1. WTO Members adopt report on food safety, animal and plant health, paving way for new work

WTO members have adopted the Report of the Fifth Review of the Agreement on the Application of Sanitary and Phytosanitary Measures (SPS), paving the way for the organisation to tackle new work and continue existing activities related to food safety and animal and plant health.

2. <u>WTO Members push for increased transparency on COVID-19 measures in farm trade</u>

At a meeting of the Committee on Agriculture on 28 July, WTO members posed a record number of questions about each other's farm measures. Australia and other members called for enhanced transparency on COVID-10 measures. In the subsequent information session dedicated to COVID-19, members heard from several international organisations about their research work. India was queried about its subsidies for rice in 2018-19. At the end of the meeting, Ms Maria Escandor (the Philippines) was elected as the new chair of the Committee.

3. WTO Members stress role of IP system in fighting COVID-19

At the meeting of the Council for Trade-Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights (TRIPS) on 30 July 2020, WTO members highlighted the merit of the multilateral intellectual property (IP) system in incentivising innovation in medical technologies and research and in enhancing the response of the global community to the COVID-19 pandemic. WTO members also discussed new proposals on the transfer of technology to least-developed countries (LDCs) and electronic commerce. They elected Ambassador Xolelwa Mlumbi-Peter of South Africa as the new chair.

A proposal to establish a new ISO Technical Committee on laboratory design has been submitted by China (SAC). ISO member bodies are invited to review and vote on the proposal.

This proposal focuses on standardisation in the field of laboratory design including site selection, design of internal layout of space and services with the objective to provide functional, safe, energy efficient and sustainable laboratories, whilst also taking into account environmental impact, the practical division of experimental and support areas and layouts plus model selection of laboratory furniture.
