


Results:

Building a BNL - Spokane's Journey

Current process:



We tried building a tool that auto-populated a BNL in our HMIS system but it didn't work out...

Spokane's current data transformation process

- Filter most recent, active enrollments per household
- Determine newly entering system as inflow
- Determine those exiting and moving to inactive as outflow
- Compare to our historical master list to determine those who are returning

Benefits: Able to see issues, inconsistencies and inaccuracies

Challenges: Process has become too complicated, takes too long and is subject to human error


AWHWA Centralized Diversion Fund

Eligibility

- Age 12-24
- Unaccompanied or at imminent risk of becoming unaccompanied
- Experiencing a housing crisis:
 - Literally homeless
 - Staying in shelter
 - Unstable situations: Doubled up/couch surfing
 - Unsafe situations: Fleeing DV or trafficking situation
 - Imminent risk of becoming homeless (under AWHWA's definition)
- Has a plan for being housed outside of the homelessness system within ~30 days


Not Eligible: young people currently staying in homeless housing programs.





- Flexible funding to quickly resolve housing crises
- No wrong door.
- Can support young people before they enter the 'system'.
- Community program, rather than program in the community.




Young people served (as at April 14, 2021)

175 households \$1,351 average cost per household 42% pregnant or parenting 3 day average processing time

Most popular fund types:

- Housing Deposit (46%)
- Rental assistance/arrears (26%)
- Application fees (8%)
- Transportation (4%)


Our Core Team's first reducing goal was to increase housing placements by 30% by end of October 2020

Creative CDF Housing Stories

Karate Instructor

A minor youth who had been in our emergency shelter began a dependency process with their martial arts instructor and CDF helped solidify their stability with a gift card for the last couple items needed

Lease Takeover

Three young adults working with our Inreach team were able to secure housing through a lease takeover with move in cost support from the CDF

Plane Ticket Spokane-Seattle

A young mother fleeing DV was relocating to the east coast and needed to catch their flight in Seattle



Opportunities for the future

- As our BNL becomes more "real time" we will have an even greater capacity to analyze change ideas with greater capacity
- Our ACI Coordinator and Lead are fully participatory in our process and together
 we are able to craft a narrative consisting of our data, the perspectives of the
 service providers, and the perspectives of the young people connecting with those
 programs
- Our case conferencing has already produced narrative context to the data we see, and has been one of our more fruitful avenues to identifying improvement ideas
