### From the Chair

I believe we have with this show through interaction the opportunity for a stimulating and invigorating conversation for all woodies whatever our current skill & knowledge background in things wood.

The show promoters wanted a presentational change for the show and this year concentrated on the human involvement aspects of working with wood as a profession, as a trade and as an interest through life.

For the first time professional woodworkers were invited, on a complementary platform, with the ability to sell their work. The feedback from

### Professional Stand at the Timber & Working with Wood Show

The opportunity for members to exhibit their work increased significantly with the new "Professional Stand" at the Sydney Timber & Working with Wood Show.

There are now 3 separate opportunities: the Association stand, the TWWWS Competition and The Professional Stand.

The Professional Stand has the potential to be an excellent opportunity to provide an outlet for promotion and sale of fine woodwork to fill a void in the market place with the demise of the annual Craft Show and other traditional outlets. However there are some credibility issues to be addressed.

The organisers of the Show did make an effort to promote the professional stand and appeal to a wider audience. More targeted promotion will be required to attract sufficient numbers of buyers rather than lookers/ woodies.

The feedback from those who did exhibit their work is encouraging for future shows. One veteran exhibitor made more sales than at other craft type shows and was absolutely delighted.

Other exhibitors had lots of interest but no sales and little in the way of prospective sales.

However, exhibitors expressed confidence in the future of the Professional Stand as people get to know about it and the stand attracts a larger number of established makers.

Your Association sponsors "The Les Miller Memorial Young Achiever Award" to promote and honor the achievements of young school leavers in working with wood. The award is named after Les Miller, a founding member of the Association and above all an educator.

Entries for this award are entered in the Young Achiever category of the fine woodworking competition "Putting Timber on Show in NSW". This year the winner is James Moulder for his entry, a side cabinet in Wenge and Silver Ash. James, a student at Galston High, made the cabinet as his major project for the 07 HSC.

#### The Woodworkers' Association stand

Your Association wanted a new image to present to the public. Tracy Gumm came up with the concept of "Forest to Floor" and the design for the new stand. David Factor was the graphic designer. The Association, and all those involved, can be proud of the fact that our stand won an award for the best feature exhibit.

This approach was fresh and instructional, a fitting image for our Association. "From Forest to



Floor, A Table's journey" graphically portrayed from concept through design, timber selection, joint selection, fabrication and finishing the production of a table that was satisfying to both client and maker.

The panels for our stand were produced in recycled paper having a crated inner layer and faced with craft paper having the graphics directly applied.

The story of a table's journey wrapped around the outside of the circular stand and a display table stood out from each graphic message carrying the illustrated materials or form that supported that part of the journey. Stand attendants engaged the public in conversation on the topics and generally promoted the Association.

Within the circumference of the stand were displayed various tables which had kindly been provided by members.

In close proximity to our main theme rotunda sat our area dedicated to members with schools of wood to promote themselves with a large seminar area opposite to give the public information with demonstrations of their delivery skills.

Finally there was our raffle with its excellent array of prizes to raise funds and engage the public in conversation. Without the support of all our members becoming involved in selling tickets, a source of necessary income augmentation for your Association, your committee would need to consider alternate fund raising measures to support your Association's viability.

#### **Tuition in Fine Woodwork**

Irminsul caters for the novice to the professional woodworker

Looking for a woodworking class or expanding your horizons in technique?

Tracy and Max at Irminsul provide general woodworking classes to Master Classes for intensive specialist tuition from some of the best and most celebrated woodworkers in Australia & New Zealand.

Tracy Gumm tells us about the idea behind Irminsul Workshop at Enmore and courses available.

In a former life, as a hobbyist woodworker, I attended weekly woodworking classes. I was eager to learn more but it was very difficult to find extra training or classes in Sydney. I would have been happy to take a week of my vacation time, but nothing was available. I wanted to see this type of training available to furniture makers, teachers and hobbyists.

Later, while attending the School of Fine Furniture in Tasmania I met many great woodworkers, who were also great teachers. That made me more determined to set up a school and share these experiences with others.

Last year I was able to run 3 masterclasses in my workshop on veneering, steambending and torsion boxes. They were a great success. We had some great teachers and a good cross section of woodworkers came along - hobbyists, teachers and furniture makers. Some of the hobbyists had never had any formal training and were amazed at who much they learnt in such a short period of time.

#### Veneering with Neil & Pam Erasmus

Run by Australia's well-known and respected furniture duo Neil and Pam Erasmus (www.erasmusdesigns.com), this class covered veneering, laminating and vacuum pressing. The main focus was on creating a star burst veneered pattern for a demi-lune table. The table top and laminated skirt was created in the class and the students completed the rest of the table in their own workshop.





#### Steambending with Alan Livermore

One of Australia's most experienced steam benders, Alan Livermore (www.ald.net.au), who runs a successful designer/maker business and uses steam bending in many of his pieces. During this hands-on class techniques were demonstrated for creating lippings for tables, seat frames and some free form bending.

#### **Torsion Boxes with Malcolm Harris**

Taught by Malcolm Harris (www.circa.net.au), a well-established designer/maker and teacher, students made a small table using the torsion box technique. They also created a beautiful veneered layon for the top of the table.

The manager of the show Patrick O'Reilly, seeks to balance the commercial venture (timber and tools) with the creative (expressions in wood) whilst maintaining a commercial return. Space in the "Horden" Pavilion is made available to the Association and other special interest groups at no cost and provides a valuable opportunity for those groups to mix.

Patrick's thinking led him to believe a gallery competition would allow members of woodworking clubs and others to display and show their skill and creativity. It is a place to challenge themselves and provide inspiration to others. To this end historically he set up and promoted the competition that ran parallel to the special interest groups displays.

Several years ago the competition was failing for lack of support (probably because the promotion and orchestration of the event had not received sufficient attention.) I suggested we should meet with the clubs (special interest groups) and seek their feelings on the value of the competition. The club representatives at least were greatly supportive of the concept and with their support in promoting the event the response with entries increased dramatically.

Last year in an attempt to provide a professional gallery atmosphere to the display I brokered a deal with Patrick where the show would supply the materials and the clubs would supply the labour. We now have partitions and plinths that with the clubs ongoing support (erect, dismantle and maintain) will continue to provide a fitting backdrop for the display. The clubs also take part in monitoring the competition display during show time.

The judges this year were Richard Vaughan, Richard Raffan (both well known and respected woodies) and Dr Paul Donnelly curator of international decorative arts and design at the Powerhouse Museum.

State Forests sponsored the category prizes. The award ceremony on the Saturday afternoon was MC by Peter Marcia (from radio national "The Saturday Morning Woodies" program), the prizes were presented by Nick Roberts CEO for State Forests.

Next year I'm hopeful that more members will decide to enter the competition

The exhibition in the "Horden" pavilion was the sum total of all who displayed. Overall there was a fresh approach and the show team was thrilled with the presentation. Thanks to all who participated in a venture well won.

For his latest project he converted the band saw carriage ( used to hold whole trees) to a vertical thicknesser to dress massive Iron Bark sections for the Twin Oaks Gulf Club. Then he went about designing the construction in conjunction with the architects and engineers and erecting the structure.

Richard provided some images of other impressive work from huge pergolas to fine cabinet work.

#### NATURALLY AUSTRALIAN 1976 - 2008

#### A Farewell by Leon Sadubin.

A recent letter from John Ellerton owner of Naturally Australian at Circular Quay West at the Rocks, Sydney, conveyed the sad news that my favourite gallery of Australian made furniture will close its doors at the end of August.

I say my favourite because this is the one gallery that has consistently sold items for me over many years. It is a gallery that I could see works by all my woodworking compatriots. It was a place that consistently sold Ginny Sadubin's line of Aussie Animal Trees which recycled all my off cuts. It was a space that many members of the Woodies Group (including myself) took their unsold exhibition pieces from venues such as OTC House in Martin Place, the Opera House Exhibition space, the State Library gallery, ABC Foyer, and more recently Depot Galleries at Danks St. It was a space that always treated you well: John Ellerton and his late business partner Clive Barker were genuinely pleased to see you. And to top it all off, they paid you pronto. John had an aversion to hold onto your hard earned portion of the sale for any longer than necessary.

My earliest recollection of John and Clive was at a small shop on Victoria Rd. Gladesville where some local made furniture was on display, must have been mid 1970's. Then a burst of colour and styles and makers names, materialised on the first floor at the famous Argyle Centre at the Rocks in September 1976 at the height of the Craft Movement. A move to the "just below street level" at the Spaghetti Factory, George St. was probably the glory days of "Naturally". This spacious, well lit showroom, presented Australian timbers in a meticulously selected range of furniture, sculpture and woodware.

John and Clive always contrasted the individually designer made with that of production work by

such companies as Piper Furniture from Ulverstone in Nth Tasmania and Catt Furniture from Western Australia. They gave opportunities to many emerging makers and gracefully represented established ones.

Their stoushes with the Rocks Authority and Sydney Harbour Foreshore Authority were legendary. "Naturally" was a prize gallery to have in the precinct, but John and Clive were forever beset by spiralling rent. Their commission as a result was high but who cared when the sales were consistent. The gallery moved for times in the Rocks and ended its days - 14 years - in the location just behind the Overseas Terminal in an old bond store built with magnificent Bluegum, Blackbutt and Ironbark posts and beams.

John and Clive were generous. They always supported the Woodworkers Association of NSW ventures. They also hung on to some pieces of furniture for far too long, and were happy to take on pieces that have cycled through first owners and looking for the next home.

Their clients were legendary too, with rock and opera stars, politicians, big end of town business people, lawyers and medical practitioners, wealthy tourists and Sydneysiders, flicking their credit cards onto the counter to transact legendary sums, in return for some fine items in Australian wood.

And if you were just cruising through town, you were assured that wrapping up the 3 meter long refectory table or sculptural rocking chair or highly detailed sideboard, and despatching it to Brussels or Toronto was an easy matter and a regular event. And the Visa card would be dropped onto the counter once again, ever so casually...

In more recent times with Clive sadly departed, with the Craft movement sadly unsung and unsupported, with the world heading for some sort of change and renewal, "Naturally" has reached an impass which inevitably led to its final chapter. Perhaps a dynamic new owner will "emerge from the woodwork....", perhaps this is the last chapter in the history of our craft, or just maybe we are heading for a Revival, a Renaissance, a new Movement, a new Beginning.

I suspect some kind of new Direction. And I suspect that John and Merilyn Ellerton and, Clive and Pat Barker, will all have played their role, in paving the way to the next wave, by supporting us for so long, so generously.

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
