Why Democracy Works Matters

While voter turnout has surged in the United States in recent years, it still lags behind that of the majority of peer countries.

Many Americans don't cast a ballot because they aren't registered to vote. Others have cited that they forget – or don't know – about an election, particularly in non-presidential years. Some say it's a hassle to vote, are no longer on the voter rolls, or can't keep up with the voting laws.

There is <u>no</u> federal database of polling locations, nationwide voter registration assistance, or widespread election reminders. All of these are issues Democracy Works alleviates with our tools and data.

In 2022, we revamped our flagship product, TurboVote. Previously, TurboVote was used primarily to assist with voter registration and send election reminders. Now, users can also check their voter registration status, pledge to register once they turn 18, and locate their polling place.

We grew our Voting Information Project partnerships with more than 40 states to provide voters with official polling location information, found on both official state websites and through routine internet searches.

More improvements are coming in 2023. We are rolling out TurboVote election guides to provide detailed information about thousands of local elections. More states are partnering with the Voting Information Project to provide even better polling location information to voters.

Meanwhile, elections don't stop. We have already supported more than 250 elections through Q1 2023, with more than 3,000 elections still upcoming throughout the year. And, we won't rest until ALL of America votes.

Reaching American Voters

In 2022, Democracy Works' innovations focused on the organization's core value: helping Americans vote.

TurboVote was overhauled in 2022 to guide users through the voting process, from registering to vote, to getting election reminders, to finding your polling location, and more.

Through Democracy Works' Ballot Scout and Voting Information Tool, voters tracked the status of their absentee or vote-by-mail ballot, or found their polling location, in 11 different languages.

TURBOVOTE

When 2022 started, TurboVote had two primary purposes: voter registration assistance and sending election reminders.

As it became clear that more support would be beneficial for voters, Democracy Works overhauled TurboVote to greatly expand its capabilities.

Now, voters can check their registration status, pledge to register to vote once they turn 18, find their polling location, make plans to vote in person or by mail, and even contact their local election office.

These enhancements were designed to ensure that signing up for TurboVote once will help them on their voting journey in every election.

Working Directly with States



The differentiator between Democracy Works and other voting technology platforms is our official relationships with states. We collaborate with more than 40 state and 150 local election offices to provide official, accurate, and up-to-date polling location and ballot information to voters online through the Voting Information Project (VIP).

VIP publishes its data in an open-source platform, displayed through the Voting Information Tool (VIT). This allows political parties, private companies, and nonprofits like Election Protection Hotline, to use states' trusted information published in the Civic Information API in their civic engagement efforts.

In 2022, we published data for all 50 states plus Washington, D.C., in addition to 68 other elections throughout the year.

Participating in the Voting Information Project (VIP) helps the Secretary of State's Office connect Idaho voters with their official polling place information and gives us access to useful resources at no cost to the state. When the Elections Division website had a technical issue on the morning of the 2022 Primary Election, we were able to temporarily redirect our page to VIP's free voting location lookup tool while this was resolved. Because we provide trusted polling place information directly to VIP, this backup tool allowed our voters to continue finding the information they needed on election day, without a disruption.

Inspiring Civic Participation through Competition

Colleges and universities in the U.S. often have long-standing rivalries that compel their students to win homecoming games, raise the most funds for a given cause, and encourage healthy competition. The century-old football rivalry between the University of Florida and the University of Tennessee has now become the basis for their newest student body competition: Getting the most students ready to vote with TurboVote. Powered by a strong implementation strategy, UF came out on top.

The University of Florida used QR and referral codes in print and online campaigns, recorded voter registration messages from head basketball and volleyball coaches that were played at games, and set up voter registration tables across campus. UF's President recorded a video encouraging all faculty, staff, and students to register to vote internally, and UF also put together a video for their TurboVote site to help inspire users to vote.

They also have a polling location on campus, and can easily direct students to cast their votes there. "Our partners at the Panhellenic Council facilitated a competition among sororities to get the most election reminder enrollments. Since TurboVote allows us to create and share referral codes, it was easy for us to make a fun internal competition among student organizations." UF's sororities even accumulated more than 1,000 TurboVote signups in one night.



Student Led Voter Engagement

Even the best civic engagement plans can falter without student engagement and integration into already-used technologies. At Louisiana State University, students like Charlie Stephens have stepped up to ensure peers are able to cast their ballots in every election. To do this, Charlie embraced TurboVote, and came up with novel solutions to increase students' engagement with LSU's TurboVote site within existing student technology.

"I appreciate the ease of use and low barrier to access information regarding the civic process to be the best thing about TurboVote," Charlie explained. "It also allows Geaux Vote to track our impact on campus and at the ballot box."

Regarding LSU's voter engagement work in 2022, Charlie shared that he is, "most proud of our efforts to institutionalize voter registration and engagement by integrating TurboVote into a homepage button" on TigerLink, the university's student engagement app. LSU linked to its TurboVote site from the main page of the app.

LSU campus housing also did not have mailing addresses, which made it difficult for students to understand how to register without an address if they wanted to vote in Louisiana elections. Geaux Vote, the campus organization Charlie is part of, tackled this issue by working with LSU and the City of Baton Rouge to create and standardize these addresses. After this process was completed, Charlie shared this list of addresses with TurboVote to create their campus address dropdown menu, making it easier for students to find their address and register to vote.

When asked what he would advise to other students leading civic engagement and voter participation efforts on campus, Charlie responded, "Be persistent and be prepared with research about what the university's peer institutions are doing in regards to civic engagement, and use that research as a catalyst to enable change on your campus through conversations with your university, department, and student leaders."

Adding Transparency to Voting by Mail BALLOT

SCØUT

As more and more Americans vote by mail, the need to track ballots through the mail has only increased. Ballot Scout provides greater visibility into each step of the ballot mailing process, creating increased confidence and transparency in voting by mail.

Ballot Scout utilizes United States Postal Service Intelligent Mail barcode (IMB) data and internal election office data to track and share each mail ballot's full chain of custody, ensuring that ballots are not simply lost in the mail system.

In 2022, Ballot Scout was utilized across 89 elections, most in its history. At the same time, positive responses from voters more than doubled.

Ballots were tracked in 11 languages: Arabic, Chinese (simplified), English, German, Korean, Polish, Russian, Spanish, Swahili, Tagalog, and Vietnamese.
