Hollywood/ McLean Section

Trail Map & Information


⊢TRAIL MAP



Built atop a levee, the Hollywood section and McLean Cycle track compose 3.3 miles of the Wolf River Greenway trail through the Hyde Park neighborhood of Memphis, TN. This residential-adjacent trail is a crucial connector to Rodney Baber Park to the north, and to the remaining miles of the Wolf River Greenway trail to the east and west. The Hollywood section features a trailhead parking area along N Hollywood Street and connects to the McLean Cycle Track to the west.



A new trailhead and parking area is under construction at Rodney Baber Park in the Frayser neighborhood, providing additional parking for the protected cycle track along North McLean Blvd. Scenic sights and sounds of nature are available along the trail, with benches overlooking ponds and lakes, and commanding views from atop the levee. A drinking water fountain with pet ground-level bowl is available at the neighborhood connector at Heard Avenue and Shannon Street.



The Wolf River was channelized in the 1960's by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, transforming a winding river into a straighter one. At the time, the negative impacts of changing a river's course, including increased flooding and erosion from loss of wetlands, were not widely known. In 2011, historic flooding along the Mississippi and Wolf Rivers severely affected Rodney Baber Park and the neighborhood around it. Today, the Wolf River Conservancy, Memphis Parks, and Shelby County are working to build a more resilient community by protecting existing wetlands and by creating new ones to absorb floodwaters and protect homes and businesses in the future. The Wolf River Greenway trail passes several of these wetlands, which provide not only flood protection, but also increased opportunities for recreation and important habitat for wildlife
