Clark does a nice job of developing characters. Each is distinctive, which is impressive given the somewhat unreliable narrator. The writing is tight and the pace nice. I liked "Sacrifice" though I wasn't deeply moved or fascinated. It is interesting and well-executed. The title still puzzles me, but everything else is pretty clear. The story probably ought to be read again, but it's not essential. Perhaps, if I were to point to an area where it is weak, I would say that it does not use as much sensory detail as it might. Without altering any key element of the story, this would improve matters.

Jamie,

Thank you for sending "Shane of Lubbock" to *The Greensboro Review*, but we've decided not to publish it.

I really liked this story, but I had some concerns. First, the stuff I liked: this is dark. Very, very dark. It reminded me of a Denis Johnson or Mary Gaitskill story, a downward spiral that exceeds your expectations of how low it can sink; after you hit rock-bottom, you descend even further. I like that. Aaron and Megan's relationship fascinated, the failed LSD three-way was appropriately weird, and the final scene was horribly chilling.

Finally, though, I didn't feel like everything came together. My first problem was Aaron. I had a hard time getting a read on this character, especially in regards to his relationship with Megan. Maybe I'm just dumb, but it took me a long time to be sure that he was Megan's boyfriend. In fact, the more I read, the less sure I became of gender, even thinking that I misread his name, looking back to make sure it wasn't "Erin." The first scene, with him comforting Megan, is confusing. I hate to generalize, but to me it felt like Aaron behaved more like a close girlfriend than a boyfriend. I understand that he was becoming inured to Megan's antics, but I was still thrown off. An easy fix: name the guy something more masculine, a name leaving little room for confusion, but also think about clueing us in on his relationship with Megan right off. Have him say something about his dead-end girlfriend right away. Address jealousy and explain, hopefully in scene, how he lost the jealousy and stopped caring altogether. For this story to have the full punch it should, I need to know this stuff.

If this is a story about a relationship that is over, way over, beyond over, beyond even the nasty destructive stage into a sort of bland destructiveness, I'm hooked. But I need to know more about the relationship itself.

I'm not fully convinced by the final scene. Having Lita be responsible seemed like a trick ending, and I didn't buy it. If you go that route, you'll have to foreshadow the hell out of that, so the final move feels inevitable instead of feeling like the author is playing tricks on the reader.

Anyway, these are just the opinions of one editor, so do with them what you will. I took the time to write you a detailed letter because I really, really liked this story and wanted it to work. I was pulling for it the whole way, and I think it's only a couple of revisions away from really working.

Please try us again with another story (I'd even like to look at a revision of this one if you decide to rework it), and good luck with your writing,
