, and a sense of value for the person to whom they minister. This class seeks to encourage students in establishing a natural discipleship lifestyle of providing healing prayer ministry in their local church and community.

Paul's Letter to the Romans - BIBL 4225

A study of the book of Romans, considered by many to be the most powerful of Paul's writings, with an emphasis on foundational truths of Christianity including a brief study of the doctrine of salvation

Supernatural Living - BIBL 3640

A study of the Holy Spirit; explanation of the infilling and empowering of the believer by the Holy Spirit; an extensive study of the spiritual gifts including the body offices, the manifestations of the Holy Spirit, and the five-fold ministry offices

Life in Bible Times - BIBL 2245

This class introduces students to the resources and principles for studying and applying the facts of Bible backgrounds as an important part of the process of biblical interpretation and understanding. Emphasis is given to the geography, history, and

culture of the ancient Near East for the Old Testament and the Jewish and Greco-Roman world for the New Testament and their relevance to the scripture.

The Book of Ephesians - BIBL 3150

A verse-by-verse study of the book of Ephesians; this study also includes background history of the city of Ephesus, the founding of the Christian church, and the doctrine shared by Paul that is still applicable and relevant to the Church today

The Supremacy of Christ - RELG 4350

Observing Jesus, our High Priest, in the book of Hebrews; students will study the message of, 'hold on' and 'stand fast' as the writer persuaded his readers to continue on in their faith in Jesus Christ as the true Messiah

The Johannine Literature - BIBL 3200

An intensive study of the writings of the Apostle John including The Gospel of John, The Book of Revelation, and the Johannine Epistles including I John, II John, and III John.

Demon Spirits - RELG 3235

A study of three of the enemy's strongest spirits against the Body of Christ: the Jezebel spirit, the Python spirit, and the religious spirit; learn to understand the characteristics of each spirit and how they can influence, infiltrate, control, and divide the Church and revival
