

Government

The City of Oak Hill was incorporated as a municipality in 1927 and has a Commission/Administrator type of government. The City Commission has a Mayor and 4 commissioners. Commissioners serve for 4 years staggered terms.

The City Commission creates and amends all ordinances and resolutions, adopts the City budget, Comprehensive Plan and land use regulations. The Commission appoints the City Administrator, City Attorney, and members of all boards and committees, all who report to the City Commission.

Commission meeting are held twice a month on the 2nd and 4th Monday of each month at 6p.m. in the Commission Chambers located at 234 S. US Hwy #1. All meeting dates and Agendas are located on the City website calendar at www.oakhillfl.com

The City Hall building is located at 234 S. US Hwy #1 and is open 8:30am- 5:00pm Monday through Friday.

Oak Hill History

The City of Oak Hill is the southernmost city in Southeast Volusia County. The location is rich in early Florida history. It was the site of an Indian village called Surruque el Viejo near el Baradero de Suroc, which was seen on French cartographer Jacque Lemoyne's map of 1564.

Several English settlers were in the area during the later 1700's. Seminole Wars chased away northern timber cutters who named their camp Oak Hill. Arad Sheldon, a resident of that time 1856, took the four bodies massacred just to the north by wagon to New Smyrna Beach.

Following the Territorial Days of Florida, permanent settlers began moving into the area. Statehood seemed to provide stability for organized communities. By the Civil War years, Oak Hill was changing: a salt works was operating, part-time stores were open, and a man named Mitchell had planted the first orange grove.

Following the war, settlers began arriving in the area from many places. The local cemetery has eleven Civil War veteran burials – five unions and six confederates.

Hotels, stores, and a post office were established. A school operated by Rev. Wicks in the Congregational Church served a few white students in the morning and several black students in the afternoon. A public school for white students was constructed in the early 1890's and a prominent black freedman, Bill Williams, provided instruction and space for black students in 1901. A public school for black students was constructed in 1927.

Businesswise weather was a crucial factor in area economics, as most people were either citrus growers or commercial fisherman. Circumstances have had a tremendous impact on these occupations in recent years. Very few citizens are involved with these jobs now. Most commute between their Oak Hill home to New Smyrna or Edgewater, to the Canaveral Seashore Park, or to Kennedy Space Center.

The City of Oak Hill was first chartered in 1927. Local government was based on a Mayor/Commission with each commissioner functioning as head of a municipal department. The city was later disbanded in 1930. The country was in a depression and the city petitioned the government to inactivate the charter, which was granted. The city later petitioned the government in 1962 to reactivate the charter. Clarence Goodrich was the city's mayor from 1963 to 1989, spanning 26 years.

Today, the City of Oak Hill is valiantly working towards improving its economic, environmental, and cultural standing, while preserving the richness of its history and heritage, so that residents can enjoy the changes that progress brings in these new times without losing the precious quality of days gone by.

Advisory Boards

Planning Land Development Regulation Commission

This board is responsible for implementation of the Comprehensive Plan and Land Development Code and makes recommendations to the City Commission. They hear applications for variances, rezoning, comprehensive plan amendments, and more.

This board meets the 3rd Thursday of each month at 5:30pm at City Hall.

Parks and Recreation Advisory Board

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board's purpose is to: study recreational needs for all ages in the City, review the utilization of public land and facilities, study existing recreation activities, assess future needs, review and recommend land acquisition for public purposes and create and implement the Parks Master Plan.

Meetings are held the 4th Wednesday of the Month at 10:00am at City Hall.

Waterfront Committee

The waterfront committee promotes and preserves environmental, natural, cultural, and historical resources. Maintain inherent opportunities of ecotourism, fishing and aquaculture.

Historical Preservation Board

The historical preservation board is committed to preserving the Oral, Cultural, Physical and Scientific history of the City of Oak Hill.

This board meets the 3rd Thursday of every month at the Village Improvement Association Hall, 123 East Halifax Ave, Oak Hill (VIA).

If you are interested in serving on one of our boards, applications can be obtained at City Hall or on the City Website.

Parks and Facilities

Oak Hill Historical Museum -VIA Hall / Chung Park – Located on East Halifax Ave across from the Oak Hill Library. Facilities include historical museum, outdoor gazebo, and more. The museum has historical items that have been donated to the City. There is an open house the 3rd Saturday of every month from 10am-1pm.

Mary Dewees Park- Located on North Gaines St. Facilities include a rental building, Playground equipment, Baseball Field, Basketball courts, tennis courts, outdoor restrooms, (2) outdoor pavilions, picnic areas, and grills.

Nancy Cummings Park- Located on Cummings St. Facilities include playground equipment, baseball field, basketball courts, outdoor pavilion, and restrooms.

Jimmie Vann Sunrise Park- Located at 275 River Rd. This location is approximately 350 ft of beautifully restored shoreline. Facilities include pavilion, picnic tables, and kayak launching facilities.

A.C. Delbert Dewees Municipal Pier- Located at 243 River Rd. Facilities include a 520-foot observation pier with two covered decks and seating.

Bird Observation Pier- Located on River Rd across from A.C. Delbert Municipal Pier. Facilities include a 100-foot observation pier.

Solid Waste Pick up Information

Garbage/Household

One per week on Thursday. One (1) toter will be provided by the City per property, the property owner is charged a yearly fee on their property taxes for this service.

Recycling

Once weekly on your regular garbage pickup days. A list of recyclable items is located on page 14.

Replacement Recycling bins can be picked up at City Hall.

Yard Trash-Bagged or Contained

Once weekly on Thursdays.

Yard Trash-Loose Laying

Yard Trash/ Brush (i.e.) loose laying piles need to be No lengths longer than 4 feet, no widths/diameters more than 6 inches should be set curbside in front of your house. Loose laying yard debris is pick up on Saturdays. All yard waste/brush generated by a contractor must be disposed of by the contractor. Piles larger than explained above will need a special pickup request, please call City Hall.

Tires (Non-Commercial)

Four (4) per residential household at no charge per year.

Household Appliances/Furniture

Appliances & other metal goods should be set out with your normal garbage. If item is to large for pick up, another truck will need to come and get it. You will need to call City Hall for a special Pickup for these items.

** CAUTION**

When you place your garbage and residential waste out for the one weekly collection make sure there is nothing adjacent to the items to be collected that you may want to keep.

Waste Pro starts their daily collections at 7:00am, so make sure your garbage is by the edge of the road by that time.

Location of garbage container

Garbage and trash containers when not in use shall be kept away from the front of any building or premises.

All Garbage and trash containers shall be removed from the front of any building no later than 9:00pm on the day of garbage pickup.

Volusia County provides a non-commercial paint exchange facility where residents may trade-in unwanted paint for a different color or type. Contact the Volusia County Landfill for more information at 386-947-2952. Hazardous Waste items are free to dispose of at the landfill (residential, NOT commercial).

Oak Hill Recycles the Following

Aluminum Cans- No aluminum foil, lawn chairs, gutters or window frames

Brown Paper Bags

Corrugated Cardboard- Flatten before placing in your bin

Glass Bottles/ Jars- White, Green, or Brown. Rinse, with or without label, remove lid.

Junk Mail- Place all junk mail, office paper, school paper in a paper bag inside your bin.

Magazines

Newspaper- including sales ads, MUST be taken out of plastic sleeve.

Phone Books

Plastic: #1-#7- Rinse and remove lid. Lids can be recycled just not on the container, for safety reasons.

Tin/Steel Cans- Rinse, with or without label.

Thin Cardboard - All cardboard boxes, gift boxes, cereal boxes, food boxes, soda boxes, cardboard egg carton/flats etc. Flatten before placing in your bin.

If you own a Golf Cart you will need to register it for use on City Streets Only; Golf Cart Usage is prohibited on State and County roads and right of ways. You can pick up a Registration Packet at City Hall anytime. This registration and services are free.



Animal Licenses

The City of Oak Hill along with Volusia County require licensing of Dogs, Cats and Ferrets over the age of 4 months. The Fee for a License depends on the sterilization and microchip of your pet:
