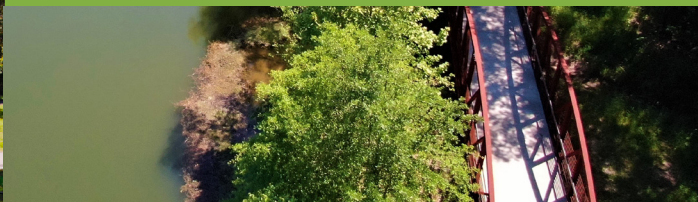

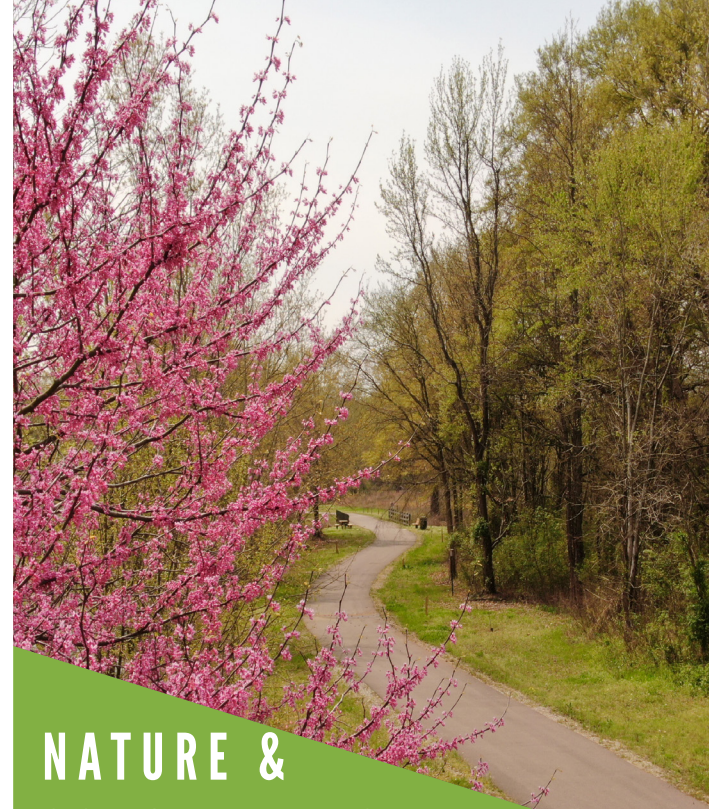


## ABOUT

The Epping Way section, mile nine of the Wolf River Greenway, sits on a scenic landscape along the Wolf River in Memphis, TN. This 138-acre property was once a private country club. Before that, it was a cattle ranch belonging to Memphis businessman, Berry B. Brooks. Now open to the public for recreation and education, the Wolf River Greenway at Epping Way has been transformed from the private enclaves of the past to public green space for people of all backgrounds.



When the Wolf River Conservancy acquired this property in 2015, Epping Way was abandoned and neglected, a frequent destination for illegal dumping. Since then, the Conservancy has hauled away the trash and helped to fund construction of a two million dollar, 1.2 mile paved walking trail which will become part of the larger, 26-mile Wolf River Greenway trail system. A 60 foot floating aluminum boat dock was constructed in 2019, and a nature trail to the Wolf River was added by volunteers in 2020.



## NATURE &amp; CONSERVATION

Located on a natural bend of the Wolf River, the Epping Way section of the Wolf River Greenway supports a diversity of habitats - wetlands, streams, fields, forests, a lake, and, of course, the river. These habitats in turn sustain a wide variety of plants and animals. Today, Epping Way is an epicenter for conservation activity, wildlife viewing, and educational opportunities. Our staff frequently hosts volunteer and school groups who work to clean, preserve, conserve, and learn about the different types of habitat surrounding Epping Way. The Wolf River Greenway enables us an organization to physically connect residents of Memphis to the lands and waters that nourish them.
