

Elevate Internet Coming This Fall to Pea Green

Last month we sent our contracted fiber engineering firm to the field to assess our electric grid in preparation for bringing gigabit internet to some of Elevate's longanticipated fiber zones. Pea Green, Delta S 412, and Olathe 148, we're talking to you! This build-out isn't only exciting for the 7,000 community members that will, for the first time, have a modern internet connection. It is also a monumental feat for our internal team, who worked hard to secure more than \$10.5 million in grant funds to extend our network to these hard-to-reach places. Because of this grant, DMEA/ Elevate can continue fulfilling the promise we made to our members, despite the financial challenges of building in rural areas.

I am proud of the team whose knowledge gave us the advantage we needed to secure these grant funds. Please help me thank the following staff for their hard work: Kent Blackwell, Chief Technology Officer; Mark Kurtz, Elevate Senior Business Project Manager; Margaret Davey, Grants and Regulatory Compliance Administrator; Jonathan Nelson, Elevate Outside Plant Supervisor; Janet Green, Applications and Database Manager; and our entire GIS team, Alissa Heinecke, Michelle Brew, and Donna Hebein.

I also want to publicly acknowledge our members in Pea Green, Delta S 412, and Olathe 148 for submitting numerous comments in support of our efforts, not once but three times! That gratitude extends to U.S. Senator Michael Bennet, Colorado Senator Don Coram, and Colorado Representatives Marc Catlin and Matt Soper. These elected officials not only provided letters of support but have advocated for Elevate time and time again.

Now onto what you really want to know: when will Elevate's 1 Gig internet be available at your home? After completing

the make-ready assessment, our contractors will work handin-hand with DMEA's mapping team to design our network. After the design, DMEA will secure a contractor from a federal pool to build the fiber network. We anticipate that construction will begin in early 2023, with our first members coming online by the summer.

If all that is not exciting enough, our grant team is already working to secure an additional \$14 million in future grant funds through the Rural Utility Service's Reconnect III program. If awarded, this grant funding will enable DMEA/ Elevate to build out even more rural swaths of Delta, Montrose, and Gunnison counties. Yes, you read that right; I said Gunnison County. We're coming, Somerset!

SHOCK TALK TREE PLANTING


Hey! What are you up to this weekend?

SCAM ALERT

How SmartHub Can Help You Avoid Scams

Scammers are using ever-improving technologies to target electric consumers by phone, email, and text. These criminals claim to be from DMEA and often use a technique called spoofing to make the Caller ID on your phone display DMEA's number. They may even use email addresses that look legitimate at first glance.


Members can get caught off-guard by the aggressive tone of the scammers, who threaten to turn off power if not paid immediately. Your best defense against scams – a good dose of skepticism not included – is your DMEA SmartHub account.

Check your balance 24/7/365

Scammers will try to convince you that your account is past due. They then threaten to turn off your service unless you pay immediately. To prevent falling for these threats, confirm your DMEA account balance any time, day or night.

Make a secure payment

Sometimes, your account may have a balance. Don't give the caller any personal or financial information. After confirming your balance, you can immediately make a payment toward your DMEA account, and rest assured your money isn't in the wrong hands.
