# FREE REGISTRATION TO COLLEGE 101 WEBINAR SERIES OPENED FRIDAY, JULY 14, 2023






#### Presentation 1: Al in Higher Education: The Future is Now

This presentation will focus on possibilities. There are also incredible opportunities to advance critical thinking and reawaken student curiosity and commitment to learning. ChatGPT is not the first open-source AI that will impact education; we have been using it for years. It is, however, the first fine-tuned linguistic-based AI that is available to the public for free that is so convincing that people believe it is 'thinking' and making meaning. That is where the opportunity for learning steps in because the issue is not about the technology. The issue is how individuals and institutions interact with a machine. This is an incredibly exciting time, and in the future, people will look back and think in terms of before and after the introduction of linguistic-based AI. The academy must take this opportunity to move forward with conviction and not hold back out of fear.

#### Presentation 2: If ChatGPT Were a Cookie?

Asking students to resist using ChatGPT to submit work may be somewhat like asking yourself to resist a fresh, warm chocolate chip cookie. To some degree, our brains are wired to preserve cognitive resources, as they are to maximize high calorie intake. Using this analogy as a basis for an interactive session, the presenters will lead the group in examining what strategies we can employ to help students embrace academic integrity. The session will include both research and anecdotal narratives relative to the following strategies.


### TRAVELS WITH JOSH: OCKLAWAHA

As a lover of nature and a fan of local history, the Ocklawaha River and Silver Springs have always drawn my attention. It didn't hurt that I grew up a mile from Silver Springs. Flowing from the Green Swamp, through the Harris chain of lakes and eventually into the St. John's river, near Palatka, the Ocklawaha helped shape Florida's early history. From providing for the needs of countless indigenous people, serving as a critical trade route and stoking Florida's early tourism industry, the river has always been bustling with activity. In the early days, the draw was a steamboat trip from Palatka, up the Ocklawaha, to see Silver Springs. For me, the main attraction was, and still is, the tea colored Ocklawaha. As a child, the river provided me with access to shoreline fishing and was my first solo destination with my newly minted Florida driver's license. Eventually this would be the setting where I spent several years apprenticing under an inland waterway captain, fishing and sightseeing guide.

Researching the Ocklawaha for my Freshman Composition research paper, I found out that I'm far from the first person to be enamored with the river and its surroundings. I found writers speaking of the river in near mythical terms, dating back to the 1870's, in periodical publications such as Harper's, various Florida travel guides and by authors such as Stowe and Lanier. They described a mysterious jungle-like passage where the towering cypress nearly blacked out the sun, inhabited by all manner of reptiles, birds, including a now-extinct parakeet, and the heartiest settlers. You can also catch the springs in many classic films and television series and the river's lore was further immortalized in song and story by Florida's Gamble Rogers. A legend in the Florida Folk community and the namesake of a state park, Rogers created a robust (almost systematic) mythology surrounding what is affectionately known as Florida's 68th county, Ocklawaha County. The river is still commonly recounted - both in myth and fact- at events such as the Gamble Rogers, Will McLean and Florida Folk festivals. If you are interested in reading up on the actual history yourself, I recommend Eternal Spring: Man's 10,000 Years of History in Florida's Silver Springs, by Richard Martin or, Ocklawaha River Steamboats, by Edward Mueller, focusing on the river's steamboat era.

Toward the end of the 1920s, the steam engine gave way to the outboard motor and now, some 100 years later, the outboard is slowly giving way to the paddle. These days, the best way to enjoy this mysterious river is much the same as 200 years ago, by paddle-craft. Silver Springs and the Ocklawaha River are popular with kayakers, including me. Although the springs are fantastic, they can get quite crowded. Even so, if you've never seen the headsprings, I recommend bringing your boat or renting one from the park and putting in at Silver Springs State Park and spending a few hours on the crystal-clear waters that drew so many to early Florida. My favorite option is putting in at either Ray Wayside park near Ocala or Gore's Landing near Fort McCoy and heading downstream. On this route, it is common to see more monkeys than people. Alligators, turtles and wading birds are common and you might just see a manatee or two. If you know where to look, there are still a few relics from the steamboat era and, if you have any imagination at all, it's easy to appreciate why those 19th century writers and 20th century musicians found it so easy to stretch the truth as they did.
