

# THE NEED FOR OUR SUPPORT

**Knowledge is power.** Statistics can never show the true scale or impact of the epidemic of violence against women and girls, but they help us become more informed so we can better respond.

Our hope is that one day services like ours will no longer be needed, but as long as they are, we will be here to support, listen and believe.

Our Centre is based in Bodmin and we provide support to women and girls across Cornwall, Devon, Dorset and HMP Eastwood Park Prison through our wide range of projects and services.

The Women's Centre Cornwall was originally set up as The Women's Rape & Sexual Abuse Centre (WRSAC) in 1996. It was created and continues to be run by women, many of whom have lived experience of sexual and domestic abuse. We remain a member of Rape Crisis England & Wales.

# Everything we do reflects the values we share.

**BRAVE** We are brave and speak out against injustice, violence and oppression towards women. We will keep working for the change that is needed in society to make sure women and girls are free, safe and empowered in all spaces.

**BELONGING** We make the effort to invite and welcome all women into our community. We recognise, respect and celebrate our differences! We do what we can to make sure everyone has equal opportunities to progress and succeed. Our community is one where women can feel as though they belong - that they have a purpose and their voices matter.

**HOPE** We believe that with the right support, any woman or girl can have the life they want for themselves. We are hopeful that we can live in a world free from violence and oppression. We will always listen to women and work with other organisations in the community to make sure women have the services they deserve.

# Specialist Sexual and Domestic Abuse Support

Our Specialist Support Service provides one-toone trauma-informed, psycho-educational and emotional support to women living with the impact of sexual and domestic abuse. Support is given over a 20 week period and this continues to be our most in demand specialist service.

# Young Empowered Women's

Our YEW Project provides one to one support and group work to young women aged 11 - 18 who have experienced any form of sexual violence, harassment, abuse or exploitation.

This year we developed our first YEW Grads group as a progression pathway for young women who have accessed support.

# Helpline

Our telephone Helpline provides valuable support to women survivors and also offers information for professionals, family members and friends who are supporting women and girls affected by sexual and domestic abuse.

Our local Helpline provides valuable support to any woman, including those wanting to access support or needing a top-up between their planned sessions.

The level of crisis that women are experiencing, and the complexity of their lives has been noticeably higher than before the pandemic and as such, the value of the Helpline is greater than ever, particularly in relation to our increasing levels of suicide prevention work.

Main reasons for calls involve women seeking support for childhood sexual abuse, Sexual Assault Referral Centres, domestic violence with sexual violence, rape and domestic abuse

# Campfire

Following requests from women, we transitioned our web-based 'Survivors Forum' in a fully mobile-friendly App; Campfire.

We believe this to be the first App of its kind in the country that provides a women-only peer support space for survivors of sexual and domestic abuse.

To ensure safety, the platform is anonymous and moderated.

Our online Peer Support App 'Campfire' has also been well used this year and we understand that this is being used as an alternative to Helpline support for some women.

480 members at the end of the year

Campfire membership grew more than 400% during this period.



# **Peer and Group Support**

In the summer we piloted running peer support groups based on women's feedback including a walking group, trauma informed boxing, cycling, pottery, swimming, art exhibition and an overnight camp.

The aim of these sessions was to bring women together to break isolation and support women to face new challenges and build confidence and self-esteem.

# Sorella Project

In the Autumn, we were successful in bidding for a women's Sexual Violence Peer Support programme funded by the Office for the Police & Crime Commissioner. Working with our partners, Trevi and Devon Rape Crisis and Sexual Abuse Services, we launched a Devon and Cornwall wide peer support service.

# Support for women in the criminal justice system

Our work supporting women involved in the criminal justice system offers a vital entry point for those who would not very often access mainstream sexual/domestic abuse support.

#### Open

We deliver the Women's Community Rehabilitation Service on behalf of HM Prison and Probation Service across Cornwall, Devon and Dorset. Women are referred directly to us by Probation and HMP Eastwood Park in Gloucestershire which is the closest women's prison for the area.

The Open Service offers holistic, trauma responsive, practical and emotional support on a wide range of issues including housing, mental health, domestic abuse, parenting, substance use, education and employment.

# **Open Mentoring**

Our Open Mentoring team offers support to women who have offended or who are at risk of offending.

In February 2023, the Open Mentoring Service was awarded a Certificate of Appreciation from Devon and Cornwall Police.

When I met my mentor I was in a dark place, working on autopilot and masking life. Now it's like I am waking up after a deep sleep and the light has gone on and I'm discovering who I really am.

I remember my Probation Officer saying "You are going to do some work with The Women's Centre Cornwall". I felt scared and dubious. It meant that after years of having people turn their backs on me, I was finally being offered opportunities, which meant I had to open up. Meeting my support worker was amazing. She taught me so much about how to deal with things, but also about my own behaviours. For the first time, someone said that I didn't have to put up with things that were not acceptable. She helped me to see behaviours around me and that it was okay to say no. She made it all make sense.

#### **Prison Link Work**

The closest women's prison to Cornwall is around 150 miles away in Gloucestershire.

Our Prison Link Worker supports women in HMP Eastwood Park Prison, offering emotional and practical support around housing, benefits, clothing, phones and transport.

For most of the women we support in custody, The Women's Centre Cornwall are their only bridge between prison and home, often one of their only sources of connection and support.

Following the support given in prison, very often we meet women on the morning of their release, give them mobile phones and clothes if needed, and help them on their long journeys to enable them to arrive home safely and make contact with their Probation officer.

Thank you for always being there. It's been a lifeline for me and one person I have been able to open up to the most. Gutted it had to come to an end but I'll never forget, thank you.

This organisation saved my life. Before prison, during prison and after prison. So much so I will be volunteering with them next year. They empower women, are feminists and they stand by you through thick and thin.

My Prison Link Worker took me to the train station and bought me an Easter egg. Honestly as a 38-year old woman that broke me, in the nicest way possible. It's the small things that make the difference.

# Support for women experiencing/at risk of homelessness

#### **Assertive Outreach**

We provide targeted support for women experiencing or at risk of homelessness who are often in that situation as a result of abuse, facing greater ongoing risks. As a partner in Trevi's SPARK Project, we received 138 referrals for women experiencing serious and complex barriers such as homelessness, involvement in the sex industry and substance use. 57% of women engaging in SPARK had experienced domestic abuse and 14% had been sexually exploited or prostituted. In addition to receiving referrals from other agencies, the team regularly undertook 'assertive outreach' in the community. This involved going out to key locations such as known rough sleeper and temporary accommodation hotspots to proactively find women who could benefit from the service.

We meet women where they are at, from their tent to their temporary accommodation and anywhere in between. We don't see any women as being too 'high risk' or 'too aggressive'. We are there to support.

#### Krefta

In September 2022 we launched our new Krefta Kernow service, working in partnership with West Cornwall Women's Aid to support adults fleeing domestic abuse who are not able to access specialist domestic abuse accommodation such as refuges. Our partner, Konnect Communities, supported 16 men during this time.

The success of the service has been ensured by developing a very close working relationship with Cornwall Housing, and demonstrates that the Krefta Service is absolutely essential in Cornwall.

# Promoting equity of access to services for women in under-served communities

#### #NeverTooLate

The #NeverTooLate project raises awareness about the sexual and domestic abuse experiences of older women. This year we have continued to deliver the Older People's Pilot Project (OPP) alongside Cornwall Council and Age UK Cornwall. At the heart of this project is the belief that older people must have a voice in explaining what the impact of domestic and/or sexual abuse has been on their lives, telling us about what has been helpful but also what was not. The experiences of OPP participants formed the basis of our Making A Difference Report for Cornwall and Devon Commissioners. We are continuing to work with Commissioners and partners to develop and coordinated community response to working with older people experiencing DASV.

# **International Women's Group**

This year, our team delivered a Cornwall Council-funded project to improve support for European women facing sexual/domestic abuse, especially when language is a barrier. Through community engagement, we collaborated with local migrant women to understand their challenges in accessing information and support. Our report highlighted recommended best practices alongside local realities in Cornwall, and was shared with Safer Cornwall Domestic Abuse and the Sexual Violence Partnership Board. Additionally, we piloted pre-ESOL classes at the Women's Centre and reviewed communication materials for accessibility.

We collaborated with women from Romanian, Bulgarian,
Portuguese and Ukrainian communities to co-produce their

#### DIVAS

The DIVAS' own agreed mission statement is: "A group of women with learning disabilities and autism who fight for their rights against discrimination and abuse and get their voices heard".

We aim to empower the DIVAS to be creative, have fun and reach their potential through participation, training and volunteering. As one of the DIVAS group says "I have got a learning disability, I can do anything anyone else can, with the right support I can do it."

This year the DIVAS supported 11 women with learning disabilities and/or neurodivergence to access our Specialist Support Service, aiding their healing journey after abuse.

The DIVAS also functions both as a peer support group, helping to reduce isolation, build connections and enable women to meet others with similar life experiences.

Furthermore, the DIVAS group functions as a peer educator group, designing and delivering training to increase understanding of learning disability and neurodivergence, reduce barriers and improve support.

This year the DIVAS have consulted with those in power to create system change, including the Ministry of Justice, the Domestic Abuse Commissioner and the national police project 'Operation Soteria'.





# **Raising Awareness**

#### Campaigning and Influencing

Our social media channels continue to serve as important and growing means of communication, awareness raising and support. Through these platforms, we are able to inspire and empower women, spread essential messages challenging rape myths and misogyny, raise awarness about our work and keep women informed about relevant services and events.

Our most shared post was created to raise awareness about the national government alarm that was due to go off on all compatible phones across the UK, which would have put many women experiencing domestic abuse at risk if they had hidden phones. The post was shared many times reaching 55,735 people on Instagram and prompting 151 new followers.

We continue to be involved in numerous strategic forums to represent women and girls including Reducing Reoffending Boards, and Safer Cornwall's Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence Partnership, where we inform policy leads and commissioners about the drivers of abuse and survivors' experiences and needs.

# **Reclaim The Night**

The Women's Centre Cornwall has held Reclaim The Night events in Cornwall since 2004, amplifying the message that we as women refuse to be held responsible, controlled or blamed because of the actions of male perpetrators.

This year we displayed 103 pairs of shoes as well as lighting candles and laying flowers to represent every single woman who was murdered in the UK during the year, mostly by men known to them. Hundreds of women marched in outrage that women and girls are still subject to this epidemic of male violence and abuse.

# Walk My Walk

This year we designed and delivered 'Walk My Walk' - an outreach project funded by the Home Office. This place-based project saw outreach workers engaging with women and girls across Truro by providing activities and events in women only spaces, creating space for them to talk about their experiences of VAWG, access support and have their voices heard. We provided information and recommendations to the Home Office around women's safety.

As part of this project, we created pathways to involve marginalised groups including women with learning disabilities, older women and Black and minoritised women. We hosted 'The Othered Woman', Cornwall's first Black Feminism event in collaboration with Black Voices Cornwall and The Olive Project which was a resounding success.

# **Lived Experience**

Our Lived Experience Groups are formed from women who have accessed our services. Women first complete our Hear My Voice workshops before joining the Lived Experience Groups:

"This course has empowered me so much and has made me think about what I want and what I want to do to help people. It's given me so much positive vibes and has boosted me. And the people have been so supportive"

We work with our Lived Experience Groups to design new services as well as review what we are currently doing. We also support them to take part in research, consultations, campaigns and awareness raising.

"We are not just a tick box. We are heard. We give our side of our experiences. I could never have believed I could have gone from that child to being here. Our roots are growing and coming up above ground". Woman from a Lived Experience Group
