FROM THE LEAD PASTOR

Since 2019, Rev. Lois Annich has served as Pastor of Care Ministries. She extended her time into 2020 at my request, but is committed to a timeline of ending that role June 30. While we would love to have her continue, we also joyfully celebrate what she is called to do next. I sat down with Lois recently to invite her to share some reflections on her time here.

You've been serving in the role of Pastor of Care Ministries for the last year and a half, but you've been part of the community for many years and connected to Church of the Saviour dating back to the tenure of Dr. Leonard Budd.

I came to Church of the Saviour over 30 years ago when it became a satellite site for The Samaritan Counseling Center, a pastoral counseling agency whose local headquarters was in Lakewood. Although the center closed, Leonard Budd remained committed to the vision of a pastoral counseling practice on site at COTS. Charlie Yoost was also very supportive of that vision, as were Judy Claycomb and you. When you (Andy) asked me to take on additional responsibilities as Pastor of Care Ministries I was delighted to combine counseling with preaching, visitation, and program development.

The ministry that was most critical when you started in this role was growing our Congregational Care Ministry. How did that ministry grow? Sue Petre and I were trained by a Methodist pastor who has developed a similar program in two other congregations. We took the handoff from Gwen Biggins and Barbara SilverSmith who started the program here. We recruited, trained, and provided ongoing support to our Congregational Care Ministers, and they've done an incredible job of visiting and caring for people in hospitals, nursing homes, and rehab centers. Sue has been an inspiring partner. The Congregational Care Ministers and care receivers will attest to how hard-working, compassionate, and creative she is.

I've heard over and over again how much your presence has meant to people in our congregation. What are some of the things you'll miss from day-to-day ministry here? I'll miss a lot--preaching and participating in worship; visiting people in their homes, hospitals and nursing homes; organizing and leading groups; sharing deep theologically rich conversations with the other three pastors and lay leaders; and enjoying laughter, fun and fellowship with many people here.

I'm so grateful for your leadership and for our collegial relationship. We've joked about how hard I've tried to talk you out of your decision. But this is a joyful transition for you that we want to celebrate. What's next for you? I'm stepping away from my role as Pastor of Care Ministries to simplify and focus. I'm a trained and certified life/leadership coach and I believe God is calling me to focus my energies on coaching right now. I bring a lot of life experience and love helping people of various ages and stages discover the possibilities God wants for them. FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT

According to the "State of the Plate" survey that was released on April 22, two-thirds of churches surveyed have seen a decline in giving with many down more than 30%. Only 8% of churches reported an increase in giving and *COTS* is in this elite 8! As of the end of April, COTS has seen a \$22,000 (6%) increase in giving over last year. What is equally exciting is we have been able to share our blessing with many others who have struggled during the pandemic.

Year-to-date April expenses are below budget by over \$50,000. Much of the variance can be explained by timing and from the reduced costs associated with the temporary closing of the building.

THE CHALLENGES OF CARING DURING CRISIS

Even a decade into the descent called Alzheimer's, Dad knows his life story, loves his family, and remains interested in his birthday. We convened a family gathering on Zoom to mark his 89th, hoping the virtual connection would spark recognition of his family's devotion. Looking at the tiled images of family along with Dad and the masked activities director of his nursing home in Rochester, NY, I winced as I thought: "I hope this is not the last birthday I ever celebrate with Dad."

We laughed, sang Happy Birthday, and asked Dad about his cards and gift. He never spoke. He rarely looked in the direction of the screen. His eyes closed. His mouth dropped open. His dignity had drained away long ago and it seemed like I was watching water slowly drain out of a sink. Dad has been dissolving into unseen pieces for years. I never imagined that a national health crisis would leave me to wonder: "Will I see him alive again?"

Visits have long been bittersweet for me. But the feeling of helplessness was compounded by the emptiness of a virtual birthday party. Alzheimer's is beyond cruel by itself. To be denied the simple joy of a birthday party leaves me asking "Why? This can't be. Why are Dad's loved ones denied? Where are you, Father?!?"

Linda's father suffered a mild stroke in February. Now with the virus closing access to his facility, Linda struggles daily to engage him in speech and physical therapy exercises via Skype. He routinely hangs up, changes the settings, or eliminates contacts on his borrowed iPad. After hours of attempts to assist virtually, she turns to working on his finances, taxes, and medical bills. "I feel like I'm drowning" she says.

The stinging irony of our both being blocked from seeing our diminished fathers is crushing. Every day I ask God to accompany me on this journey. Knocked to my knees I can only look up and remember that "my times are in your hands."





While you've been focused on Care Ministries, you've also been instrumental in helping us focus the last several months on ministry with women and seniors. How will those ministries continue and move forward? There's a wealth of talent in this church that can carry them on when it's safe to do so. Christine Elliott led a wonderful women's retreat in early February, and I believe women can continue to make spiritual growth experiences like that happen. Rev. Amanda Moseng is also a highly skilled group leader and is capable of facilitating conversations and plans for both women and senior connections. Did you notice that I didn't say she would do it all? I see the job of clergy in a healthy church as "equipping the saints." The lay people of this church are immensely talented and with support and guidance can help both ministries move forward.

What are your hopes and prayers for Church of the Saviour?

I hope people listened to your sermon (April 26) about John Wesley's teachings on vital piety and social holiness. My hopes and prayers are that this church will be a place where people learn and grow deeply in both those dimensions. The two are inextricably linked! The world is beset by fear, racism, bigotry, and division of every kind. As we are nurtured by God's grace we will have the guidance and strength to reach out to the world with healing love.
