WHAT IS AT THE CORE?

Core words account for approximately 60 - 80% of the words that we say every day.

They are a small set of simple words, that are used frequently and across contexts. They are used as base of sentences to build ideas and give a much clearer picture of what someone is thinking than just using nouns or labels.

Parents, it is your turn to model AAC with your child. Use the "What" symbol that you have posted in your home to complete each square below. Return to school once each activity is complete.

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Locate every "what" in a storybook. Point to, read and show your child the word on the page. Point to the "what" symbol of the picture.	Ask your child "What do you want to eat?" while pointing to the "what" symbol. Do this for breakfast, lunch, dinner and snacks.	Get 6 small pieces of paper. Write what on 2 pieces of paper. Repeat with the words in and all. Turn all pieces of paper. Have your child pick 2, turn over, point to the matching symbol card and read aloud. If the words match do a silly dance or give your child a small treat for making a match. Continue this word matching game several turns.
Ask your child to choose a storybook. Sit with your child in their bedroom on their bed. Point to the picture symbol "what" as your start the question, "what is this?" then point to a picture in the storybook. Then name the item pointed to in the book. Repeat this at least 4 more times during this story time.	When you are leaving the house or other appropriate times, use your "what" symbol that is posted near the door and ask "What is the weather?" at least 3 times.	At bath time, as "What" questions & point to the "what" symbol each time. For ex: What do you need before you get in the bath? towel, What's next.? Wash hair., What PJs are you going to wear.? etc.
Put away dishes with your child helping. Pointing to the word symbol "What" each time it is used, ask your child what different pieces of kitchen tools are. For ex., hold up fork, pt., to symbol and ask "WHAT is this?". Repeat with at least 5 other kitchen items.	When your child is choosing and/or putting clothing items, point to the "What" symbol posted in the bedroom and ask 5 different what questions, "WHAT color do you want to wear?", etc.	Read "Brown Bear, Brown Bear" or use the QR code to watch the read aloud. Every time the word "What?" is used, point to the "What?" symbol.
Watch or sing, "Going On a Bear Hunt". Pair the word symbol "What?", each time that it occurs in the song. Do on at least 5 different days. This QR code is for a fun version.	Ask your child 5 different "What" questions throughout the day while pairing with the "What" symbol. For ex: "What is this? What are you doing?". etc.	During 5 different dressing activities, show your child 2 pieces of clothing (i.e., 2 shirts, 2 pairs of pants. etc.) along with the "What" symbol, ask "What do you prefer to wear?"
