The Museum of the African Diaspora (MoAD) Offers Free Attendance on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and Celebrates Black History Month With a Month of Film, Books, Fashion, Food and Comedy

(January 4, 2024, San Francisco, CA)—**The Museum of the African Diaspora (MoAD)** offers an array of dynamic programming throughout the month of February for **Black History Month**. With both in person and online events, audiences everywhere can connect with MoAD's programs celebrating Black history, voices, and art. In addition, the museum will celebrate the national observance of the Reverend Dr. **Martin Luther King, Jr's** birthday as a Day of Service, providing **free admission** to the museum and programs throughout the day on **Monday, January 15, 2024.**

In concert with the current exhibitions, attendees will have the opportunity to hear the artists speak about their work. On **Thursday February 8**, Chief of Curatorial Affairs and Public Programs **Key Jo Lee** will lead an artist talk with **Tawny Chatmon** and **Delita Martin**. On **Saturday February 10**, **Lishan AZ** will speak about her exhibit *Eugene's Cove*. Curator **Erin Jenoa Gilbert** will moderate a discussion with San Francisco artist **JoeSam**, along with **Dewey Crumpler** and **Oliver Lee Jackson** on **Sunday**, **February 25**.

On Saturday, February 2, MoAD's Chef in Residence Jocelyn Jackson will present *The Sacred Experience* of My Everyday Lagos: Nigerian Cooking at Home and in the Diaspora by author Yewande Komolafe. Joining Jackson and Komolafe are chef Salimatu Amabebe, and artist and director Ellen Sebastian Chang who all have prepared an interactive and sensuous portal for guests to experience flavors and stories and ancestral traditions featured in Komolafe's book.

"MoAD's celebration of MLK Day and Black History Month are perfect for visiting the museum for the first time, said Director of Public Programs, Elizabeth Gessel!" "You can help us celebrate art by people of African descent through our exhibitions and public programs. Whether you are interested in visual art, dance, music, poetry, film, theater, food or fashion, there is something for you and your family at MoAD."

Most events during **Black History Month** are either free or free with admission (see below for individual costs), and participants are strongly encouraged to register in advance. The Museum will provide a Zoom link with registration for online events.

Through film, art, performance and dance, our special guests on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, will help us reflect on the importance of protest, creativity and diverse communities. Destiny Arts Junior Company presents an interactive hip hop performance, and MoAD will screen Roger Ross Williams' groundbreaking documentary film Stamped From the Beginning (2023, 91 minutes) based on the book by Ibram X. Kendi, followed by a discussion about Civil Rights, the law, and reparations. A family art activity and gallery scavenger hunt connects families to our current exhibitions -- JoeSam.: Text Messages, Spectrum: On Color and Contemporary Art, Lishan AZ: Eugene's Cove and our digital exhibition The Only Door I Can Open: Women Exposing Prison Through Art and Poetry. Come together to celebrate the life and achievements of one of our nation's greatest heroes.

Born in Harlem in 1938, **JoeSam.** is a self-taught, contemporary, mixed media painter and installation artist who has been making work for four decades in San Francisco. In this first Bay Area museum exhibition of the 84-year-old artist's work, guest curator **Erin Jenoa Gilbert**, well-known for her careful scholarship and dedication to bringing forth unsung Black artists, has selected 20 mixed media paintings from key series produced between 1985 and 2020 to draw attention to **JoeSam.'s** experiments in text and abstraction, his activism, and his enduring love for the Bay Area in his work and life.
