Closing the Digital Divide One Grant at a Time

Last month, DMEA and Elevate announced the phenomenal news that we were again recipients of grant funds from the USDA's ReConnect Program. DMEA was awarded \$13.8 million from the third round of funding to build Elevate's fiber network in many of the remaining unserved areas in Delta

County. And yes, this includes our residents on Rogers and Scenic Mesas, who were left reeling in 2020 when the Colorado Broadband Board overturned its decision to fund construction in the area. This time, there is no appeal process – we're coming.

The new grant will help us build an additional 340 miles of fiber and bring Elevate's Gigabit internet to another 1,479 local homes and businesses. Add that to our current grant projects in the construction pipeline, and more than

95% of our members will have access to Elevate when construction is complete! The digital divide between our rural Western Slope communities and the urban Front Range will cease to exist.

With the recent completion of our Black Canyon Grant Zone, southwest of Crawford, we now have four grant projects left in our queue: Greater Gunnison Gorge, ReConnect 2, East Mesa, and ReConnect 3. You're probably asking, "Where are these zones?" and "When will Elevate be there?" Below is our anticipated construction timeline. The grant areas encompass vast swaths of land, and we plan to build each grant area in stages. The dates you see listed for when internet service will be available represent the earliest that residents in the first stage of construction can order service. It may take many months to complete all stages of the build-out. I know we've been asking for your patience for many years now, and I humbly ask for just a bit more.


CONSTRUCTION TIMELINE


PARTIAL PAY ON SMARTHUB

DMEA members and Elevate subscribers can pay their accounts together or individually using the new SmartHub app. Here is how to pay separately:




Open your SmartHub app. Click on the 'Bill & Pay' tab at the bottom of your screen.





Navigate to 'Pay Partial Amount.' All your bills will be listed under the next screen.






Choose which bill to pay by clicking anywhere in the bill's field.
