2012 Highlights

- Keep Ohio Beautiful was honored by Keep America Beautiful (KAB) with a Gold Level Award for exemplary state affiliates
- Our partner, the Ohio Dept. of Transportation, received an award from KAB in the category "U.S. State Department of Transportation Partner Awards," which recognizes state DOTs for their support of Keep America Beautiful State Affiliates through joint partnership projects and exceptional programming
- Added new affiliate Keep Southeast Ohio Beautiful, encompassing Wayne National Forest (covers 13 counties)
- This is the first national forest affiliate and the largest affiliate in the U.S.
- Awarded a grant from the Home Depot Foundation for a beautification and safety project at the Dayton VA Medical Center
- Implemented our first National Planting Day at the Ohio Statehouse to educate citizens about the benefits of native plants and to highlight our local affiliates
- Received a \$50,000 grant from the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency to develop an additional five regional law enforcement training workshops in 2013 in rural parts of the state
- Created a new Keep Ohio Beautiful educational display, utilizing storefront windows in downtown Cleveland



Keep Ohio Beautiful Focus Areas

Studies have shown that a beautified community translates into a safe, healthy community and improves quality of life. Projects supported by Keep Ohio Beautiful encompass the three focus areas described below and include creating community gardens, preventing and cleaning up litter and graffiti, recycling and waste reduction.



Litter Prevention

In 2012, KOB and its affiliates removed 4,520,201 pounds of litter and debris from Ohio's landscape.

Why It's Needed: While litter prevention campaigns have helped improve the litter picture over the past four decades, it remains a significant and costly problem for communities and businesses. The Ohio Department of Transportation, for example, spends nearly \$4.5 million every year to clean up our state roadways. Litter also lowers assessed property values, drives away homebuyers and hinders business development.

How We Help: We identify the causes of litter and reduce its impact by organizing cleanups and promoting proper waste handling in our communities.



Waste Reduction and Recycling

7,900,377 pounds of solid waste kept out of landfills in 2012.

Why It's Needed: Recycling creates more jobs than landfills and incineration. Recycling conserves our natural resources, saves landfill space, conserves energy, and reduces water pollution, air pollution and the green house gas emissions that cause global warming.

How We Help: We help reduce the impact of solid waste in our communities through integrated programs and education about responsible consumerism, source reduction, reuse and recycling, landfills, composting, and waste-to-energy technology systems.



Beautification and Community Greening

Approximately 141,450 Ohio residents participated in community beautification through Keep Ohio Beautiful and its affiliates' programs in 2012.

Why It's Needed: Community greening improves quality of life, lowers crime and engages citizens. Buildings with high levels of greenery had 48% fewer property crimes and 56% fewer violent crimes, according to the 2009 National Visible Litter Survey and Litter Cost Study, commissioned by Keep America Beautiful.

How We Help: We improve the visual aspects of our communities through programs that beautify and naturally clean our environment – creating community gardens, restoring vacant lots, beautifying highways and shorelines, urban forests, planting native flora, and preventing and abating graffiti.

Signature Activities

Great American Cleanup, Ohio

How many times have you passed a litter-strewn park or graffiti-splashed building and wished it would go away? Perhaps it's the local playground plagued with garbage or maybe a recycling effort needs a jump-start. Whatever the concern, a solution is just around the corner. All it takes is someone to say "enough is enough" and work with community members to eliminate the problem. That's what the Great American Cleanup is all about.



In Ohio, it's the state's largest annual community improvement program. Local teams are mobilized and inspired to clean up everything from playgrounds to rivers and lakes to illegal dumps. If volunteers were paid even minimum wage by the State of Ohio or local governments, taxpayers would have spent nearly \$2.2 million for their work in 2012. That's a HUGE savings to taxpayers in this difficult economy!

Additional impact numbers for 2012:

- 671 events held
- 185,014 volunteers participated
- 429,280 volunteer hours logged
- 4,520,201 pounds of litter collected
- 376 illegal dump sites cleaned



State Roadway Cleanup | April 14 Kickoff Event

50 enthusiastic volunteers braved the cold temperatures to pick up 89 bags of trash, 39 bags of recyclables, 1,500 tires, and two 40-yard dumpsters from two illegal dump sites.

We again partnered with the Ohio Department of Transportation to host our annual State Roadway Cleanup, "Green Starts Here!" The 2012 kickoff event for the cleanup, which officially began nationwide on March 1, was held in Athens, in cooperation with Keep Southeast Ohio Beautiful.

America Recycles Day | November 15

Keep Ohio Beautiful used Facebook and Twitter to encourage participation in America Recycles Day. Established in 1997, it is the only nationally recognized day dedicated to promoting recycling in the U.S. Ohio held 99 America Recycles Day events in 2012, the fourth largest number in the country.

Recycle-Bowl

Recycle-Bowl is a free competition and benchmarking tool for K-12 school recycling programs to promote waste reduction activities. School recycling programs across the nation compete in a race to collect the most recyclables. In Ohio, 91 schools participated in the 2012 Recycle-Bowl, the seventh largest number of schools in the country. Of 1,577 registered schools, STEPS Center for Excellence in Autism in Strongsville ranked No. 1 in Ohio. The school improved the most over last year for the entire country, going from 1 pound per capita to 25 pounds per capita.

While this is a national program, Keep Ohio Beautiful provides the state support, including promoting it to local schools through our local affiliate network.

RecycleMania

RecycleMania began in 2001 as a challenge between Miami University of Ohio and Ohio University. Now a national program, it is a friendly competition and benchmarking tool for college and university recycling programs to promote waste reduction activities to their campus communities. Over an eight-week period each spring, schools report recycling and trash data, which are then ranked by school. Participating schools watch how their results fluctuate against other schools and use this to rally their campus communities to reduce and recycle more.

Keep Ohio Beautiful promotes RecycleMania to Ohio colleges and universities. In 2012, 18 institutions participated.

First National Planting Day held at the Ohio Statehouse

Keep Ohio Beautiful (KOB) celebrated National Planting Day on Sept. 18, 2012 by planting native Ohio plants at the Ohio Statehouse. National Planting Day celebrates the value and power of native species in restoring ecological balance to the environment while creating greener, more beautiful communities. To commemorate this day, KOB hosted a public event at the statehouse to beautify the grounds with Ohio native plants, planting a moist meadow, perennial beds, and a native tree.

KOB executive director Michael Mennett and Keep Ohio Beautiful affiliates were joined by Senator Richard H. Finan and Su Lok, director of corporate and community partnerships for The Scotts Miracle-Gro Company, to lead the National Planting Day program. High school students from the Tolles Career & Technical Center did the planting.

KOB Teams Up with The Home Depot Foundation to Help Veterans

KOB and Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful were awarded an \$80,000 grant from The Home Depot Foundation for its Ohio Valley Region VA Hospital Community Beautification and Greening Project. Home Depot and KOB teams revitalized outdoor green spaces and added raised planting beds to help improve veterans' quality of life at the Dayton VA Medical Center. This project directly benefits more than 750 veterans and their families in the Dayton area.
