### **METHODOLOGY**

This research study was commissioned by Election Reformers Network to measure the attitudes and opinions of likely voters as they relate to local, state, and national election administration issues.

#### THE INTERVIEW

A total of 1,498 online surveys were completed among Dynata panel members nationwide who confirmed they are registered to vote and *very likely* to vote in the 2022 General Election. Surveys were conducted between August 6<sup>th</sup> and August 15<sup>th</sup>, 2022.

### SAMPLE BIAS

To help ensure a representative sample, a proportional share of surveys were completed across four geographic regions based on US Census population data. Furthermore, to reduce the potential for sampling bias, Research & Polling, Inc. weighted the surveys for various demographic segments of the population in order to reflect a representative distribution of the likely voter population.

### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

### **SUMMARY OBSERVATIONS**

- ✓ The survey results show that there is a need to build more trust in the ways elections are administered as less than half of likely voters nationwide are *very confident* that elections at the local, state, and national levels are conducted fairly and accurately.
- ✓ Republicans are far less confident in the fairness and accuracy of local, state, and national elections than are Democrats and independents. Female likely voters also tend to express less confidence than do men.
- ✓ The vast majority of voters across party lines believe that it is *very important* that state and local election officials act in an impartial manner.
- ✓ The vast majority of voters also believe that a commitment to preventing voter fraud, preventing voter suppression, and being fair to all candidates regardless of their party affiliation are each *very important* attributes when voting for an election official.
- ✓ Seven-in-ten likely voters believe that candidates who are running for office as an election official should be required to have some election expertise.
- ✓ Relatively few likely voters believe that state/local election officials should get involved in other candidates' election campaigns or be responsible for decisions that could create the appearance of a conflict of interest. Specifically, two-fifths or less of the likely voters believe that state/local election officials should be able to raise money for other candidates (27%), oversee decisions that could impact their own elections (31%), publicly endorse or oppose candidates for other offices (36%), or raise money for their political party (40%).
- ✓ The plurality of likely voters (45%) nationwide do <u>not</u> believe their state's chief election official should be allowed to run for higher office while administering the election, though 38% believe they should be allowed to do so and 17% are unsure.

### CONFIDENCE IN ELECTIONS

Voters nationwide tend to have more confidence in their state and local elections than in national elections. Over four-fifths (82%) of likely voters say they are either *very confident* (46%) or *somewhat confident* (36%) that **their local and state elections** are conducted fairly and accurately, compared to 12% who are *not too confident* and just 5% who are *not confident at all*.

In comparison, 72% of likely voters say they are either *very confident* (42%) or *somewhat confident* (30%) that **elections throughout the United States** are conducted fairly and accurately, though 28% are either *not too confident* (17%) or *not confident at all* (11%).

Democrats (63%) are much more likely than independents (42%) and Republicans (19%) to be *very confident* that elections throughout the US are conducted fairly and accurately. In fact, half the Republican voters are either *not too confident* or *not confident at all* compared to just 8% of Democrats and 26% of independents.

Although the majority of likely voters (55%) believe that if the election for governor were close and a dispute arose, their state election officials would settle it fairly, 18% do not believe their state election officials would settle the dispute in a fair way, while 28% are unsure. Again, it is observed that

Democrats (63%) are much more likely than independents (52%) and Republicans (48%) to believe an election dispute would be handled fairly in their state.

It is also observed that approximately three-in-five likely voters are either *very confident* (23%) or *somewhat confident* (38%) that the top judges in their state will make decisions about election cases impartially, though 20% are *not too confident* and 8% are *not confident at all*.

### **IMPARTIALITY**

Not surprisingly, the vast majority of likely voters (95%) feel it is either *very important* (82%) or *somewhat important* (13%) that local and state election officials act in an impartial manner, compared to just 3% who feel this is either *somewhat unimportant* or *not important at all*.

The perceived importance of impartiality cuts across party lines with the vast majority of independents (86%), Democrats (84%), and Republicans (78%) saying this is *very important*.

### **ELECTION OFFICIAL SELECTION**

Likely voters were asked to rate the importance of various attributes when voting for an election official. Nearly all of the likely voters feel a commitment to fairness for all candidates regardless of party, a commitment to preventing voter fraud, and commitment to preventing voter suppression are important. Likely voters are comparatively less inclined to feel an official's support for their own political party and/or preferred candidate is important. Specifically:

- ✓ 96% feel an official's **commitment to fairness for all candidates regardless of party** is either *very important* (84%) or *somewhat important* (12%).
- ✓ 95% of voters feel an official's **commitment to preventing voter fraud** is either *very important* (85%) or *somewhat important* (10%).
- ✓ 93% believe an official's **commitment to preventing voter suppression** is either *very important* (78%) or *somewhat important* (15%).
- ✓ 63% feel that an official's **level of support for (your) political party and/or preferred candidates to win elections** is either *very important* (43%) or *somewhat important* (20%). Three-in-ten likely voters say their level of support for preferred party/candidate is either *somewhat unimportant* (7%) or *not important at all* (23%).

Approximately two-thirds (68%) of likely voters either *somewhat agree* (34%) or *strongly agree* (34%) that **it is difficult to trust the impartiality of election officials who are elected with the support of a political party**, while 18% *neither agree nor disagree* and just 8% disagree. There are only slight differences in opinion among the demographic subgroups when combining the *strongly agree* and *somewhat agree* responses.

### **ELECTION OFFICIAL ACTIVITIES**

Likely voters were asked if state or local election officials should or should not be allowed to engage in various election-related activities. Overall, no more than 40% of voters believe that election officials should be allowed to engage in any of the activities tested, though a sizeable percentage have not formed a strong opinion on these matters one way or the other.

- ✓ 57% believe state and local election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to **raise money for other candidates** compared to 27% who do believe it should be allowed (16% are unsure).
- ✓ 56% believe state and local election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to **oversee decisions that could impact their own election such as oversee a recount in their own election, etc.,** though 31% feel they should be allowed to do so and 13% are unsure.
- ✓ 49% of likely voters believe state and local election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to **publicly endorse or oppose candidates for other offices** compared to 36% who believe they should be allowed to do so and 14% are unsure.
- ✓ 48% of voters believe that state or local elections officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to **raise money for their political party**, though 40% believe they should be allowed to do so and 12% are unsure.

It is also found that the plurality of likely voters (45%) nationwide do <u>not</u> believe their state's chief election official should be **allowed to run for higher office while administering the election**, though 38% believe they should be allowed to do so and 17% are unsure.

It is interesting to note that younger voters (age 18-34) are consistently more accepting of election officials engaging in each of the activities discussed above than are older voters.


### **EXPERIENCE**

Approximately seven-in-ten likely voters (71%) either *somewhat agree* (30%) or *strongly agree* (41%) that **candidates running to be election officials should be required to have at least some election experience before they run for office.**

Over seven-in-ten (72%) likely voters nationwide say they are either *very confident* (42%) or *somewhat confident* (30%) that elections in the United States are conducted fairly and accurately, compared to 28% who are either *not too confident* (17%) or *not confident at all* (11%).

**POLITICAL PARTY:** Democrats (63%) are much more likely than Republicans (19%) and independents (42%) to be *very confident* that elections throughout the US are conducted fairly and accurately. Half of the Republican voters are either *not too confident* or *not confident* at all compared to just 8% of Democrats and 26% of independents.

**GENDER:** Male voters (47%) are more likely than female voters (38%) to be *very confident* that elections throughout the US are conducted fairly and accurately. Just 15% of Republican females are *very confident* compared to 70% of male Democrats.


RACE/ETHNICITY: Black voters (61%) are much more likely than White (38%) and Hispanic/Latino (40%) voters to be *very confident* elections throughout the US are conducted fairly and accurately. Thirty-two percent of White voters are either *not too confident* or *not confident* at all compared to 21% of Hispanics/Latinos and 13% of Black voters.

**EDUCATION:** Voters who have a graduate degree or higher (52%) are more likely than those with less education (40%) to be *very confident* that elections throughout the US are conducted fairly and accurately.

**REGION**: Voters in the West (47%), Midwest (44%) and Northeast (44%) are more likely than voters in the South (37%) to be *very confident* that elections throughout the US are conducted fairly and accurately.

**POLITICAL IDEOLOGY:** Those who identify as being either very liberal (70%), somewhat liberal (54%) or moderate (48%) are much more likely than those who are either somewhat conservative (22%) or very conservative (16%) to be *very confident* that elections throughout the US are conducted fairly and accurately.

The large majority of very conservative voters (58%) and 46% of those who are somewhat conservative are either *not too confident* or *not confident* at all compared to just 10% of those who are politically liberal and 19% of moderates.

Over four-fifths (82%) of likely voters nationwide say they are either *very confident* (46%) or *somewhat confident* (36%) that their local and state elections are conducted fairly and accurately compared to 12% who are *not too confident* and just 5% who are *not confident at all*.

**POLITICAL PARTY:** Democrats (64%) are much more likely than Republicans (28%) and independents (42%) to be *very confident* that their local and state elections are conducted fairly and accurately. Approximately one-third of Republican voters (31%) are either *not too confident* or *not confident at all* compared to just 5% of Democrats and 16% of independents.

**GENDER:** Male voters (52%) are more likely than female voters (39%) to be *very confident* that their local and state elections are conducted fairly and accurately. One-in-five female voters are either *not too confident* or *not confident* at all compared to 13% of male voters.

Just 19% of female Republicans are *very confident* in their state and local election while 38% not confident. In comparison, 71% of male Democrats are *very confident* while just 4% have little or no confidence.


RACE/ETHNICITY: Black voters (62%) are much more likely than White (44%) and Hispanic/Latino (40%) voters to be *very confident* that their local and state elections are conducted fairly and accurately. Approximately one-in-five White voters (21%) are either *not too confident* or *not confident at all* compared to 12% of Hispanic/Latinos and 8% of Black voters.

**Education:** Half of likely voters who have a four-year college degree or higher are *very confident* that their local and state elections are conducted fairly and accurately compared to 43% of those with less education.

**AGE:** Interestingly, the majority of seniors (54%) are *very confident* that their local and state elections are conducted fairly and accurately compared to 46% of those age 50 to 64 and 40% of those age 18 to 49. Just 32% of female voters between the ages of 18 and 49 say they are *very confident*.

**REGION**: Voters in the Midwest (51%), West (49%), and Northeast (48%) are more likely than voters in the South (39%) to be *very confident* that their local and state elections are conducted fairly and accurately.

**POLITICAL IDEOLOGY:** Approximately three-fifths (61%) of those who say they are either very liberal or somewhat liberal are *very confident* that their local and state elections are conducted fairly and accurately compared to 49% of moderates and just 28% of those who are either somewhat or very conservative. Three-in-ten conservatives are either *not too confident* or *not confident at all* compared to just 8% of those who are politically liberal and 12% of moderates.

The vast majority of likely voters (95%) feel it is either *very important* (82%) or *somewhat important* (13%) that local and state election officials act in an impartial manner, compared to just 3% who feel this is either *somewhat unimportant* or *not important at all*.

**POLITICAL PARTY:** Independents (86%) and Democrats (84%) are more likely than Republicans (78%) to believe it is *very important* that local and state election officials act in an impartial manner.

**RACE/ETHNICITY:** Likely White voters (85%) are more apt than Black (74%) and Hispanic/Latino voters (74%) to believe it is *very* important that local and state election officials act in an impartial manner.

**EDUCATION:** Voters who have at least some college education or higher (86%) are more likely than those with a high school education or less (74%) to believe it is *very* important that local and state election officials act in an impartial manner.

**HOUSEHOLD INCOME:** Likely voters with higher levels of household income are more likely than those with lower levels of income to believe it is *very* important that local and state election official act in an impartial manner. Ninety percent of those earning \$100,000 or more feel it is *very important* compared to 77% of those earning less than \$35,000.

**AGE:** Likely voters age 50 and over (88%) and those between the ages of 35 to 49 (81%) are more likely than those between the ages of 18 to 34 (68%) to believe it is *very* important that local and state election officials act in an impartial manner.

**POLITICAL IDEOLOGY:** No significant differences are observed among those with different political ideologies.

Voters were asked to rate the importance of various attributes or qualities when voting for election officials. As shown above, 95% of voters feel officials' **commitment to preventing voter fraud** is either *very important* (85%) or *somewhat important* (10%).

The vast majority of voters (96%) also feel an official's **commitment to fairness for all candidates regardless of party** is also either *very important* (84%) or *somewhat important* (12%).

Ninety-three percent of likely voters feel an official's **commitment to preventing voter suppression** is either *very important* (78%) or *somewhat important* (15%).

Though still a large majority (63%), voters are comparatively less apt to feel that an official's **level of support for (your) political party and/or preferred candidates to win elections** is either *very important* (43%) or *somewhat important* (20%). Three-in-ten likely voters say the level of support for preferred party/candidate is either *somewhat unimportant* or *not important at all*.

### **COMMITMENT TO PREVENTING VOTER FRAUD**

**POLITICAL PARTY:** Republicans (90%) are more likely than independents (84%) and Democrats (81%) to believe a commitment to preventing voter fraud is *very important*.

**RACE/ETHNICITY:** Similar percentages of White (86%), Hispanic/Latino (84%), and Black (81%) likely voters believe an election official's commitment to preventing voter fraud is *very important*.

**AGE:** Likely voters age 50 and over (91%) are more likely than those between the ages of 35 to 49 (80%) and those between the ages of 18 to 34 (74%) to believe an election official's commitment to preventing voter fraud is *very important*.

**POLITICAL IDEOLOGY:** Likely voters who identify as being conservative (92%) are more likely than moderates (82%) and liberals (80%) to believe an election official's commitment to preventing voter fraud is *very important*.

### **COMMITMENT TO FAIRNESS REGARDLESS OF PARTY**

**POLITICAL PARTY:** The vast majority of independents (87%), Republicans (85%) and Democrats (81%) feel an election official's commitment to fairness for all candidates regardless of party is *very important*.

**RACE/ETHNICITY:** Similar percentages of White (85%), Black (81%), and Hispanic/Latino (80%) likely voters believe an election official's commitment to fairness for all candidates regardless of party is *very important*.

**AGE:** Likely voters age 50 and over (89%) are more likely than those between the ages of 18 and 49 (76%) to feel an election official's commitment to fairness for all candidates regardless of party is *very important*. Democrats age 50 and over (90%) are much more likely than Democrats under the age of 50 (72%) to say this is *very important*.

**EDUCATION:** Voters who have at least some college education or higher (86%) are more likely than those with a high school education or less (78%) to believe an election official's commitment to fairness for all candidates regardless of party is *very important*.

**POLITICAL IDEOLOGY:** No significant differences are observed among likely voters with different political ideologies.

### COMMITMENT TO PREVENTING VOTER SUPPRESSION

**POLITICAL PARTY:** Democrats (81%) and independents (81%) are more likely than Republicans (73%) to believe an official's commitment to preventing voter suppression is *very important*.

**RACE/ETHNICITY:** Similar percentages of White (77%), Hispanic/Latino (82%) and Black (78%) likely voters believe an official's commitment to preventing voter suppression is *very important*.

**AGE:** Seniors (84%) are more likely than those between the ages of 50 and 64 (79%) and those 18 and 49 (73%) to believe an election official's commitment to preventing voter suppression is *very important*.

**POLITICAL IDEOLOGY:** Likely voters who identify as being *very liberal* (85%) are more likely than those who are somewhat liberal (79%), moderate (77%), or somewhat/very conservative (76%) to believe an election official's commitment to preventing voter suppression is *very important*.

**POLITICAL PARTY:** Democrats (49%) and Republicans (47%) much more likely than independents (29%) to believe an official's level of support for (your) political party and/or preferred candidates to win elections is *very important*. Approximately two-fifths (41%) of independents feel this is either *somewhat unimportant* or *not important at all* compared to 29% of Republicans and 26% of Democrats.

**RACE/ETHNICITY:** Black (57%) and Hispanic/Latino (52%) likely voters are much more likely than Whites (40%) to feel an official's level of support for (your) political party and/or preferred candidates to win elections is *very important*. Thirty-five percent of White likely voters believe this is either *somewhat unimportant* or *not important at all* compared to 20% of Black voters and 16% of Hispanic/Latino voters.

**AGE:** Younger likely voters between the ages of 18 and 34 (76%) are much likely than those between the ages of 35 and 64 (63%) and seniors (54%) to feel an official's level of support for (your) political party and/or preferred candidates to win elections is either *very important* or *somewhat important*.

**EDUCATION:** Voters who have a high school education or less (55%) are much more likely than those with at least some college education (38%) to feel an official's level of support for (your) political party and/or preferred candidates to win elections is *very important*. Thirty-six percent of those with at least some college education believe this is either *somewhat unimportant* or *not important at all*.

**POLITICAL IDEOLOGY:** Likely voters who identify as either very conservative (57%) or very liberal (50%) are more likely than those who are moderate (45%), somewhat conservative (40%), or somewhat liberal (31%) to feel an official's level of support for (your) political party and/or *preferred* candidates to win elections is *very important*.

The majority of likely voters (57%) believe state and local election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to **raise money for other candidates** compared to 27% who believe it should be allowed (16% are unsure).

**POLITICAL PARTY:** Independents (58%) are more likely than Democrats (44%) and Republicans (47%) to believe that election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to raise money for their political party. Over two-fifths of Democrats (44%) and Republicans (42%) believe election officials should be allowed to do so compared to just 29% of independents.

**GENDER:** Men (51%) are slightly more inclined than women (45%) to believe that election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to raise money for their political party.

RACE/ETHNICITY: White likely voters (53%) are more likely than Hispanic/Latinos (35%) and Blacks (30%) to believe that election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to raise money for their political party. The majority of Black (58%) and Hispanic/Latino (54%) voters do believe election officials should be allowed to raise money for their party, compared to 35% of White likely voters.

**EDUCATION:** Those with at least some college education (54%) are more apt than those with a high school education or less (36%) to believe that election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to raise money for their political party. Nearly half (47%) of those with lower levels of education do believe this should be allowed.

AGE: Seniors (59%) and those between the ages 50 to 64 (53%) are more likely than those age 18 to 49 (37%) to believe that election officials should not be allowed to raise money for their political party. The majority of voters age 18 to 34 (55%) and nearly half of those age 35 to 49 (47%) believe candidates should be allowed to raise money for their political party, compared to 32% of those age 50 and over.

It should be noted that 61% of males age 50 and over believe this should not be allowed.

**POLITICAL IDEOLOGY:** Approximately half (51%) of those who identify as being very liberal do believe that election officials should be able to raise money for their political party compared to 39% of those who are somewhat liberal, moderate, or conservative.

**POLITICAL PARTY:** Independents (60%) are more likely than Democrats (44%) and Republicans (51%) to believe that election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to publicly endorse/oppose candidates for other offices. Over two-fifths of Democrats (42%) and 36% of Republicans believe election officials should be allowed to do so compared to just 26% of independents.

RACE/ETHNICITY: Whites (54%) are more likely than Hispanic/Latinos (38%) and Blacks (34%) to believe that election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to publicly endorse/oppose candidates for other offices. Approximately half of Black (49%) and Hispanic/Latino likely voters (47%) do believe election officials should be allowed to publicly endorse/oppose other candidates compared to 32% of White likely voters.

**EDUCATION:** Those with at least some college education (54%) are more likely than those with a high school education or less (40%) to believe election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to publicly endorse/oppose candidates for other offices.

AGE: Seniors (65%) and those between the ages 50 to 64 (55%) are more likely than those 35 to 49 (43%) and those 18 to 34 (29%) to believe that election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to publicly endorse/oppose candidates for other offices. The majority of voters age 18 to 34 (55%) and 41% of those age 35 to 49 believe election officials should be allowed to do so compared to 27% of those age 50 and over.

**POLITICAL PARTY:** Independents (69%) are more likely than Democrats (53%) and Republicans (54%) to believe state and local election officials should not be allowed to oversee decisions that could impact their own election. One-third of both Democrats and Republicans do believe election officials should be allowed to do so, compared to 20% of independents.

RACE/ETHNICITY: Whites (61%) are more likely than Hispanic/Latinos (41%) and Blacks (44%) to believe state and local election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to oversee decisions that could impact their own election. Over two-fifths of Black (42%) and Hispanic/Latino (41%) voters do believe election officials should be allowed to do so, compared to 27% of White likely voters.

**EDUCATION:** Those with at least some college education (62%) are more likely than those with a high school education or less (45%) to believe state and local election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to oversee decisions that could impact their own election. Over one-third (36%) of those with a high school education or less do believe this should be allowed.

**AGE:** Voters age 50 and over (65%) are more likely than those ages 35 to 49 (49%) and those between the ages of 18 and 34 (42%) to believe state and local election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to oversee decisions that could impact their own election. Nearly half of voters age 18 to 34 (47%) and 35% of those age 35 to 49 do believe election officials should be able to oversee decisions affecting their own election compared to 23% of those age 50 and over.

**POLITICAL IDEOLOGY:** Nearly three-fifths (57%) of those who identify as being either somewhat liberal, moderate, or very/somewhat conservative believe state and local election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to oversee decisions that could impact their own election compared to 48% of those who are very liberal.



**POLITICAL PARTY:** Independents (64%) and Republicans (59%) are more likely than Democrats (52%) to believe that election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to raise money for other candidates. Approximately one-third of Democrats (32%) and 26% of Republicans believe election officials should be allowed to raise money for other candidates compared to 18% of independents.

RACE/ETHNICITY: White likely voters (61%) are more likely than Hispanic/Latinos (50%) and Blacks (40%) to believe that election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to raise money for other candidates. The plurality of Black likely voters (43%) believe election officials should be allowed to raise money for other candidates, as do 32% of Hispanic/Latinos and 24% of Whites.

**EDUCATION:** Those with at least some college education (62%) are more likely than those with a high school education or less (47%) to believe election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to raise money for other candidates.

AGE: Voters age 50 and over (65%) are more likely than those 18 to 49 (46%) to feel election officials should <u>not</u> be allowed to raise money for other candidates. Nearly two-fifths (39%) of voters age 18 to 34 and 33% of those 35 to 49 feel they should be allowed to do so compared to 20% of those age 50 and over.

The plurality of likely voters (45%) nationwide do <u>not</u> believe their state's chief election official should be **allowed to run for higher office while administering elections**, though 38% believe they should be allowed to do so and 17% are unsure.


**POLITICAL PARTY:** Independents (51%) and Republicans (47%) are more likely than Democrats (41%) to believe their state's chief election official should not be allowed to run for higher office while administering elections. Two-fifths of Democrats (40%) and Republicans (39%) do believe their state's chief election official should be allowed to run for higher office while administering elections compared to 29% of independents.

RACE/ETHNICITY: White likely voters (50%) are more likely than Hispanic/Latinos (32%) and Blacks (29%) to believe their state's chief election official should <u>not</u> be allowed to run for higher office while administering elections. Half of both Black likely voters (51%) and Hispanic/Latinos (50%) do believe election officials should be allowed to do so compared to 33% of Whites.

**EDUCATION:** Those with at least some college education (51%) are more likely than those with a high school education or less (33%) to believe their state's chief election official should <u>not</u> be allowed to run for higher office while administering elections. Nearly half (47%) of those with a high school education or less do believe this should be allowed.

**AGE:** Voters age 65 and over (57%) are twice as likely as those aged 18 to 34 (28%) to believe their state's chief election official should <u>not</u> be allowed to run for higher office while administering elections. Over half (56%) of voters age 18 to 34 and 41% of those age 35 to 49 do believe election officials should be allowed to do so compared to 29% of those age 50 and over.

**POLITICAL IDEOLOGY:** The plurality (46%) of likely voters who identify as being very liberal believe their state's chief election official should be allowed to run for higher office while administering elections compared to 38% who do <u>not</u> believe this should be allowed.

Approximately two-thirds (68%) of likely voters either somewhat agree (34%) or strongly agree (34%) that it is difficult to trust the impartiality of election officials who are elected with the support of a political party, while 18% neither agree nor disagree and just 8% disagree. There are only slight differences in opinion among the demographic subgroups when combining the strongly agree and somewhat agree responses.


**POLITICAL PARTY:** The majority of independents (70%), Republicans (69%) and Democrats (66%) either *somewhat* or *strongly agree* it is difficult to trust the impartiality of election officials who are elected with the support of a political party.

GENDER: Men (39%) are more likely than women (31%) to strongly agree.

**EDUCATION:** Those with at least some college education (38%) are more than those with a high school education or less (26%) to *strongly agree*.

AGE: Likely voters age 35 and over (36%) are more apt than those age 18 to 34 (29%) to strongly agree.

**POLITICAL IDEOLOGY:** Those who are either very conservative (48%) or very liberal (42%) are more likely than those who are somewhat liberal (26%), moderate (31%) or somewhat conservative (34%) to *strongly agree*.



Approximately seven in ten likely voters (71%) either *somewhat agree* (30%) or *strongly agree* (41%) that **candidates running to be election officials should be required to have at least some election experience before they run for office**, while 16% *neither agree nor disagree* and 8% disagree.

**POLITICAL PARTY:** Democrats (77%) are more apt than Republicans (67%) and independents (66%) to either *somewhat* or *strongly agree* candidates running to be election officials should be required to have at least some election experience before they run for office. It should be noted that very few Republicans (10%) or independents (12%) disagree.

Democrats age 50 and over (50%) are much more likely than Republicans age 50 and over (35%) to strongly agree.





The majority of likely voters (55%) believe that **if the election for governor were close and a dispute arose, their state election officials would settle the dispute in a fair way**. Just 18% do not believe their state election officials would settle the dispute in a fair way, while 28% are unsure.


**POLITICAL PARTY:** Democrats (63%) are more likely than Republicans (48%) and independents (52%) to believe an election dispute in their state would be settled in a fair way.

**GENDER:** Men (58%) are more likely than women (51%) to believe an election dispute in their state would be settled in a fair way. Republican males (55%) are much more likely than Republican females (42%) to feel a dispute would be handled fairly.

**REGION:** Interestingly, likely voters in the Midwest (62%) are more apt than those in the West (56%), Northeast (54%), and South (50%) to believe an election dispute in their state would be settled in a fair way.



Likely voters who live in a state where their chief election officer is in the same party as they are registered are more likely than those who live in a state where the chief election officer is in a different party to believe their state election officials would settle an election dispute fairly (58% and 50% respectively).



Three-in-five likely voters are either very confident (23%) or somewhat confident (38%) that the top judges in their state will make decisions about election cases impartially, though 20% are not too confident and 8% are not confident at all.

**POLITICAL PARTY:** Democrats (67%) are more likely than Republicans (56%) and independents (58%) to be either *somewhat confident* or *very confident* that the top judges in their state would make decisions about election cases impartially. One-third of Republican and independent voters are either *not too confident* or *not confident at all*.


**GENDER:** Male voters (64%) are more likely than female voters (58%) to be *somewhat* or *very confident* the top judges in their state would make decisions about election cases impartially.

**AGE:** Voters age 18 to 34 (70%) are more likely than older voters (58%) to be either *somewhat* or *very confident*.

**REGION**: Voters in the Midwest (67%) and West (66%) are more likely than those in the Northeast (60%) and South (54%) to be either *somewhat* or *very confident*.

**EDUCATION:** Voters who have a graduate degree (71%) are more likely than those with less education (59%) to be either *somewhat* or *very confident*.

**POLITICAL IDEOLOGY:** Those who identify as being liberal (71%) are more apt than moderates (58%) and conservatives (54%) to be either *somewhat* or *very confident*.



The graph above shows the confidence levels of likely voters who live in states with different types of judicial election processes. Overall, there are only slight differences in opinion. It is observed that 58% of likely voters who live in states with partisan judicial elections are either *very confident* or *somewhat confident* that judges in their state will make decisions about election cases impartially as do 62% of those who live in states with nonpartisan judicial elections and 62% of those who live in states with judicial appointments, along with 65% who live in states with nonpolitical appointments.
