### **South Region:**



### Haven House Fights Homelessness One Family at a Time

The Haven House looks nothing like a traditional home, but inside its apartment-like exterior it has all that matters: heart. More specifically, it has the three compassionate and dedicated hearts of Rose Verheul, Carolyn Carter, and Julie Harris. In an effort to help the trio continue providing safe temporary housing for area families, DMEA presented the Haven House with a \$2,000 donation from the co-op's Operation Round Up Charitable Trust last month.

The Haven House provides temporary long-term housing for families and individuals facing homelessness. It also provides training and a support network to help families establish healthy and self-sustaining lifestyles.

"People often come to us leaving domestic violence or substance abuse and just all around unhealthy situations. We help them make the changes so they don't have to be homeless anymore," said Director of Operations, Rose Verheul.

The facility can host up to 17 families at a time. It includes a full commercial kitchen, laundry room, and even a children's playroom filled with donated toys, movies, and craft supplies. Residents are required to adhere to a strict code of ethics, which includes a background check and drug and alcohol screening. They are also required to complete a set number of volunteer hours, perform community chores, and comply with a curfew.

So much more than a homeless shelter, the Haven House provides its residents a path to success, including goal setting with incentives, life coaching, educational classes, counseling, job hunting assistance, and much more. For this reason, residents that succeed in completing their goals and securing housing are considered graduates.

"To hear and witness them solve their own problems. To see them use the tools we give them. That's what's really fulfilling," explained case manager, Julie Harris.

The Haven House operates entirely on grants and the generosity of private donors. When families and individuals are initially accepted, they often have no means to provide basic food, clothing, and hygiene items. Donations, like the one from DMEA's Operation Round Up

program, help the Haven House provide initial support to families.

The Haven House accepts donations of all kinds, but is particularly in need of shoes, business clothes, and children's items. The center also recently launched a family sponsorship program, where community members can sponsor one family for just \$10 per month. Their goal is 500 families. Operation Round Up is a charitable giving program funded by DMEA members. Participating members choose to round up their monthly electric bill. ## Stay Safe in Auto Accidents Involving Power Poles

Should you be involved in an automobile accident with a power pole, do the following:

- Stay in the car. Call 911 to have the utility notified.
- Do not leave the vehicle until utility professionals have de-energized the line and they advise you that it is safe to exit.
- If you must exit the vehicle because it is on fire, jump clear of it with your feet together and without touching the vehicle and ground at the same time. Keeping your feet together, "bunny hop" to safety. Doing this will ensure that you will not have different strengths of electric current running from one foot to another.
- Be aware that, after an accident with a pole, wires can fall at any time.
- Downed lines can sometimes show they are live by arcing and sparking with electricity, but this is not always the case. Treat all downed wires as though they are energized.
- Remember, most power lines are not insulated. The coating on the lines is for weatherproofing and will not offer any protection from the electrical current.
- The tires of the vehicle do not insulate it from electrical dangers. Follow the above safety precautions even if the car has rolled and is upside down or on its side. The vehicle is the path to ground for the electrical current. So while you remain in the car, you are safe. If you step out of the car, you are in danger of becoming the path to ground.
- If you witness an accident involving a vehicle and downed lines, stay back, and warn others to stay away. Make sure the occupants of the car stay inside the vehicle until the utility has arrived to de-energize the lines.
