What was once a scarce resource, limited only to the "big city," is now a given in all parts of America. 

are on the rise.

Per the FCC (Federal Communications Commission) unwanted calls are far and away the biggest consumer complaint with over 200,000 complaints each year. Types of scam-related robocalls can range from health insurance, interest rates, get rich quick, search listings, travel agencies, business loans, to home improvement related robocalls.

Answered a call, but worried that the person or company calling is not legitimate? Hang up the phone, search the company, and call the number on their formal website to verify. Also, if you answer and the recording/caller asks "can you hear me" or asks you to press a number to be connected to a representative, just hang up.

Tips to prevent illegal robocalls:

- · Register your home and mobile number(s) at donotcall.gov
- Don't answer calls from unknown or blocked numbers or from numbers you don't recognize
- Download a call-blocking app on your smartphone like Nomorobo, Hiya, or YouMail

Home COOKING

German Apple Pancakes

Ingredients:

- 3/4 cup (3, 3/4 ounces) all-purpose flour
- 5 tablespoons granulated sugar, divided
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup yogurt
- 3 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 4 tablespoons (2 ounces) unsalted butter
- 1 pound, 12 ounces (4 to 5 medium) tart cooking apples, such as Granny Smith, peeled, cored, and sliced into 1/2-inch wedges
- · Powdered sugar for dusting

Directions:

Adjust rack to upper middle position and preheat oven to 500°F. Whisk flour, 1 tablespoon sugar, and salt in medium bowl to combine. Whisk in milk, yogurt, eggs, and vanilla until just combined; set batter aside.

Stir remaining 4 tablespoons sugar with cinnamon in a small bowl. Heat butter in 10-inch non-stick oven-safe skillet over medium heat until melted. Increase heat to medium high and add apples and cinnamon-sugar to pan. Cook, stirring frequently, until apples have softened and are beginning to caramelize, 6 to 8 minutes.

Remove from heat, pour batter over apples and immediately place pan in oven. Reduce heat to 425°F and bake until pancake is puffed, just set in center, and golden around the edges, about 15 minutes.

Cool pan on wire rack for about 15 minutes, then carefully invert pancake onto serving plate. Dust with powdered sugar and serve.
