Board Chairperson's Letter

Dear Friends & Donors:

I have been privileged to watch the growth of this foundation since its inception in 2017 and to witness the impact it has had in our county during that time. It is a joy to see the exciting things happening in our county as community members work together to carry on the quality of life that we all enjoy so much. We are excited to highlight a small sample of these projects in the pages of this annual report and hope that they will inspire you as well.

February is once again our Match Month in which we campaign to raise funds for our endowed general fund. When we started this campaign back in 2017, the Dane G. Hansen Foundation had pledged to match the funds we raised for 5 years. They have extended that generous offer and now have pledged to match donations with \$1 for our general fund and \$1 for our administrative fund for every dollar donated (match applies to the first \$50,000 received). This means your donations will go three times as far! We hope that you will join us in contributing to this \$50,000 goal this February.

There are several ways you can support OCCF throughout the year as well. Gifts of grain and stock are welcomed at any time and may provide you with additional tax benefits as well (please speak to your tax advisor regarding this). While the Dane G. Hansen match only applies to donations made in February to our general fund, there are opportunities to establish other funds that will directly benefit areas that you would like to direct your funds towards through provisional funds, donor advised funds, designated funds, field of interest funds or organization funds.

Please reach out to one of our board members to learn more about these opportunities.

We cannot over emphasize the impact that the Dane G. Hansen Foundation has had on our foundation over the years from community grants, to matching funds, to support and training for our board and community members. Their positive impact on our county will be felt for generations to come. Mr. Hansen knew the value of his community and its importance in his success. He generously gave back during his lifetime and left a lasting legacy in the 26 counties of Northwest Kansas through his estate.

Each of us has that same opportunity to give back to our county today whether it is by giving our time and talents to community projects, our monetary donations to current projects or starting an endowed fund for future projects. Grace Brethren Church -3rd Annual Soul Infusion Women's Christian Retreat

Dane G. Hansen Community Grant Fund (Osborne)-\$4,000

The goal for the 3rd Annual Soul Infusion Women's Retreat was to provide a place of fellowship, connection and spiritual growth to women of all ages in the community and surrounding areas. The women in attendance were refreshed by fellowshipping with others and hearing God's word. It is hoped that the positive impact will influence their families and communities. Nearly 80 ladies from surrounding communities participated. Many leaders from individual churches expressed their desire to start small groups influenced by the model provided by the speaker. Participants cited, "This was just what we needed!" Board members felt this event had an even greater impact than normal, given the pandemic keeping the community from hosting events for nearly two years.



Grants

City of Downs - Fire Rescue Tools

Dane G. Hansen Community Grant Fund (Osborne)-\$4,853

The City of Downs was in need of new tools for their Fire Department to ensure a timely and effective response to emergencies in the area. Thanks to a grant from the Osborne County Community Foundation, they were able to purchase new power tools. The improved ability of the Downs Fire and Rescue Team is a great service to those in our district and any district where they provide mutual aid.

USD 392 - Osborne Elementary School Big Read 2022

Dane G. Hansen Community Grant Fund (Osborne)-\$1,000

Each USD 392 student in kindergarten through sixth grade received a copy of the novel, "The Wild Robot." Teachers had the option of reading the book in class, as well as encouraging independent or family reading. Students also had the opportunity to participate in a robot art contest, as well as a robotics workshop presented by Fort Hays State. The book was well read and many students are requesting the sequel.



Natoma Community Library-Library & Arts Center Flooring

Dane G. Hansen Community Grant Fund (Osborne)-\$5,000

Funds were used to replace the flooring in the entry way, reception area, meeting rooms and classrooms. This has provided a much safer and more pleasing environment for this building which many consider "The Heart of the Community."

The iconic WWII poster "WE CAN DO IT" describes the tenacity and perseverance of the Natoma, Kansas, American Legion Auxiliary Unit 109 in the restoration of the Natoma American Legion Hall. They strive to serve veterans, their families, children, youth, and community. With generous grants from the Osborne County Community Foundation, the aging building was transformed from a WWII Army Air Corp barracks into a beautiful meeting place for future generations.

NWKansas Gives- Legacy Giving

NW Kansas Gives is an initiative through the Dane G. Hansen Foundation to capture the significant transfer of wealth in its 26-county service area. According to a study with the Keep Five in Kansas Campaign, between 2020 and 2064 it is estimated that nearly \$30 billion will transfer from one generation to the next in Northwest Kansas, with \$1.5 billion in Osborne County.

We are partnering with the Dane G. Hansen Foundation to encourage people like you to consider leaving a portion of your estate to the Osborne County Community Foundation in a permanent fund to benefit your community forever. If just five percent of the \$1.5 billion, or \$75, million was captured in a permanent fund, it would generate nearly \$3.4 million in annual grants to support causes in Osborne County.

Donors may also set up an appointment with John Griffin, an estate planning attorney at Stewardship Counseling, free of charge. Once an outline is created, donors work with their existing attorney (or an attorney can be recommended) to complete the documents (paid for by the donor).



Grant Story

Youth Entrepreneurship Challenge Professional Learning Community

Dane G. Hansen Community Grant Fund (Osborne)-\$1,500

USD 392 in Osborne implemented the Youth Entrepreneurship Challenge (YEC) this year, and the Osborne County Community Foundation was pleased to award a grant to assist with costs. YEC promotes projectbased learning and teaches real life skills to students in grades 6-12. Throughout this challenge, students developed a business plan for new or existing businesses, created a trade show display, and presented their plans to a panel of local judges. Winners of the event received cash prizes and the opportunity to compete at the state level.

This was the first time USD 392 hosted such a competition, and it proved to be an exciting event for the community! The goal of the competition was to expose Kansas middle school and high school students to entrepreneurship.

Fifty-three local events in Kansas culminated in a state championship hosted by Kansas State University in April of 2022. Three students from Osborne County qualified for the state championship. Donations from generous donors of Osborne County make grants like this possible.

Grant Story

USD 272 - Lakeside Jr High - Young AmeriTowne 2022

Lakeside Jr. High School 7th and 8th grade students attended Young AmeriTowne of Kansas in Lenora. AmeriTowne is a financial literacy curriculum designed for 4th - 8th grades that teaches basic economics, banking, money management, government, communications, entrepreneurship, philanthropy, and employment. Students become citizens in AmeriTowne where they fill real-world employment roles that are in a town. Teachers evaluate student success through accomplishment of classroom exercises, involvement in AmeriTowne, and completion of shop books and individual bank accounts.














