In summary, HeadteacherChat recommends The Student Voice because:

How does The Student Voice describe their product?

The Student Voice is an interactive and child-friendly reporting tool used by independent, international, and multi-academy trust schools, to safely share their concerns in any context. As well as bespoke maps covering the school grounds and inside buildings, pupils can also report concerns at home, in their community and on bus or other transport routes. With round-the-clock access from any device, it provides young people with safe spaces, and removes the barriers and stigma so often associated with raising concerns. The Student Voice are witnessing a 100% renewal rate across their schools.

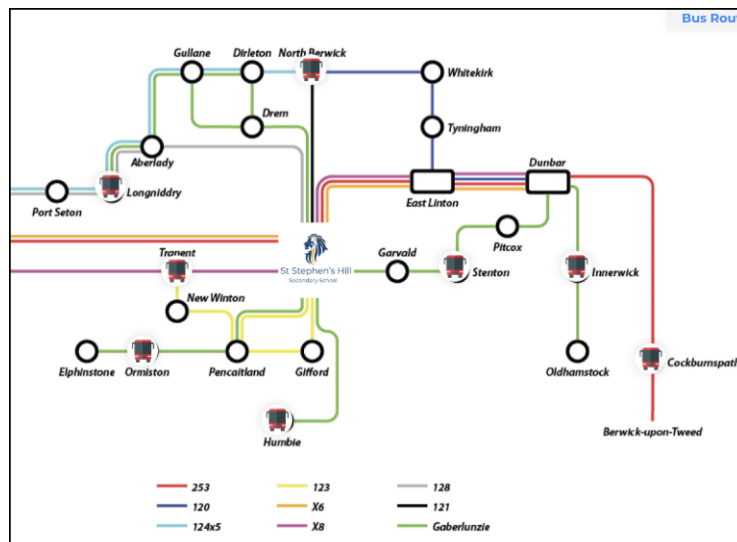
What are the benefits of using *The Student Voice*?

- 24/7 access on any device for children to report concerns - extends beyond the school gates and provides context
- Engaging - child-friendly, visual and interactive reporting features.
- Wide-ranging - covers all contexts young people spend time in (at home, at school and in the local community).
- Varied - covers the full range of issues from sexual harassment to mental health, bullying, home life, and online safety.
- Authentic pupil voice and engagement through an emphasis on feedback.

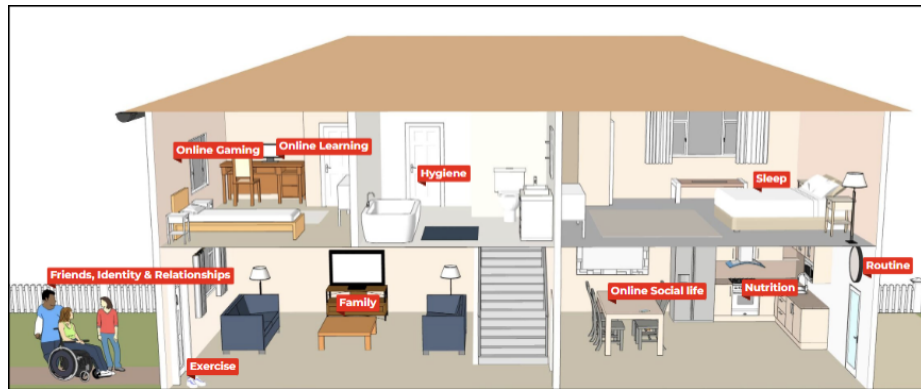
The Student Voice works with schools to create bespoke maps, such as school bus or transport routes and the local community (including areas such as parks, recreation grounds etc) as well as a home environment. Young people can report on all of the extra-familial contexts that they spend time in. This means that children can report incidents and concerns accurately and RAG-rate how safe they feel in these spaces, as well as online, using a universal traffic light system.



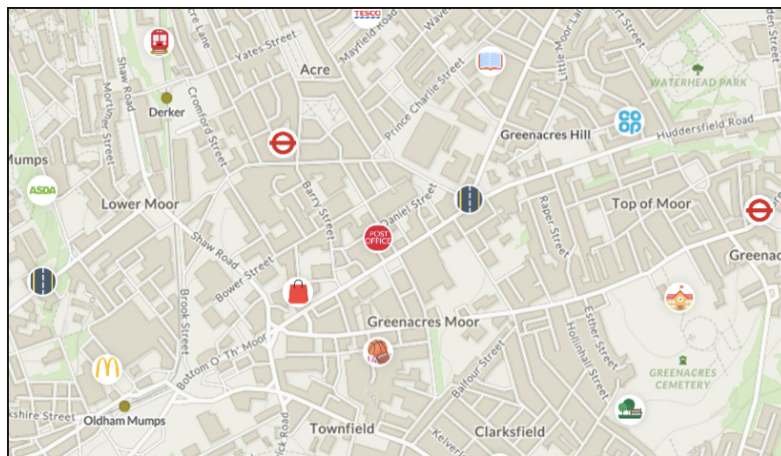
School bus routes – children can click on the relevant bus and leave specific details:

Each time a learner reports a concern, there is an automatic emergency contact list in case the child needs urgent support. There is also a useful form where ideas can be sent directly to the School Council for discussion. Schools can customise a list of useful national and local links/signposts. To remove barriers to reporting, tailorable documents provide learners with guidance on what happens with their concern and what the process is once they have reported something.

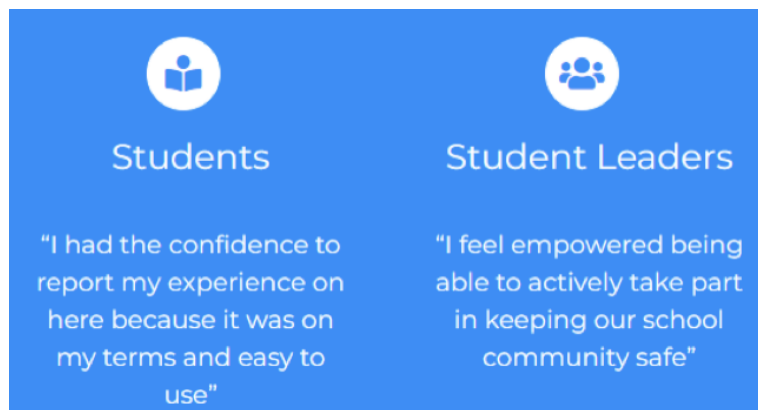

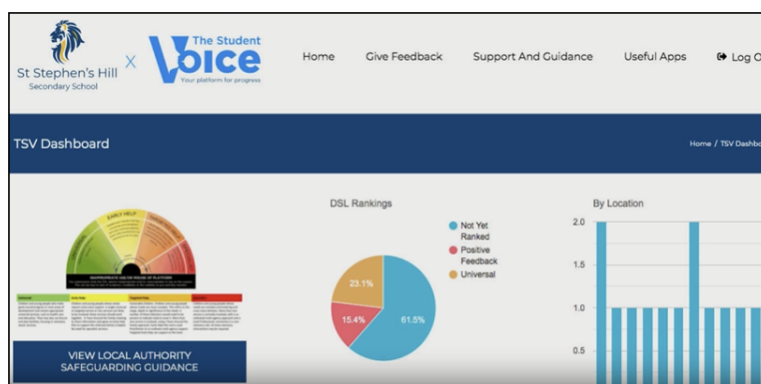

Complimenting adult reporting systems, schools and DSLs are able to provide immense wraparound safeguarding provision; supporting the individual, whilst using the contextual data to implement targeted interventions, and prevent future harm

occurring in those spaces. It is helping DSLs tackle the full range of issues, from child-on-child abuse issues, to mental health, bullying and online safety.



Schools/DSLs can use the system to identify hotspots and report on the impact of interventions taken, with student feedback and RAG-rating highlighting improvements. The system also links to Local Authority guidance so DSLs are not working in isolation.



The School Voice is featured on the [Contextual Safeguarding Network](#), and won the 2022 'Health and Wellbeing' Teach Secondary Award. Early adopter, Bilton High School, has also been shortlisted for the Best use of Technology at the TES national education awards 2023.



COMING SOON - The School Voice Primary

Following the great success of the original version for secondary schools, a primary version is being launched for the 2023-24 academic year. The format is very similar but with easy-to-use tiles and icons for younger children to click on, rather than written text.
