

2020 Year In Review

NEW EVENT LAUNCHED: CABERNET WITH BATTIER

On Saturday, January 25, the Battier Take Charge Foundation hosted our first ever Cabernet with Battier event at Byblos Miami. Guests enjoyed a multi-course dinner paired with memorable wines from eight incredible Napa Valley vineyards and (in true Take Charge fashion) karaoke in the Byblos lounge following the main event. The night proved a huge success, raising over \$170,000 to fund college scholarships for incredibly deserving young leaders. Additionally, the participating vineyards generously donated back to Take Charge a portion of proceeds from wine sold.

INNOVATIVE PROGRAM FORMALIZED: GO BEYOND PROGRAM

Since our inception, we have pledged to provide a comprehensive level of support for our Scholars to reach their goals. In 2020, we formalized our Go Beyond Program, extending our commitment to include not just scholarships, but summer Leadership Retreats, the Battier Grant Initiative, and,

particularly relevant throughout 2020, our COVID-19 relief assistance. As college campuses nationwide closed, we provided financial, logistical, and emotional support to help our Scholars overcome whatever unique challenges each faced due to the pandemic. Our assistance included facilitating online workshops, focusing on strategies for navigating uncertainty and difficult emotions; assisting with grocery and other necessity purchases; securing storage units and transportation for those handling temporary displacements; and helping with living expenses as campus jobs and other employment was interrupted.

A SUCCESS STORY EXPANDED: GUIDE SCHOLARS PROGRAM

As the GUIDE (Giving Underserved Individuals Direction in Education) Program neared its fifth anniversary, we sought new opportunities to grow the reach and impact of this offering for high school students. The provision of educational opportunities, tools and support for students to earn their high school diploma and achieve the dream of a post-secondary education will now be extended beyond our pilot high school into multiple high schools throughout central Miami. We are excited to expand this program and, in doing so, expand our Take Charge family.

ONCOURSE INTERNATIONAL

As the pandemic unfolded and racial unrest increased, the foundation quickly prioritized reaching out to each Battier Scholar for frequent updates on whereabouts and well-being. In doing so, we identified an opportunity for an outlet to explore the complicated feelings and emotions that accompanied the challenging topics spring of 2020 presented. The significant disruption to our Scholars' daily lives and schedules from COVID-19, partnered with these complex issues, created a need for tools to consider and plan a course of personal action.

Enter OnCourse International, led by Jim and Paul Warner, who hosted a series of virtual seminars with the Battier Scholars and Take Charge Foundation team. Together, we explored ways to "Unpack & Act" on feelings, navigate emotions, listen reflectively, and pursue true commitments. The seminars sparked insightful discussions and provided a platform not only to be heard and explore our challenges, but strategies to carry the practices into our everyday lives.

MALIK

For Malik, graduating from the University of Michigan in May 2020 meant not having a graduation ceremony in accordance with mandates due to the pandemic. While disappointed to receive his diploma via mail and not have the symbolic walk across the stage as a memory, Malik says "I am grateful nonetheless."

Grateful is a term that this Scholar uses often when discussing both his academic career and the Battier Take Charge Foundation. "I am grateful for the opportunity to have the foundation support my college career. I am grateful to have their help and friendship as I navigate adult aspects of life. I am grateful to attend retreats and learn to be open and vulnerable and receptive."

To talk with Malik at the conclusion of his college career is to learn just how impactful his Battier scholarship is to him. He acknowledges the monetary value and its significance, but also that it is not just tuition. It is the continuity and the layers of support.

"During college, the foundation sent me care packages and cookies. They helped me select flights and buy luggage before studying abroad. They supported my move back home during the pandemic last spring. They just continued to take the extra step, making sure that I was doing well in all aspects of life."

One of these aspects in which Malik succeeded during college was deciding on a major in an area of which he is passionate — political science. He aims to learn more in the coming years about political processes to round out the theory-based pedagogy of his degree program. In the meantime, Malik is enjoying his first job post-graduation. And when asked if he might consider using his degree to run for office someday, Malik simply says "perhaps!" This incredible Battier Scholar would undoubtedly get our vote.



NAHARAI

At her limited-capacity graduation ceremony in December 2020, Naharai asked herself "Is this real? Am I truly here? Because I didn't see myself graduating from college when I was growing up."

Yet graduate she did, with a degree in environmental science from Texas A&M University.

Naharai's path to degree holder was a circuitous one. As a Houston-based Scholar, she chose Texas A&M according to her plan to become an engineer. She began to doubt engineering during her sophomore year, however, as she discovered that she did not enjoy coding and found herself no longer loving to study engineering concepts.

Naharai connected with Take Charge Executive Director Newell Fleming, who gave her advice and an action plan for changing her academic trajectory. This one simple call deepened Naharai's appreciation for the foundation and its support of Scholars. "I realized we don't just share our highs, but we also share our lows. And I knew that the foundation would not let me feel alone in the process."

Naharai then reached out to an academic advisor and learned that her coursework transferred into a multitude of other options, including the College of Geosciences. She applied to the school, was accepted, and enrolled in the regulation and policy track of environmental science. It was the exact right fit. "I enjoyed studying again," notes Naharai. "I enjoyed talking with professors. I felt like I belonged."

Her college trajectory once again took an unexpected turn in spring 2020. Naharai's family, faced with difficulties of navigating COVID-19, needed her to return home to help. So she left College Station, with the understanding that she would still study remotely for the rest of the semester and then return to complete her degree.

With extra tuition aide from Take Charge, Naharai did just that. Now, as a college graduate and several months into her job as an Account Specialist with US Ecology, Naharai credits the foundation with supporting — and accompanying — her to this momentous point. "Because of the foundation, I know I never walk a path alone."

GUIDE SCHOLAR

PIERRE

Innovative technology. Coding research. Data podcasts.

While these may sound like the latest products of a tech company, they are actually the extracurricular activities of GUIDE Scholar Pierre.

"I have always been a curious person, always asking questions" says Pierre, member of the 2021 GUIDE program graduating class. "I'll spend hours on one thing, which leads to another, landing in an area where we don't yet know the answers. Science is like that it is full of areas we don't know, and I find that fascinating."

To pursue this profound interest in science beyond high school, Pierre created a list of universities he considered applying to that fit his criteria of offering engineering, technology, and computer science. When he shared this list with his GUIDE mentor Hernando Lalinde, with whom Pierre had been partnered since the tenth grade, he was met with a challenge to think beyond the local or even state level. Hernando recalls telling Pierre "you have the grades and the potential to shoot high. Pick two or three bigtime universities and add them to this list."

Pierre heeded this advice, with Stanford University becoming a goal. Hernando served as a resource throughout the application process, reviewing Pierre's essays and support materials. Hernando also continued to cultivate Pierre's passion for science, bringing him to his office

in downtown Miami to expose Pierre to technology in the workplace and encouraging Pierre to learn coding basics as applicable to his future studies.

Kamal James, a tutor through the GUIDE program, further supported Pierre in his college pursuit by working with him to prepare for the ACT. "I've never met a kid who is harder working or more intellectually curious" says Kamal. Pierre brought this drive and curiosity to his ACT studies and credits the experience with raising his scores. "Kamal helped me to refine the skills I already had, to learn to prioritize questions, to pace, and to not make easy mistakes. I know I wouldn't have scored as high without him."

Yet for both Pierre and Kamal, the most memorable moment of their tutoring experience was not the tutoring at all. It was the email that Pierre opened at the conclusion of their session on December 1, 2020. Pierre had received an email from Stanford and, sharing his screen with Kamal, he read what proved to be an acceptance letter. "It was one of the happiest experiences of my life" says Pierre.

When Hernando received the call from Pierre sharing the good news, he says he was "just as surprised, amazed, and happy as Pierre was. I got chills."

With Pierre now an entering member of the Stanford University Class of 2025, he remains full of gratitude for the GUIDE program. He appreciates the amount of support;

the meaningful touch points during his experience; a mentor like Hernando to make sure he was staying on track and preparing for the future; and the community of individuals with such a strong interest in his success.

And while the entire Take Charge community is proud of Pierre and his role as the first Scholar to attend Stanford, the foundation also deeply concurs with Kamal's sentiment that, "Pierre is not special because he is going to a fancy school. He is going to a fancy school because he is special."
