

Local Hydros Could Power 8,000 Homes, but they Only Power 4,300

Spring waters are flowing, which means the local hydroelectric plants came online last month and are churning out thousands of kilowatts of local renewable energy. In total, five hydro plants are situated along the US Bureau of Reclamation's Uncompangre Project in and around Montrose, CO—this project is locally often referred to as South Canal, Shavano Falls, or the Gunnison Tunnel diversion.

The Uncompangre Project is managed by the Uncompangre Valley Water Users Association (UVWUA), and DMEA is proud to generate (or purchase) and deliver as much local energy from it as we can to our members' homes and businesses. On average, these plants combined produce enough electricity throughout their operating season (typically early April through October) to power the annual needs of roughly 8,000 average homes in DMEA's service territory.

But, unfortunately, not all that power is actually delivered to DMEA members. DMEA is limited by a provision in our wholesale power contract that caps our ability to provide locally generated renewable energy at 5% of our members' total electricity needs. The five hydro plants together amount to as much as 13% of our annual energy needs. As a result, our members are only able to benefit from three of the five hydro plants, Drop 1, Drop 3, and Drop 5. The power produced by the other two plants is sold outside of our service territory due to the limitations of our Tri-State contract.

Three Reasons to Love Local Hydro

1. It's local

To ensure we don't send dollars out of town (or state) for power unnecessarily. Instead that money stays right here in our community because we are able to purchase the energy from local companies like the Uncompangre Water Users Association

2. It's economical

On average, the power we generate from the local hydro plants is 35% cheaper than the power we purchase from Tri-State.

3. It's environmental

Small hydro uses water to produce energy with its only byproduct being that same water. And since these units are small "run-of-river" systems, its means the water passes them through is directed back in to the irrigation canal with little impact on aquatic life and the surrounding environment.

Save Energy

with Smart Power Strips.

Did you know that many of the items you keep plugged in all the time, like printers, computers, lamps, and TVs use electricity even when they are turned off? As your TV or computer sits waiting in standby mode it's using energy. And, while convenient, this standby mode does come at a cost.

Smart power strips are one way you can cut back on this wasted energy. Here's how they work:

- Any electronics that go into standby mode are automatically turned off by the power strip no power is delivered to them.
- ▶ Some strips let you keep one item on but turn off power to related items. For example, one socket will power your TV, and you would plug in your BluRay player, gaming system, or other things you only use when the TV is on, into the other sockets. The strip only gives those other items power when your TV is on.

Smart power strips can be found anywhere electronics are sold and aren't much more expensive than regular power strips. Look on the label for the benefits and features listed above.

PROTECT OUR POWER POLES

Burning can damage our power poles.

Controlled burns are an important tool in Western Colorado for managing and restoring natural areas—we're asking you to use extra precaution when burning near our power poles or other parts of the electric system. Here are a few tips to help keep your spring burning in control:

Be aware – Take special note of DMEA power poles, equipment, and lines before starting your burn. Burning a power pole could result in a widespread power outage and be costly for you. Poles that have sustained damage must be replaced.


Prep the area – Before beginning your burn, cut all grass and weeds near our poles to reduce the fire hazard. The U.S. Department of Agriculture also advises the removal of all dead trees within 20 feet of a planned burn.

Wet to prevent – Water the area near our poles to help prevent it from catching fire, **but be careful to keep water streams out of our power lines.**

Check the weather – Be sure to check the weather on the day of your planned burn, before you starting burning. Avoid burning in windy conditions.

Obey the law – Do not burn when fire restrictions have been put in place in your area.

If a pole catches fire while burning your ditches or fields, call 911 and report it to us immediately at 877-687-3632. Do not attempt to put out the fire yourself because the risk for shock or electrocution is heightened.

My Keto Bread

Recipe from Lenice Geiger, Montrose

Ingredients:

- 8 oz cream cheese
- 2 cup mozzarella cheese shredded
- 3 lg. eggs beaten
- ¼ cup parmesan cheese grated
- 1 cup pork rinds crushed
- 5 Tbsp. almond flour
- 1 Tbsp. baking powder
- ½ tsp. oregano +/- to taste
- 1/4 tsp garlic powder +/- to taste

Directions:

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Line cookie sheet with parchment paper.

Place cream cheese and mozzarella cheese in 2-Qt glass bowl. Microwave on high for 1.5 min. Stir. Microwave another 1 – 1.5 min., until completely melted. Stir well. Add all remaining ingredients and stir until thoroughly mixed. Will have biscuit like texture.

Spread mixture on parchment lined cookie sheet (a pastry/pizza roller works great). Bake 15-20 min., until slightly golden brown. Cool on rack 15 min. Then transfer to rack and remove paper. Cool completely. Cut into 12 equal pieces to use for sandwiches or slathered with favorite spread. Cut into strips for bread sticks - great dipping in keto marinara.
