### **Highly Successful Clothing Drive for Afghan Refugees**



In late October, word reached SVWC that endangered Afghans who fled Kabul two months earlier had reached the Shenandoah Valley. They were being housed temporarily at a church retreat center in Harrisonburg. They had only their summer clothes as winter approached and needed warmer garments.

News of this need spread among residents, at first by word of mouth. In five days, residents and staff donated three truckloads of warm outer coats, blankets, sweaters, shoes, and more for about 30 men, women, and children sheltering in the retreat center. A baby girl, two months old, got special attention.

By early November, over 50 refugees had arrived in Harrisonburg, and the number was expected to grow, perhaps significantly. By mid-November, the first six refugees had moved to Winchester into apartments furnished in part by donations from residents and our Resale Shop.

Church World Service is the agency designated to welcome and resettle refugees throughout the Shenandoah Valley. Winchester volunteers, many from SVWC, are working closely with CWS to help more Afghan arrivals become our neighbors. More volunteers are needed.

#### From the President/CEO



As we come to the end of 2021, we need to remain diligent in our efforts to keep everyone as safe and healthy as possible. SVWC has been busy implementing policies and procedures as it

relates to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services guidance that was released in November. The guidance states that visitation is allowed for all residents at all times. Visitation can be conducted through different means based on the community's structure and residents' needs, such as in resident rooms, dedicated visitation spaces, and outdoors.

SVWC continues to monitor the transmission rates in both the City of Winchester and Frederick County. Once these rates drop to low or moderate levels for a period of time, we will look to open up some of the common areas on campus such as the Bistro.

As part of the new guidance, SVWC needs to educate and encourage visitors to become vaccinated. That is the reason for the bulletin board in the lobby which will be updated on a regular basis. Please note that visitors are not required to be tested or vaccinated as a condition of visitation. That is why it is so important for all of us to follow the core principles of COVID 19 infection prevention which are:

- Visitors who have a positive viral test for COVID-19, symptoms of COVID-19, or currently meet the criteria for quarantine, should not enter the facility.
- Vaccination is strongly recommended.
- Hand hygiene (use of alcohol-based hand rub) should be performed frequently.
- Face covering or mask (covering mouth and nose) is required regardless of vaccination status.
- Physical distancing of at least six (6) feet between people is required regardless of vaccination status.

- In the event of special circumstances, we will post additional signage.
- SVWC has adopted a thorough and frequent cleaning and disinfection protocol.
- SVWC staff use Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) when it is appropriate and recommended.
- SVWC may engage in cohorting of residents based on known or suspected risks (e.g., combining residents in separate areas dedicated to COVID-19 care).
- We provide appropriate testing of residents and staff, as required by law and consistent with applicable CDC and Virginia Department of Health recommendations.

With the holidays upon us, my hope is that we get to spend quality time with those we love but we have to continue to make smart decisions to protect ourselves and others. Blessings to you and your families for a safe, healthy, Merry Christmas.

# SVWC Foundation's Charitable Activities

In this season of giving, the Foundation has been sponsoring several charitable projects. The Let's Get Together cookbook is wrapping up sales with over \$7,500 raised for the Fellowship Fund. Everyone was able to sample some of its recipes, thanks to Dining Services including them in dinner menus. The Fellowship Committee for Special Events will begin working on its next fundraising venture in the New Year. Thanks to all those that contributed recipes and purchased copies of the book.

The Pie in the Leader's Face contest ended on November 24. There was no winner, because a majority of kind-hearted residents voted against the idea, preferring the whipped cream go on top of desserts instead. Even so, the contest raised around \$1,000 for the Employee Emergency Fund, which saw an increase in need this year. The Fund helps provide support for employees in crisis. Examples of support include helping with medical bills during an illness and helping pay essential bills when a spouse has lost a job.

More than 600 pounds of food has been collected thus far for C-CAP, a food bank serving the Winchester/Frederick County area. Nonperishable items will be collected until December 17. Collection bins are on the first floor of Shenandoah Hall, Bistro information area overlooking the pool, main lobby entrance, and in Wappacomo Hall. So keep donating!

The annual Santa Paws donation drive of dog and cat food for local animal shelters is underway. Donations can be placed inside the double doors beyond the Gift Shop. The drive ends on December 8. Anyone bringing a donation to the Abbey on that day between 7:30 to 9:30 a.m. will receive a free "grab and go" breakfast courtesy of Dining Services. The program is offered in conjunction with Omps Funeral Home, which will again match donations pound for pound. SVWC has always been the leader in this event.

### Wilfred "Wil" Pieper to Mark 102nd Birthday

Wil was born in Loretto, MN, on December 5, 1919. After graduating from Minneapolis School of Art and Design, he joined the US Army Air Corps in January 1942 and remained in the service in the USAF until he retired in 1968. In World War II and the

Korean War, he flew 234 combat missions, earning the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal. After retiring from the military, he served as Special Assistant to the Secretary of Transportation until 1982.

In true retirement, he built and flew his own small airplane and joined his son Steve in collecting and restoring classic automobiles. Their collection, tucked away in an isolated warehouse near Edinburgh, VA, is a veritable auto museum. It includes a streamlined race car they built that attained an average speed of 320 mph in Bonneville, UT.

But as many residents can attest, Wil's interests and abilities were not confined to aircraft and automobiles. He ranks as SVWC's most creative and versatile artist. His interests have included painting, wood carving, sculpting, and stained glass. He created the glass doors to the Chapel as a memorial to Lois, his wife of 67 years, who died in 2008. He also designed and installed the Chapel's windows. In addition, he designed the stained-glass panels in the Vitality Center and the Art Studio.

Wil's family includes his daughter Marcia, four grandchildren, and six great-grandchildren.
